Tanner Gothard, 2022 Valedictorian at Gladewater High School, will lead his fellow graduates to the next step of life's journey.



## Our choice ...

I wonder if someone put a flag on my Daddy's grave in Corsicana on Memorial Day. I wonder how many parents, wives and children observed Memorial Day in a way I will never be able to comprehend. A day that is filled with more heartache than anything else.

My Dad came back from serving in World War II to build a life, raise a family and enlarge a ranch.

He came back.

Dad lived his life shaped by the experiences of war which he never shared except to cry when he remembered a lost friend or to tell a funny story.

Many who serve in combat bear a burden of silence.

That silence can sometimes strangle their lives.

Jim and I have a dear friend who was what was called a 'tunnel rat' during the Vietnam War. The North Vietnamese army built mazes of tunnels through which they moved soldiers, supplies and subversives. As our friend explained, "sometimes we had to clean them out."

Can you imagine going into a small dark hole prepared for hand-to-hand combat not knowing what you are going to encounter? In the dark. Alone.

One long night of a press reception we visited. He enjoyed a bottle of wine as we talked. I, always curious, always interested, asked questions about his war years.

Maybe I shouldn't have done that. It was the first time in 30 years he had really shared his memories. Some were so dark they took my breath and my curiosity away.

His wife wasn't there. But a year later when we got together for dinner at the Tower of the Americas in San Antonio she leaned into me and said that my questions and his willingness to answer opened the floodgates allowing for some healing.

I hope so. I dearly hope so.

We grow up on movies that either glorify or condemn war. The truth is that sometimes it is just necessary. Necessary for people like GHS alum '63 James Mohon to serve. It was the Vietnam War. There was a draft. He was called. He went. The former Army medic told me at Monday's Memorial



Day Observance that he "wasn't a hero, that was just what you did then".

I think it is pretty heroic to serve period. Anywhere. At anytime.

I once had a good looking senior at White Oak who was a bit of a 'lost boy'. He joined the Marines and became more than a man. His mom was convinced he was stationed on a ship in the Mediterranean and was safe. When he eventually came to see me in his dress uniform and I saw the three layers of combat ribbons and medals I knew that he hadn't been on any ship, at least not for very long. His eyes told the tale as well as the multitude of medals.

The world today seems to do a much better job of respecting our military personnel than when I was growing up. One of my dear friends who is a Vietnam vet told me of being spit upon and called a 'baby killer' when he came back home. He arrived in Vietnam in the middle of a fire fight. He was a kid. He was scared. He survived. He came home to jeers and disrespect. He spent the rest of his working life serving the children of a local school district. I am proud to call him my friend.

We live in a very dangerous world. We now have a professional military where individuals choose to serve. Some choose to die. For their buddies, for their beliefs, for people they have little in common with. Some don't get to choose at all.

We have a choice. We have the opportunity to choose how we serve the families of the fallen and those who have served. We must remember to do more than respect those who serve. We must, as GEDCO's Robert Johnson urged in Monday's Memorial Day speech, ensure that our military personnel have the health care, resources and employment they need once their job of protecting American interests is ended.

We have an obligation to make sure this happens. It should be our privilege.

## Double Whammy!

The Advanced Research Projects Agency for Health ("ARPA-H") was recently established as a new federal agency with the mission of transforming health research and innovation. The concept is similar to that of the



Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency (DARPA), which has fostered countless breakthrough discoveries

tion and Research Institute of Texas (CPRIT). Taxpayers have twice voted overwhelmingly to support CPRIT, providing about \$6 billion in funding for cancer research and screening (more than any entity other than the federal government). As a result, hundreds of leading scholars have flocked to the state. The primary objective is improving health outcomes, and there has been impressive progress. The activity also generates economic benefits which my firm has been measuring for years. In 2021, we estimated that for every \$1 in funding, CPRIT operations, prevention/screening, and research programs generated \$66.87 in state economic output. Texas would be an excellent location for ARPA-H, and I am pleased to be part of a coalition seeking to make that happen. In addition to the CPRIT commitment and success, the state has a long list of advantages -- worldclass health care institutions, research organizations, universities, national laboratories, and medical schools. The world's largest medical center and the nation's largest military medical complex are also in Texas. A large, growing, and diverse population and tens of thousands of graduates in key fields every year provide the requisite sustainable workforce. A culture of innovation and a regulatory environment conducive to getting things done are Texas hallmarks. I could go on...and on...and on. A bold move of this magnitude requires a setting where ARPA-H can thrive and successfully fulfill its mission, with the necessary support to enhance its effectiveness. The ultimate location will vault ahead in biomedical technology and related fields. The world desperately needs this initiative, and Texas can make it happen.



#### Wildfires continue across state

Firefighters are looking to the skies for much-needed rain this week as crews continue battling wildfires across the state. Fires reported Sunday by the Texas A&M Forest Service were being fought in Brown, Taylor, Wilbarger, Llano, Schleicher and San Saba counties.

"Minimal rainfall, hot and dry conditions and an intensifying drought continue to support wildfire activity across the state," said Wes Moorehead, TFS fire chief. "Due to conditions, these wildfires are requiring more time and resources to contain. Texas A&M Forest Service continues to support local fire departments and has situated additional resources to the areas of concern."

Burn bans are in effect in 131 counties, covering nearly all regions of the state with the exception of East Texas.

#### More teachers added to task force

The Texas Education Agency added 24 more teachers to the Teacher Vacancy Task Force formed in March, bringing the number of teachers to 26 — the same number as administrators originally chosen. TEA drew criticism when it announced the original task force, with just two teachers selected.

"Teachers are the single most important school-based factor affecting student outcomes," said Mike Morath, Texas education commissioner. "And the Teacher Vacancy Task Force will further ensure our ability to provide the best guidance, support, and resources to help schools find and retain the teachers they need for all their students. Having these two-dozen additional perspectives from a diverse and talented pool of Texas classroom teachers is going to immensely benefit the important considerations before the Task Force."

Public school systems both large and small across the state are facing a severe staffing shortage, exacerbated by a flood of retirements and resignations during the COVID-19 pandemic. The task force hopes to develop strategies for addressing the problem.

#### 'Click It or Ticket' campaign underway

Buckling up is always a wise idea, but not doing so could cost drivers a ticket as the Texas Department of Transportation conducts its 20th annual "Click It or Ticket" campaign with enhanced enforcement statewide.

"Since its launch in 2002, the Texas Click It or Ticket campaign has saved nearly 7,000 lives," said TxDOT Executive Director Marc Williams. "We're proud of the work we've done over the decades and the countless hours put in by our law enforcement partners. But there are still far too many preventable deaths on Texas roads."

Texas officers and deputies will step up enforcement of the state's seat belt and child car-seat laws for the next two weeks. Texas law requires everyone in a vehicle to be properly restrained. Children under the age of 8 must be in a child-safety seat unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches. If a child is not secured, the driver faces fines up to \$250.



(and is about the coolest place on earth). ARPA-H is charged with finding solutions to society's most challenging health crises, including cancer, Alzheimer's, and AIDS. Moreover, treatments are to be broadly accessible to improve outcomes across the

globe while simultaneously containing medical costs.

Federal funding for basic research can be decisive in conquering the most difficult diseases and other challenges (as a polio survivor, I am acutely aware). While private sector resources are essential, publicly funded research can be more broad based and promote more creative thought in many arenas, thus complementing corporate efforts which must focus on market-based programs.

ARPA-H would support promising projects across a spectrum of disciplines which may help us better understand and solve critical health issues. Whether in a university lab or a private institution, the multifaceted approach can accelerate discoveries and their implementation.

Texas has provided a prototype -- the Cancer Preven-

#### Tree-killing insect confirmed in Dallas County

The presence of the emerald ash borer (EAB) was confirmed last week in Dallas County. The county has been added to the list of Texas places under quarantine to slow the spread of the insect.

"EAB is a destructive, non-native wood-boring pest of ash trees," said Allen Smith, Texas A&M Forest Service regional Forest health coordinator. "Since 2018, we have deployed nearly 500 traps across Central, East and North Texas annually watching for the insect's presence and movement."

Native to Asia, the aggressive pest has killed millions of ash trees since entering the country 20 years ago. In Texas, it has been confirmed in Harrison, Bowie, Cass, Dallas, Denton, Marion, Parker and Tarrant counties.

Texas A&M Forest Service works with communities under state quarantines restricting the movement of wood into and out of impacted areas.

#### TDI data breach exposes personal data

A state audit released last week reported a breach of personal information of 1.8 million workers who filed claims with the Texas Department of Insurance. The department said the personal information included Social Security numbers, addresses, dates of birth and other personal information.



#### GOOD NEWS

Often newspapers and news programs only report the bad, ugly side of life. We hear the phrase that "*No news is good news*." One expert even said, "*The real news is bad news*!" While the bad news grabs most of the headlines and sound bites, and some do believe that the real news is bad news, good news is very welcome I'm happy to report, of at least one exception to that gloomy sort of thinking. There has never been better news than that. The guilt and condemnation sin brings can now be removed, i.e. God will forgive us. Thus, through Christ's sacrifice, lost men and women can have the promise of the forgiveness of sins, having their sins washed away by Christ's blood (Rev. 1: 5; Acts 22: 16), and that is "GOOD NEWS!"

Without Christ there is no salvation, because He is the only avenue to the Father (*Jn. 14:* 6). That is why the gospel is the "*power of God to salvation to everyone who believes*" (*Rom. 1: 16*). Of course, incorporated in "*believes*" is obedience (*2 Thess. 1: 8*).

While the news is composed of the good, the bad, and the ugly, and there's plenty of the bad and the ugly in your newspapers and on the news casts, but let's not forget the good news (the gospel), yea, the great news in your Bible. Don't miss it. Please read it, and please obey it, while you have the opportunity. The burden of sin can now be removed (*Matt. 11: 28-30*). "Arise and be baptized, and wash away your sins" (*Rev. 1: 5; Acts 22: 16*). The gospel is all about redemption, forgiveness, justification, reconciliation, and pardon, and Jesus is the summation of them all! Think on these things.

The council also approved the following:

Approved a resolution regarding the 2022 TxDOT Airport Layout Plan Project.

• Approved a resolution authorizing application for financial assistance from the Texas Water Development Board for sewer system improvements

• Approved a resolution directing publication of notice of intention to issue combination tax and surplus revenue certificates of obligation to the Texas Water Development Board to provide funds for water system improvement projects; and resolving other matters relating to the subject.

• Approved a resolution authorizing the submittal of one or more applications to the Texas Division of Emergency Management, authorizing the Mayor and City Manager to act as the City's authorized representative in all matters pertaining to the application, and committing matching funds

• Approved a blanket permit for Juneteenth Festival to be held on Saturday, June 18th from 10 a.m.-3 p.m. at Bumblebee Park

Following executive session the council accepted the city treasurer's resignation. She is leaving for another job with a non-profit ministry based organization.

The council took no action ongoing action concerning Union Pacific land and the city's hopes of purchasing the land instead of leasing and legal matters pertaining to David Wallace d/b/a D.E.W. Plans & Designs v. City of Gladewater, Upshur County, District Court, Cause Number 562-21.

## *'Mind Polluters' to be discussed*

"The Mind Polluters," a film about controversial books and materials in schools, will be presented by a political women's organization Friday night at the Barbwire Halo Cowboy Church outside Gilmer.

Admission is free to the 6 p.m. showing, sponsored by outgoing Upshur County Republican Party Chairman De'Borah Deaz and the organization she serves as president, Republican Women of Upshur County. A free meal will be served at the church at 6761 Texas Hwy. 154 west of the city, Deaz said.

"The Mind Polluters exposes the dark realities of the international grooming of children into a worldview at odds with the Christian faith, a worldview of rampant sexuality, homosexuality and transgenderism," said an emailed flyer promoting the film.

"It will open your eyes to the need of more parental involvement in our schools," said Deaz of the approximately one hour, 45-minute movie produced by Fearless Productions.

Also at Friday's showing, Texas Freedom Coalition founder/president Christine Bentley will discuss "efforts to remove obscene books and materials from Texas schools," the flyer said.

Bentley opposes incumbent Rhonda Anderson for the Senate District 1 committeewoman seat on the State Republican Executive Committee, an election to be decided by the state GOP convention.

Another guest speaker Friday will be SREC Senate District 12 committeewoman Jill Glover, who is unopposed for re-election and chairs SREC's Legislative Priorities Committee, said Deaz.

The complimentary dinner will include chicken broccoli spaghetti, salad, guacamole, chips, blonde and chocolate brownies, and non-alcoholic beverages.


#### Class of 1977 hosting 45th Reunion

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

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the City Council of the City of Gladewater, Texas, at its meeting to commence at 6:00 P.M. on August 18, 2022, at City Hall, 519 E. Broadway, Gladewater, Texas, tentatively proposes to adopt an ordinance authorizing the issuance of interest bearing certificates of obligation, in one or more series, in an amount not to exceed \$2,800,000 for paying all or a portion of the City's contractual obligations incurred in connection with (i) acquiring, constructing, installing, and equipping additions, improvements, extensions, and equipment for the City's water system, including repairs, rehabilitation and/or improvements to water treatment plant, storage facilities, water lines, and related infrastructure improvements, and asset management plan; and (ii) legal, fiscal and engineering fees in connection with such projects. The maximum interest rate for the certificates may not exceed the maximum legal interest rate. The maximum maturity date for the certificates is August 15, 2052. The estimated combined principal and interest required to pay the certificates to be authorized on time and in full is \$3,951,225. The current principal of all outstanding debt obligations of the City is \$13,713,000. The current combined principal and interest required to pay all outstanding debt obligations of the City on time and in full is \$17,969,654. The City proposes to provide for the payment of such certificates of obligation from the levy and collection of ad valorem taxes in the City as provided by law and from a pledge of surplus revenues of the City's waterworks and sewer system, remaining after payment of all operation and maintenance expenses thereof, and all debt service, reserve, and other requirements in connection with all of the City's revenue bonds or other obligations (now or hereafter outstanding), which are payable from all or any part of the net revenues of the City's waterworks and sewer system. The certificates of obligation are to be issued, and this notice is given, under and pursuant to the provisions of V.T.C.A., Local Government Code, Subchapter C of Chapter 271.

## **Retaliation nets man 99-year sentence**

A jury in Gilmer sentenced Charles Lance Taylor, who had seven prior felony convictions, to 99 years in prison last week after convicting him of retaliation against a witness, said Upshur County District Attorney Billy Byrd.

Taylor, 45, of Lone Star, was convicted May 17 of threatening to kill a woman for filing

an assault charge against him in Morris County, Byrd said. The defendant had also assaulted her "many times that went unreported" in Upshur County, the district attorney added. Taylor, who pleaded not guilty before testifying in 115th



District Court, was accused of making the threat in a Jan. 12, 2021 phone call to her in Upshur County, Byrd said. Taylor, represented by Longview attorney Val Jones, contended he "never threatened her, just harassed her," the prosecutor added..

Due to Taylor's prior record of felonies (he also had four misdemeanor convictions), his sentence was "enhanced" from the normal punishment range for the offense, Byrd said in a news release. The defendant's criminal record dated back to the late 1990s, and the enhanced punishment range was 25 to 99 years or life in prison, the prosecutor said. start

Taylor had been placed on four years probation in Morris County last Nov. 1 for the June 23, 2020 assault, Byrd said.

The defendant broke into the Lone Star home of the victim, who he formerly dated, "and began assaulting her and strangling her," the prosecutor said. "The assault was so bad, it required the victim to be hospitalized for a brain bleed."

On Sept. 17, 2020, the Morris County Grand Jury indicted Taylor on an assault charge which was still pending against him when he phoned the victim Jan. 12, 2021, Byrd added,

"In addition to the victim's testimony, the state was able to prove a series of text messages and recorded phone calls where the defendant was making threats against her," the prosecutor wrote.

"I want to extend my appreciation to the (7-woman, 5-man) jury. They had to listen (to) and see extremely vile and reprehensible statements from the defendant," Byrd said. "In addition, they saw clearly how dangerous thIs defendant was. He had previously attacked another woman in 2015 inside Smith County, threatening to slice her throat and run over that victim with her own car."

While the defense sought the minimum sentence, said Byrd, he told jurors "prisons were built for people like" Taylor, and urged they "make sure he's there long enough to not hurt anyone else."

The jury deliberated 30 minutes on the verdict, and 45 minutes late that night on the sentence, the prosecutor said. "An extremely dangerous man was convicted and removed from our streets this week," Byrd said in a news release. "The victim demonstrated great courage by finally coming forward.

## Economist Perryman speaks to biz leaders

Noted economist M. Ray Perryman told an area organization's business summit in Gilmer last week that Upshur County will probably establish a hospital or 24-hour emergency room "when you get enough population to support it."

That was among numerous economic-related topics which Perryman, whose column appears in The Gladewater Mirror, addressed in his 85-minute presentation as keynote speaker at the Upshur Area Business Rountable's meeting. Dozens attended the event at the Gilmer Civic Center.

Perryman, an Odessa resident and chief executive officer of The Perryman Group in Waco, discussed the current soaring inflation, saying it is caused by "too much money chasing too few goods" from the supply chain.

He blamed that on the fact that "people got a little extra money and they've been cooped up for a year and a half" due to COVID, so they spend too much on too few available items.

The nation will have "long-term inflation" for spending \$3 trillion, "but that was the price we had to pay," Perryman said. Still, he said, the nation won't have the double-digit long-term inflation it had in the 1980s, which was "institutionalized."

"This is not an institionalized inflation. This is a bunch of weird stuff happening at once," he explained. Since oil is in plastics, cosmetics and pharmaceuticals, oil prices rising "ratches up" through the entire economy, he said.

"We're making very steady progress" on the supply chain problem, the economist maintained, but predicted it will last six months. He said the problems include inability to obtain grain from Russia and Ukraine, problems in the oil industry, and shutdowns in China.

"We buy a lot of inputs" which the nation couldn't get into ports, Perryman noted. He added, however, that while computer chips are now made overseas and thus don't come in cars or refrigerators, three chip plants are planned in America and "this area is in a good position to capitalize on those."

While he said the federal government had to spend considerable money during the COVID pandemic to prevent people from starving and businesses from vanishing, "my problem is" that \$1 trillion was spent during 11 years of expansion. Thus, many people received a governmental check they didn't need for child care, he asserted. He projected the Longview statistical area's employment rate will grow about two percent in the next five years, and said Upshur is doing better than other places in the area, although many of its residents are driving elsewhere to work.

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
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# Tree-killing insect confirmed in Dallas

COLLEGE STATION — The presence of the invasive emerald ash borer (EAB) was confirmed this week in Dallas County. Dallas County will be added to the list of Texas jurisdictions under quarantine by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA). TDA quarantines are designed to slow the spread of the insect by limiting the transportation of ash wood, wood waste and hardwood firewood.

On May 12, Texas A&M Forest Service collected an adult beetle specimen in the Carrollton/Coppell area and tentatively identified it as being EAB. The beetle was collected in an EAB trap that is part of a state monitoring program run by Texas A&M Forest Service each year.

"EAB is a destructive, non-native woodboring pest of ash trees," said Allen Smith, Texas A&M Forest Service Regional Forest Health Coordinator. "Since 2018, we have deployed nearly 500 traps across Central, East and North Texas annually watching for the insect's presence and movement."

The specimen was sent to the USDA Department Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) national lab for confirmation and tested positive as EAB.

The aggressive pest is a significant threat to urban, suburban and rural forests," said Smith. "Both healthy and unhealthy ash trees are susceptible to EAB attack and may die within two or three years after becoming infested. Ash trees have no natural resistance to the exotic insect. Without proper proactive measures, mortality can be 100 percent in heavily infested areas, so early detection could improve our chances to manage for the pest."

Native to Asia, forest health experts have been monitoring EAB movement across the United States since 2002. It has spread to more than half of the states in America, killing millions of ash trees. The beetle was first detected in Texas in 2016 in Harrison County in northeast Texas. Since then, EAB has been positively confirmed in Bowie, Cass, Dallas, Denton, Marion, Parker and Tarrant Counties.

After the initial specimen was collected, additional adult beetles were also trapped in central and southern areas of Dallas County.

Once the presence of EAB is confirmed in a county, TDA assumes regulatory responsibility which includes the establishment of quarantines. The state's mandatory quarantine by TDA, restricts movement of any woody ash material exiting the county or quarantined area.

"Because EAB is transported unintentionally on firewood and wood products, the quarantine helps slow the beetle's spread by restricting the movement of wood in and out of affected areas," said Smith.

Texas A&M Forest Service urban tree canopy inventories estimate that ash trees comprise approximately five percent of the Dallas/Fort Worth urban forest and approximately one percent of the standing inventory forests in East Texas.

"There is no known stop to this epidemic," said Smith. "But we can help communities minimize loss, diversify their tree species and contribute to the health and resiliency of their urban forests."

Texas A&M Forest Service works with communities on state quarantines of the movement of wood into and out of impacted areas. There are resources available to help affected communities identify signs of EAB infestation and can assist in making decisions about preventative measures they can take and how to handle tree management and removal.
