## **Traffic deaths** spike in Texas work zones

As road construction projects ramp up statewide, TxDOT officials are asking motorists to slow down and stay alert when driving through the thousands of work zones in Texas to protect themselves and others. In 2021, traffic crashes in the state's work zones claimed the lives of 244 people, a 33% increase over the previous year.

Drivers and their passengers accounted for the majority of those who died in Texas work zone crashes last year: 195 motorists or vehicle passengers were killed, along with 38 pedestrians, four bicyclists and three roadside construction workers. Speeding and driver inattention were among the leading causes of crashes.

With these alarming statistics in mind, TxDOT's "Be Safe. Drive Smart." campaign is marking National Work Zone Awareness Week, April 11–15, by sharing safety tips to prevent work zone crashes and fatalities.

"It's cause for tremendous concern that the number of people killed on our roadways reached a 40-year high last year and fatalities in our workzones rose dramatically," said TxDOT Executive Director Marc Williams. "It's important for drivers to remember that driving conditions in work zones can be especially challenging because of extra congestion, slow-moving heavy equipment, temporary barriers and vehicles that make sudden stops. That's why it's crucial for everyone to give driving their full attention and drive a safe speed in areas where construction and maintenance are underway."

The "Be Safe. Drive Smart." campaign offers five tips for driving safely through a work zone:

Slow down. Follow the posted speed limit and adjust your driving to match road conditions.

Pay attention. Avoid distractions, keep your mind on the road and put your phone away.

Watch out for road crews. The only protective gear they wear is reflective clothing, a hardhat, and safety boots. Always follow flaggers' instructions and be mindful of construction area road signs.

Don't tailgate. Give yourself room to stop in a hurry, should you need to. Rear-end collisions are the most common kind of work zone crashes.

Allow extra time. Road construction can slow things down. Count on it, and plan for it.

Roadside safety also extends to complying with the state's Move Over/Slow Down law that requires drivers to move over a lane or reduce their speed to 20 mph below the posted speed limit when approaching a TxDOT vehicle, emergency vehicle, law enforcement, tow truck or utility vehicle stopped with flashing lights activated on the roadside.

Traffic fines double in work zones when workers are present and can cost up to \$2,000. Failure to heed the Move Over/Slow Down law also can result in a fine up to \$2,000.

"Be Safe. Drive Smart." is a key component of #EndTheStreakTX, a broader social media and wordof-mouth effort that encourages drivers to make safer choices while behind the wheel such as wearing a seat belt, driving the speed limit, never texting and driving, and never driving under the influence of alcohol or other drugs. Nov. 7, 2000 was the last deathless day on Texas roadways. #EndTheStreakTX asks all Texans to commit to driving safely to help end the streak of daily deaths.

All roadway safety professionals are encouraged to wear orange on April 13 for National Go Orange Day to proudly show their support of work zone safety.

## Voter registration deadline is today

7 to register to vote in the May 7 election for two statewide constitutional amendments and one local contested city council race.

First-time Texas voters may complete the registration process through the state or the county voter registrar. Those eligible to cast a ballot this spring include U.S. citizens who will be 18 years old or older as of election day, and who are not convicted felons or legally mentally incapacitated.

"In the upcoming May 7 election, every Texas voter will have the opportunity to vote on two proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution concerning property taxes, and many Texas voters will also be voting on mayoral, city council and school board candidates as well as local propositions," Texas Secretary tion will be needed.

Gregg and Upshur county residents have until April of State John Scott said in a statement. "I encourage every eligible Texas voter to not only get registered by April 7th, but to educate yourself on the candidates and measures that will appear on your ballot."

All Texas voters will have the chance to weigh in on Proposition 1, which would provide additional property tax cuts to elderly and disabled homeowners, and Proposition 2, which would raise the school district homestead exemption on property taxes.

One Gladewater City Council seat is contested with newcomers Teddy Sorrells and Jacob Garland seeking the Place 4 seat. Scott Owens is unopposed for mayor and Michael Webber and Brandy Flanagan are unopposed for the Place 2 and 3 seats.

## Local men indicted on drug charges

The Upshur County Grand Jury recently returned 21 indictments, with the 10 sealed ones including one for "accident involving death," said District Attorney Billy Byrd.

Defendants, charges, and bond information in the open indictments returned March 24 in Gilmer were as follows, Byrd's office said Friday:

- Robert Leroy Worthington, 54, of Gladewater, possession of controlled substance (methamphetamine) last Aug. 19, \$10,000 bond
- Ronald Wayne Smith Jr., 47, of Gladewater, possession of controlled substance (methamphetamine) last June 7, \$25,000
- Kelly Leigh Williamson, 42, of Big Sandy, driving while intoxicated; subsequent offense--repeat offender on Jan. 31, \$10,000
- Michael Colton Barnes, 29, of Diana, driving while intoxicated--subsequent offense last Oct. 27, \$25,000
- Brian Ray Christall, 38, of Diana, driving while intoxicated--subsequent offense last Oct. 23, \$25,000
- Staci Giddens Howie, 47, of Dallas, driving while intoxicated--subsequent offense Jan. 30, \$10,000
- Dominique Xavier Buchanan, 33, of Gilmer, assault/family violence with previous conviction--habitual offender last Nov. 28. Although bond was set at \$25,000, he remained in county jail at Gilmer under a "blue warrant" alleging he violated parole.
- Christopher Dean Robertson, 35, of Gilmer, criminal mischief last Sept. 1. He also remained in county jail under \$100,000 bond.

Amanda Brooke McGowan, 37, of Chandler, possession of controlled substance with intent to deliver (methamphetamine) on March 5, 2020, \$10,000

- Ryan Tilton Rogers, 30, of Gilmer, possession of controlled substance (methamphetamine) on April 18, 2020, \$25,000
- William Wade Lanius, 38, of Tatum, possession of controlled substance (methamphetamine) on Sept. 8, 2020, \$15,000

Identity of anyone named in the sealed indictments was not disclosed since no arrest had been made in those cases, Byrd said.

Besides the aforementioned accident case, those indictments included two for assault/family violence--occlusion and a single indictment on two counts of online solicitation of a minor under 14.

The other sealed indictments included one each for "theft--aggregation of amounts (of) \$2,500 or more but less than \$30,000," aggravated assault with deadly weapon, criminal mischief, tampering with oil and gas wells and associated equipment, possession of controlled subtance (heroin) and possession of controlled substance (methamphetamine.)

## Upshur County local disaster declaration extended

Upshur County Commissioners Court on Tuesday of last week heard various county officials discuss ongoing disaster relief efforts in the county in the wake of the March 21 rural tornado which caused massive damage and several injuries, but no known deaths.

The court, meeting in special session at Gilmer, also voted to ratify and indefinitely extend County Judge Todd Tefteller's "local disaster declaration," which on March 22 activated the county's emergency management plan. Tefteller said the order also keeps the county eligible for governmental

The court heard from county Emergency Management Coordinator Marc Nichols, county Road Administrator Andy Jordan, Sheriff Larry Webb and County Extension Agent Julie York concerning efforts to help those impacted

Nichols said that all of those injured he knew of were either in stable con-

diton or released from medical treatment. One person who was in intensive care was now stable and should be released from a hospital, he added.

Most of those left homeless by the storm had somewhere to go and an emergency shelter which opened the night of the tornado had no takers, he noted. In addition, the county's emergency plan "flowed as well as could be" and the fact no deaths occurred was "amazing," Nichols said.

Marion County Judge Leward LaFleur, who said an area 30 miles from Jefferson was belted in his county and praised the cooperation between the two counties' emergency management coordinators and sheriff's offices, added, "It is nothing short of a miracle from God himself that nobody was killed in this destruction."

Nichols said the National Weather Service had identified 199 structures which were damaged, but that 70 homes have been inaccessible and are still being evaluated. The F2 tornado totally destroyed 20 homes while

## Deadline nears to register for elections

Eligible Texas voters who have not done so already have until April 7 to register to vote in the May 7 statewide constitutional amendment election, as well as any local elections for city, school districts and other local entities.

"In the upcoming May 7 election, every Texas voter will have the opportunity to vote on two proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution concerning property taxes, and many Texas voters will also be voting on mayoral, city council and school board candidates, as well as local propositions," John Scott, secretary of state, said.

Both propositions deal with property taxes. The first reduces the total amount of property tax imposed on elderly or disable persons. The second increases the homestead exemption on school taxes from \$25,000 to \$40,000.

Early voting begins on April 25 and runs through May 3.

Texans also will have the opportunity to return to the polls on May 24 for the primary runoff election. Early voting begins on May 16 and ends May 20.

Runoffs are slated in the GOP race for attorney general and railroad commission, the Democratic contest for lieutenant governor and land commissioner, and county and district races.

Voters who participated in one party's primary in March can't cross over and vote in the other party's runoff election. However, persons who did not vote in the March 1 primary can vote in either party's runoff. Anyone with questions about voting eligibility should contact their county's election administrator or the secretary of state's office.

## Wildfire danger continues in much of state

The risk of wildfire across the state continues through this week. During the last week of March, state, federal and local firefighters responded to 192 wildfires that burned more than 173,000 acres, according to the Texas A&M Forest Service.

More than 500 firefighters from the service and through the Texas Intrastate Fire Mutual Aid System have been deployed across Texas, as well as personnel from 28 states.

We want to ensure that the state has adequate resources to protect Texas' citizens and natural resources from wildfire," Wes Moorehead, forest service chief, said. "We are working with other states to mobilize additional fire resources to Texas for assistance."

The highest risk of fire danger continues to be in West Texas and the Panhandle, according to the forest service.

## Schools saved from funding cuts

Public school districts will not lose funding because of low attendance rates caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Texas Education Agency and Gov. Greg Abbott announced last week. Funding will be made available to school systems in Texas who normally would have had funding cut, since it is based on attendance rates.

"Providing this adjustment to the 2021-22 school year will ensure school systems have the funding they need to retain the best and brightest teachers and provide quality education to all public-school students across Texas," Abbott said. "We have made tremendous strides to return more of our students back to the classroom and will continue in our efforts to do so."

Texas public schools are funded based on the number of students enrolled and their daily attendance. Currently, schools get a base allotment of \$6,160 per student annually. The average daily attendance is calculated by total students present divided the required days of instruction.

During the pandemic, attendance dipped. The state will once again allow district to toss out low attendance days to increase the average daily attendance and not lose funding.

## Teachers protest unpaid trainings

Texas teachers are rebelling against a new law that requires those who teach grades K-3 to complete unpaid a 60- to 120hour course known as Reading Academies in order to keep their jobs next year. The law, originally passed in 2019, set a deadline for completing the course by the end of the 2022-2023 school year, according to a report in the Houston Chronicle. Most teachers aren't compensated for their time taking the course, though some districts offer stipends.

The added pressures of teaching online during the pandemic have exacerbated a teacher shortage that spurred the Texas Education Agency to recently form a task force to address the situation. From 2010 to 2019, the number of certified teachers in the state fell by about 20%, according to a study by the University of Houston.

## Petrodollar Paranoia

Recently, there has been much focus on the "petrodollar" and whether it will continue as the currency of choice in the away from it, a move that some worry will end the dollar's



dominance in world markets; others seem to think it would be the end of life as know it. Let me put your mind at ease.

Petrodollars are not a separate currency. Simply defined, they are crude oil export revenues denominated in US dollars. The universal use of petrodollars in oil sales began in the 1970s, when the United States and Saudi Arabia agreed to standardize oil prices in dol-

lars as part of the overall transition away from gold. There were certainly political maneuverings, but the dollar was essentially chosen because it was (and remains) the most widely accepted currency for global transactions.

As to mechanics, oil-producing countries exchange crude for dollar-denominated assets which they then recycle into purchases on international markets. For the US, the demand for dollars increases, which is normally beneficial because it helps promote non-inflationary growth, liquidity, and lower interest rates. Conversely, it is not at all uncommon to have policies which deliberately weaken the dollar, which makes domestic goods more competitive.

If petrodollar transactions decline, the fear is that a chain reaction could ensue. India is reportedly consideroil market. China and Saudi Arabia have discussed shifting ing buying oil from Russia at discounted prices using the Chinese yuan. Other countries are exploring alternatives to the dollar due to US sanctions on Russia, which caused significant economic disruption. Some advocate a basket of currencies; others want to go the crypto route.

> Some fret that such a move could end the dollar's popularity and stability. However, it's likely much ado about nothing (or not much). While petrodollars are certainly not insignificant, the dollar remains the world's most desirable currency for multiple reasons.

> The dollar is backed by the world's largest and most stable economy and independently managed by a highly competent monetary authority. In times of crisis and uncertainty, investors and nations alike flock to it. In addition to currency reserves, US treasury bills and notes provide the best vehicle to protect assets. In fact, the dollar comprises over half of all known central bank reserves and undergirds the entire world economy. Moreover, in millions of financial calculations that occur daily, US bonds are the definition of a "risk-free asset" for assured repayment.

> The dominance of the dollar in global exchange is positive for the US economy, facilitating faster growth with less inflation. If that truly ended, there would certainly be notable fallout. However, even though petrodollars are substantial, the primary source of demand for the dollar remains its stability and security.

36, minor damage to 97, and "unaffected damage" (such as blown-off shingles or a broken window) to 22, he said. Starting at Evergreen Road

Relief workers have since been running "non-stop," he added, noting that volunteer groups have assisted and donations have been received. A "one-stop" facility for storm victims has been established at the Yamboree Event Center located near Walmart, and those needing housing or other help can go there or contact Nichols at 903-240-3574. Continued from Page 1 nings Baptist Church in Gilmer initially allowed its facility to house relief efforts and agreed to organize volunteer groups. "I can't thank them enough" as that "worked out real well to keep everything in one spot," he said.

> Those needing assistance can go to that congregation's website and list what they need, Nichols added.

The court also heard about potential expenses it might bear as a result of the storm.

For the county to qualify for state aid, Nichols said, at least 25 homes must have been uninsured or underinsured with a damage evaluation of at least \$170,000, and "we met that (last) Tuesday," Nichols told the court. If the damage statewide from storms that day was not at least \$47 million, however, "it will be considered a local disaster" (requiring the county to pay related expenses), he warned.

County Auditor Connie Williams said 16 counties were impacted by storms, but the chances that total damage would reach \$47 million were "low," so "more than likely, it's gonna be county expense."

The county is incurring costs, such as paying contractors to help remove trees, but "we're lucky that we have the money available" to help any storm victims needing it, she said. Tefteller said he wanted to use already-approved federal grant funds

Jordan, discussing the county Road and Bridge Department's cleanup efforts in the storm's wake, said his and contracted crews were still running and that he planned to finish cleaning up county right-of-ways and county easement areas by Friday. He also said all county roads are now passable.

"My guys have done an absolutely wonderful job," he said, expressing appreciation. Some of the roads which had been blocked by fallen trees included Evergreen, Bobwhite, Bob-o-Link, Bluebird, Snapdragon, Periwinkle and Sweet William.

"At this moment, we have everything we need," Jordan said. Webb said most of the per-

sonnel in the law enforcement division of his office were out dealing with barricades in the Ore City area, and that a SWAT team from Longview came to assist. "Everybody did a great job" responding to citizens who were trapped in their homes, he added, noting he personally helped field the approximately 57 calls his office received from those needing help.

Some were trapped in their vehicles, and some vehicles struck trees, Webb added.

Personnel had to get through downed trees and felled power lines to help those who were stranded, the sheriff said, and Jordan praised Upshur Rural Electric Cooperative for cutting off and restoring power in connection with relief efforts.

York said the non-profit Animal Investigation and Rescue Organization had established shelter at the Yamboree livestock grounds for animals displaced by the storm. She said she believed 31 dogs, including some puppies born after the tornado, and one cat had come through, and that some of the animals have been re-united with their owners.

She said perhaps about 12-13 dogs remained at the location. The organization has a website and Facebook page, she added. York said a female friend of hers had her dog torn from her grasp and it landed in her pasture.





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
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## **GHS** boys netters win district title
