- 5. MUST NOT have been finally convicted of a felony (unless pardoned or otherwise released from the resulting disabilities).
- 6. MUST satisfy any other requirement prescribed by law for the office.

UGHS' Littlejohn gets Lions' share of wins


A love for basketball began for J.B. Littlejohn playing as a Pirate in Pittsburg, Texas. It was solidified when he moved to Clarksville and became a 3-point shooter for Clyde Carlisle, the second winningest coach in Texas and third winningest in the nation as of 2003 with 1,103 wins. A young Littlejohn would buy into Carlisle's disciplined coaching style and help the Tigers become state finalists in 1991 going 35-2. Littlejohn would have certainly received a nod from the late Carlisle when he notched his own 400th career win on Dec 2, 2021, beating Alba-Golden 46-33 in the McLeod Tournament.

Despite his love for basketball, it wasn't the sport of choice in the Littlejohn household. His father played against the likes of the Golden Bear, Jack Nicklaus as a semi-pro golfer. Enough of that talent to swing a nine iron transferred down to his son, earning him a scholarship to Grayson County Community College. There he began earning his teaching/ coaching degree before finishing up at UT Tyler. After beginning his coaching career in 1997,



Littlejohn received the title of head coach for the first time in 2001 at Fruitvale, but it was at Graford High School where he found his own coaching identity. In 2008 Littlejohn took the Rabbits to the

Road rage leaves one man dead

Authorities are seeking the public's help in finding a driver whose possible act of "road rage" caused another vehicle to overturn on U.S. 271 north of Gilmer Wednesday afternoon last week, killing a man and injuring a woman, said the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Raymond C. Haley II, 30, of Mount Pleasant was pronounced dead at the sene by Upshur County Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace Rhonda Welch near Midway community, the DPS said. His passenger, Shavett Holley, 30, of Linden, was transported to UT Health Pittsburg hospital in stable condition, said DPS spokeswoman Jean Dark.

Dark released these details of the 3 p.m. incident:

Preliminary investigation indicated Haley was northbound in a 2001 Chevrolet Tahoe sport utility vehicle behind the other vehicle when "information obtained from witnesses at the scene" indicated the front vehicle's driver "slammed on its brakes in a possible road rage situation," causing Haley "to take evasive action to the right."

Haley, who wasn't wearing a safety belt, ran off the highway, "overcorrected to the left and the vehicle rolled, ejecting the driver." The other vehicle, described as a brown KIA "sportage type vehicle," continued north on U.S. 271 toward Pittsburg.

The DPS seeks the public's help in identifying the driver, and anyone with information should contact the DPS' Gilmer office at 903-797-2753, Dark said.

Upshur County indictments handed down

The Upshur County Grand Jury has indicted Robert Lee Travis on a murder charge in connection with the May 1 shooting of an Ore City man.


Travis, 42 and also of Ore City, was indicted Dec. 16 on charges of killing Braiden Ray Robinson. Robinson, 32, was shot about 10 p.m. during a disturbance at a home in the 8000 block of Salvia Road in northeastern Upshur County, sheriff's Chief Deputy David Hazel said at the time.

Travis and Robinson were "known to each other," Hazel said. At the time, Sheriff Larry Webb said the suspect was arrested at Webb's office in Gilmer after turning himself in "in a roundabout way."

Travis, who was arrested May 2, remained free on \$500,000 bond, said District Attorney Billy Byrd's office, which announced the indictment Dec. 22. Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace Lyle Potter had pronounced Robinson dead at the scene.

Travis' was among 21 indictments, five of them sealed, which the jury returned Dec. 16 in Gilmer, Byrd reported. Jurors also no-billed



Coronavirus in the U.S.: Where cases are growing and declining

New Year's celebrations in the United States were dialed back as CO-VID-19 cases surge, soaring to an average of 344,000 per day for the past week. Compared to two weeks ago, hospitalizations are up 19 percent, while deaths have fallen 5 percent. The number of people who have died from COVID-19 in the U.S. now exceeds 822,000.

The worst U.S. outbreaks are largely in the Midwest and Northeast, but cases are also rising again in the Southeast. After a dramatic summer wave followed by a November lull, cases in Florida are skyrocketing. In Washington D.C. daily cases have risen 800 percent in the past two weeks as the District continues to lead the country in cases per capita. Ohio, Delaware, and Indiana have the highest rates of hospitalization.

To help overburdened hospitals around the country, 13,000 members of the National Guard have been activated in 48 states to support the

COVID-19 response with everything from vaccinations and testing to clinical care. This is in addition to 1,000 military doctors, nurses, and EMTs being sent around the country, some of whom are already on the ground in Indiana, New Mexico, Wisconsin, and New Jersey.

The surge is largely due to the rapid spread of the Omicron variant, which is more infectious than Delta. Within just one month, Omicron went from causing less than 1 percent of new COVID-19 cases to almost 60 percent, becoming the dominant variant in the U.S.

This week the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention updated their guidance on isolation and quarantine, stating that infected individuals only need to self-isolate for five days rather than 10. Rochelle Walensky, director of the CDC, explained that these changes reflect new studies that show

Twenty-nine new laws in effect in January

More than 20 new state laws went into effect as Texans rang in the New Year, with another half-dozen to go on the books on Jan. 18, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram reported. Those laws include a ban on transgender athletes competing on sports teams that reflect their gender identity, and penalties for illegally restraining dogs. Other new laws include:

- Require landlords to disclose to potential renters if a property has ever flooded or is in a flood plain. Texas becomes only the second state in the nation with such a requirement, joining Georgia.
- Allow homeowners to take a homestead exemption in the same year they buy their home, instead of having to wait until the following year, potentially saving on property taxes.
- Require people accused in Texas of a violent crime to post a cash bond. Before, a judge could agree to release the accused on a personal bond that does not require a cash payment.
- Provide a slate of new benefits for Texas veterans and their families, including exempting new veteran-owned businesses from paying the franchise tax.

Abbott seeks more testing sites, antibodies

Texas is seeking more federally funded COVID-19 testing locations and additional federal allocations of monoclonal antibodies used to treat the virus in six counties facing increased cases because of the omicron variant: Bexar, Cameron, Dallas, Harris, Hidalgo and Tarrant.

"Testing sites, additional medical staff and continued shipments of therapeutics from the federal government will help us continue to save lives and mitigate the spread of COVID-19," Gov. Greg Abbott said in making the request.

The Texas Department of State Health Services has also requested additional allocations of an antibody therapeutic proven effective in fighting the omicron variant, as well as other treatments used to reduce hospitalizations. DSHS also requested three teams of medical personnel to support urban hospitals that don't have DSHS-contracted health-care staff.

COVID-19 cases double in state from previous week.

The number of new Texas cases of COVID-19 has more than doubled in the past week to 108,719, according to the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University. A total of 422 new deaths were recorded, up 58% from the previous week's total of 266.

DSHS reported as of Sunday there were 5,523 COVID-19 patients in Texas hospitals, up nearly 64% from the previous week. The total number of Texans who are fully vaccinated now stands at 16.45 million, according to DSHS, which is 56.7% of the total population. In addition, 4.678 million of the state's residents have been vaccinated with a booster dose.

First phase of election audit completed

The initial review of the 2020 general election results in four Texas counties showed relatively few discrepancies between electronic and hand counts of ballots. The Dallas Morning News reported that out of the 11.3 million votes cast statewide, Secretary of State John Scott found potentially 509 cases where people may have cast ballots both in Texas and another state, and 67 possible cases of votes cast in the name of dead people.

The audits are being performed in Dallas, Harris, Tarrant and Collin counties. During the next phase, officials will conduct "a comprehensive records review to ensure election procedures were properly followed in 2020."

Former president Donald Trump called for the audit in September, despite having handily won the state. Trump has pressured the governor to add an election audit to a special legislative session, but Abbot thus far has not done so.

It rained fish in Texarkana last week

Instead of cats and dogs, it rained fish in Texarkana last Wednesday. The Texarkana Gazette reported that as strong thunderstorms moved through, residents in at least four locations reported fish falling from the sky. In a Facebook post, city officials explained the rare phenomenon.

"Animal rain is a phenomenon that occurs when small water animals like frogs, crabs, and small fish are swept up in waterspouts or drafts that occur on the surface of the earth," officials wrote in the post. "They are then rained down at the same time as the rain. While it's uncommon, it happens, as evidenced in several places in Texarkana today."

The Long-Term Economic Forecast for Texas Metropolitan Areas...

Metropolitan areas across Texas have regained most of the ropolitan Division is likely to increase at a 1.68% annual otherwise occurred has been foregone or at least delayed, growth through 2045 at a rate of 1.55% yearly. the long-term outlook remains quite positive.

The Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land MSA economy



jobs across the state are currently metropolitan areas, a proportion which has been rising steadily

and the Dallas areas will likely each account for approximately one fourth of net new jobs, with the greater Austin, San Antonio, and Fort Worth regions each contributing between 8% and 9% of the total gain.

The fastest-growing metropolitan centers as measured by percentage changes in jobs are expected to be those with significant concentrations of energy activity (though some of these are coming back from steep initial declines and lingering vestiges of COVID-19) including Odessa (up by a compound annual 1.90% per year through 2045), Midland (1.87%), San Angelo (1.85%), and Tyler (1.81%). These smaller MSAs are projected to equal or exceed the most rapidly expanding large metro areas (such as Dallas-Plano-Irving with 1.85% annual growth and Austin-Round Rock-Georgetown with 1.80%).

More than three fourths of all has recently struggled due to sluggish recovery in the energy sector, but these problems are likely to resolve over time. found in the state's seven largest Employment in the area is expected to expand at an annual rate of 1.74% through 2045.

The McAllen-Edinburg-Mission MSA is projected to see 1.76% annual job growth through 2045. The San Antonio-Through 2045, the Houston New Braunfels MSA economy's expansion pace is likely to be maintained, with employment anticipated to rise at a 1.70% yearly rate over the period.

Texas' smaller metropolitan areas are also projected to enjoy notable gains over time. As mentioned, areas with significant energy activity are projected to see particularly strong job growth as the industry recovers from pandemicrelated demand decreases and other issues. Sherman-Denison (1.73%) is also expected to outpace the state rate of expansion. Most of the other smaller MSAs are predicted to advance by 1.50% or more through 2045.

While residual effects of the coronavirus and the emerging omicron variant may cause issues in some areas over the next few years, Texas metropolitan areas are likely to see notable long-term expansion. The largest population centers are projected to generate the highest numbers of net new jobs, but several smaller metros will likely keep pace in terms of relative increases. There are challenges to be sure, but the overall prospects are quite encouraging.

Candidates for other offices who are expected to appear include two of the four GOP contestants for the U.S. House of Representatives, Smith County Judge Nathaniel Moran and Joe McDanel; Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar, seeking re-election; Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Sid Miller and his opponent James White; and State Rep. Cole Hefner and his challenger Dewey Collier.





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Commissioners set early Primary voting dates

At its final meeting of 2021, Upshur County Commissioners Court on Thursday approved early voting dates for the March 1 Republican and Democratic primaries.

The court set such voting at County Election Administrator Lory Harle's office at the Upshur County Courthouse in Gilmer from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Feb. 14-18, and 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Feb. 22-25. (No voting will be held Feb. 21 because it is Presidents Day, a governmental holiday.)

County Judge Todd Tefteller said that if the Omnicron virus outbreak necessitated it, the county could move the voting to the city-owned Gilmer Civic Center. He said that might be required if governmental authoriies require social distancing between voters.

County Auditor Connie Williams replied that a federal grant could cover any costs of moving, and Tefteller responded, "Let's keep our fingers crossed that we can hold it here (at the courthouse)."

Precinct 2 Commissioner Dustin Nicholson suggsted making a deposit with the city to secure the center for early voting if needed, and Williams said she had no problem with that.

In the same vote approving the early voting arrangements, the court accepted, for recording, the 16 election-day polling locations. They are the Indian Rock Baptist Church, East Mountain Community Center, Glenwood Water Supply Corporation, Ashland Masonic Lodge No. 1138 in Diana, Assembly of God in Gilmer, Walnut Creek Baptist Church in Diana, Ore City Community Center, Frontier Cowboy Church, Big Sandy School, Pritchett Community Center, St. James Baptist Church in Gladewater, Enon Community Center, Oak Hill Baptist Church, Simpsonville Volunteer Fire Department, Rosewood Baptist Church and the Upshur County Library in Gilmer.

Under the "countywide" voting system, any Upshur County voter can cast his/her ballot at any of these places on election day. Voters, however, cannot participate in elections for precinct offices (such as justice of the peace) other than for the precinct where the voter resides. (For example, a voter who lives in justice of the peace Precinct 2 can vote in Precinct 3, but not in an election for Precinct 3 justice of the peace.)

Each voting location will have a ballot suitable for the precinct where the voter lives.

In other business Thursday, the court took two votes in which it approved seeking bids on various materials for the Road and Bridge Department. County Road Administrator Andy Jordan told commissioners he wanted to take bids now to avoid inflation he expected after the first of 2022.

In one vote, the court authorized requesting bids on gas and diesel, plant mixed asphalt, refined road oil and emulsified asphalt, pug milling and RipRap/rock. In the other vote, the court approved seeking bids on commercial base.

Jordan said he had encountered problems using grant funds to obtain limestone base, and that a railroad was "giving our supplier fits." He also said commercial base comes from a different quarry than the limestone base, and that he would choose between the two types.

Nicholson left the room during the discussion and votes on the road and bridge materials to avoid a conflict of interest because of the nature of his business. The court approved the matters 3-0 with Tefteller joining Precinct 1 Commissioner Gene Dolle and Precinct 3 Commissioner Michael Ashley in voting yes.

(Precinct 4 Commissioner Jay W. Miller was absent because, Tefteller said, he was "stranded somewhere." Airlines have been canceling numerous flights recently, reportedly due to staff shortages caused by the COVID outbreak and because of bad weather.)

In other business at Thursday's meeting in Gilmer, the court approved buying and installing security cameras for the courthouse.










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

Continued from Page 1 that people who are infected with SARS-CoV-2 are most likely to spread the virus during the two days before they develop symptoms and up to three days after. "We do know the vast majority of viral transmission happens in those first five days, somewhere in the 85 to 90 percent range," Walensky said at a White House brief-


ing on Wednesday. "So if

a person can isolate for the first five days, they absolutely should."

Concerns about Omicron are spurring more people to get vaccine shots, including boosters. About one million people received a shot each day for the past week, bringing the number of fully vaccinated Americans to 62 percent. That still leaves some 40 million Americans who are eligible for a vaccine but

have not yet received a shot.

"The risk of severe disease from any circulating variant, including Omicron, is much, much higher for the unvaccinated," Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, said on December 29. "And so, adults and children who are eligible: Get vaccinated. And vaccinated people: Get boosted when eligible."



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
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
