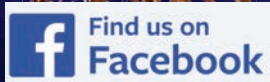

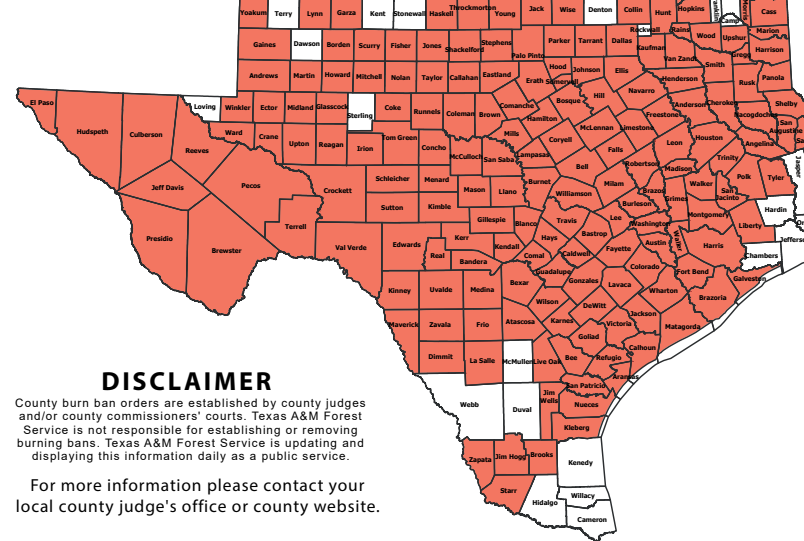

## Fire prevention needed

Did you know 50% of all wildfires in Texas come from 2 human causes...Debris burning & Equipment use.

Debris burning includes burn barrels, brush piles, bonfires, and the small piles of lawn debris in people's backyards. This is also the type of burning that is primarily restricted when burn bans are put in place by county governments.

Equipment use is a much broader category, and sometimes more difficult to understand. Any fire that is started by something mechanical is considered equipment use. This can include dragging tow chains on a trailer, wheel bearings overheating, mowing and shredding activities, parking or idling over dry grass, failed spark arresters on equipment, overheated or malfunctioning hay baling equipment, and even welding. Just to name a few of the most common equipment causes.

During the current drought conditions, please be mindful of all outdoor activities that could potentially create a spark and a wildfire, and obey local burn bans that have been put in place to protect us all.

## FIRE DANGER: Get help after the fire

Wildfires are unpredictable and there is no way to anticipate the severity with which they burn or the impact they will have to communities. In some instances, wildfires cause minimal damage, eliminating vegetative competition and helping to improve the conditions of ecosystems. Some wildfires, however, can cause extensive damage to an area where rehabilitation and additional efforts to prevent and mitigate any future problems is required.

Firefighters take measures to repair damages and minimize the environmental impacts resulting from

fire suppression activities. This work typically consists of repairing containment lines and knocking down berms constructed by hand or mechanized equipment and repairing roadways and trails as well as any staging areas, safety zones or drop points built and utilized by fire crews during response. The goal of suppression damage repairs is to stabilize the area and return it to as close to its natural state as possible.

## Commissioners want raise

Upshur County Commissioners Court is expected to vote on a proposed \$5,000 annual pay raise for court members and almost all other county elected officials Friday.

That is among 17 items on the agenda (counting the invocation and adjournment) for the public 10 a.m. meeting on the Upshur County Courthouse's third floor in Gilmer. The court is also to consider some action on the county budget, and extending or ending the rural outdoor burn ban which is set to expire at 6 p.m. Friday.

In other business, the court is scheduled to consider approving mileage reimbursements to commissioners when they use "their personal vehicles to check, inspect roads and visit with citizens about complaints."

The court will also consider reducing the number of temporary Road and Bridge Department workers, funded by a federal grant, from 12 to six.

## Two sentences handed down

115th District Judge Dean Fowler sentenced two men to lengthy prison terms in Gilmer on Monday after they pleaded guilty to unrelated felony charges.

Roland Charles Grabowski, 44, of Dallas, drew 45 years for failure to register as a sex offender. He was sentenced as a "repeat and habitual felony offender," Byrd wrote.

Thomas Boyd Murrell, 36, of Big Sandy, received concurrent 20-year terms for two counts of solicitation of a minor younger than 14 years of age. He pleaded guilty four days before sentencing in a case where he had wrongly thought he was communicating with a minor online.

## E. Mountain man gets two life sentences

A judge sentenced Nichlous Cole Williams to two concurrent life sentences last week when he pleaded guilty to murdering his grandfather and a woman in East Mountain last year.

Williams, 21, of East Mountain, was sentenced July 7 by 115th District Judge Dean Fowler in Gilmer, said Upshur County District Attorney Billy Byrd in a news release.

The defendant admitted the Feb. 7, 2021 shootings of Denene Susanne Mosely, 53, of Palm Coast, Fla., and Leonard Faris Gibson, 66, at Gibson's East Mountain home, said Byrd.

The district attorney gave this account of the slayings and subsequent events:

Williams had been at his grandfather's residence watching the Super Bowl when "an argument occurred" around halftime, resulting in the defendant taking a .380 caliber pistol from Gibson and shooting him, Byrd said.

Williams then turned the "pistol to" Mosely "and shot her inside the home, chasing her into the bedroom." He then left, crossed the street to a neighbor's residence, informed the neighbor what he had done, and gave him the pistol.

Upshur County sheriff's deputies arrived and investigated. Williams was arrested that day.

Byrd's office said that since more than one person was slain, Williams was indicted on two counts of capital murder, for which the only punishments in Texas are life imprisonment without parole or lethal injection. He was allowed to plead to the lesser charges of murder, however, in exchange for accepting two life terms, the office said.

Byrd represented the state at sentencing. Longview attorney Kevin Settles represented Williams, who waived his right to appeal, the prosecutor wrote.

Byrd said the sheriff's office's investigators "deserve much credit for this resolution" of the matter, which "brings final closure for the families" affected.

## Local sales tax revenue remains strong

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced last week he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$1.03 billion in local sales tax allocations for July, 15.3 percent more than in July 2021. These allocations are based on sales made in May by businesses that report tax monthly.

Gladewater continued to post strong growth - recording its 11th month in a row of positive sales tax numbers. Gladewater's sales tax revenue was 3.3-percent above last year's numbers for this time of year - \$106,527.68 compared to \$103,045.91 in 2021. For the year, Gladewater sets at 11.33-percent ahead of 2021 numbers - \$775,544.91 compared to \$696,602.05.

Clarksville City posted a 27.64-percent increase over 2021 - \$8,251.28 compared to \$6,464.26.

In June, state sales tax revenue totaled \$3.68 billion, 16.4 percent more than in June 2021. The majority of June sales tax revenue is based on sales made in May and remitted to the agency in June.

"State sales tax collections surged in June, outpacing inflation, with strong growth in receipts from all major economic sectors," Hegar said.

"The strongest growth was in sectors driven primarily by business spending, with receipts from the mining sector nearly doubling collections from last year, and with receipts from the manufacturing, wholesale trade and construction sectors also up sharply.

### TEA releases STAAR results for grades 3-8

The Texas Education Agency has released the 2022 State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness

Results for grades 3-8, which showed across-the-board improvements in all grades and subjects, with especially significant gains in reading.

"The investments that the state is making in reading academies and accelerated instruction are clearly paying dividends for our students, and the results are a testament to the hard work of teachers across our state," Texas Education Commissioner Mike Morath said. "While we still have much work to do to recover from COVID-related learning loss in mathematics, the improvements our students have made in reading are clear."

The spring results include exams in mathematics and reading for grades 3-8, 5th and 8th grade science, and 8th grade social studies.

### Military bases have big impact on state's economy

A study analyzing the impact on the state's economy from U.S. military installations concludes they contributed at least \$114.1 billion to the Texas economy last year and supported more than 600,000 jobs across the state. Texas is home to 15 military installations and the U.S. Army Futures Command, which is located in Austin and runs modernization projects for the U.S. Army.

The study was completed by the comptroller's office at the behest of the Texas Military Preparedness Commission.

"It is amazing to see the tremendous economic impact these military installations have in Texas," said Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar. "The importance of these bases reaches far beyond direct jobs and personal income. The facilities, and the men and women who work and are stationed at them, form the backbone of communities and support countless businesses and induced jobs throughout the state."

### Grant program to benefit travel industry

The travel industry, hard hit by the COVID-19 pandemic, is set to receive \$180 million of funds under a grant program funded by the federal American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. The program is designed to provide grants for the recovery of Texas businesses in the tourism, travel, and hospitality industry affected by the pandemic.

"Travel and tourism are critical components to both the state and local economies," said Gov. Greg Abbott. "Visitor spending at Texas destinations brings new money into communities and spurs local job creation across industries in every region of the state."

### Demographic center analyzes state census results

The U.S. Census Bureau has released its 2021 population estimates, and the Texas Demographic Center has crunched the numbers to determine:

- Texas is growing both older and more diverse. Median age increased to 35.4 years in 2021, up from 33.6 in 2010.
- Texas has more Black residents than any other state.
- All urban core counties in Texas, except for Travis County, lost non-Hispanic white population.
- The state has the third-largest Asian population in the country.
- Harris County has more Black residents than all other counties in the country except Cook County, which includes Chicago.

### Sharing the road with large trucks

Anyone who has driven the state's major highways recently likely has noticed the number of 18-wheelers on the road has risen as businesses and industries work to fill demand in many sectors. The Texas Department of Transportation is reminding motorists to take extra care when driving around big trucks.

Drivers are especially at risk in the state's energy sectors, according to TxDOT. Last year, more than 79,000 crashes occurred in the state's five major energy production areas, resulting in 1,119 deaths — a 20% increase over the previous year.

### An Initial Step Forward

After agreeing not to support any new fossil fuel investments with public dollars after 2022, the G-7 has backtracked and decided to facilitate development of liquefied natural gas (LNG) infrastructure. The G-7 provides a forum for leaders of the seven nations with the largest developed economies (as well as the European Union as a non-enumerated member) to discuss key issues and policies. Although this action is regarded as quite controversial by many, it's the right move at a critical time.



Essentially, by supporting the LNG infrastructure, the decision helps transition natural gas into a global market rather

than one controlled by the pipeline corridors on various continents. Natural gas can be liquified in places where it is plentiful (such as Texas), then shipped on tankers to be regasified for use in Asia, Europe, and other markets with insufficient supplies of their own.

The global LNG market has grown rapidly since its inception just a few years ago. In 2021, US LNG exports averaged 9.7 billion cubic feet per day, up 50% over 2020. Upon completion of planned projects along the gulf coast, export capacity will increase even further. China is one of the largest importers of US LNG, which is beneficial for reducing the reliance on coal, with South Korea being another major market.

From a geopolitical perspective, the G-7's action dilutes Russia's power over Europe through control of natural gas supplies. It can also help to even out pricing variations and meet pressing energy needs. LNG facilities are expensive, and using public resources to accelerate their development is both rational and essential.

While it's imperative to deal with the climate crisis, it's also crucial to be realistic about future energy requirements. In every scenario recently projected by the Energy Information Administration, oil and natural gas will be needed in greater quantities than today at least through 2050, even with the substantial deployment of renewables. Global economic growth is increasing demand, and developing economies require reliable power and affordable fuels in order to improve living standards and even subsist going forward.

The Russia invasion of Ukraine put an exclamation point on the incontrovertible fact that we cannot curtail the use of conventional fuels in the manner and at the pace that some might like. A key part of the solution to the very real climate dilemma is to responsibly deploy conventional fuels cleaner. Natural gas inherently involves low emissions, and also lends itself well to effective carbon capture.

Although the G-7 statement in support of LNG development is a step in the right direction and a "wake up call" regarding the economic and geopolitical realities confronting the world, it is but a first step in a long journey.

James 1: 25 says: *But whoso looks into the perfect law of liberty, and continues therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his deed.* Warren Wiersbe said: "Too many Christians mark their Bibles, but their Bibles never mark them." Friends, it is action, based on faith that ultimately counts. It is true that "to act on what you learn is all that really matters." Think on these things

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## Texas Drilling Permit and Completion Statistics for June

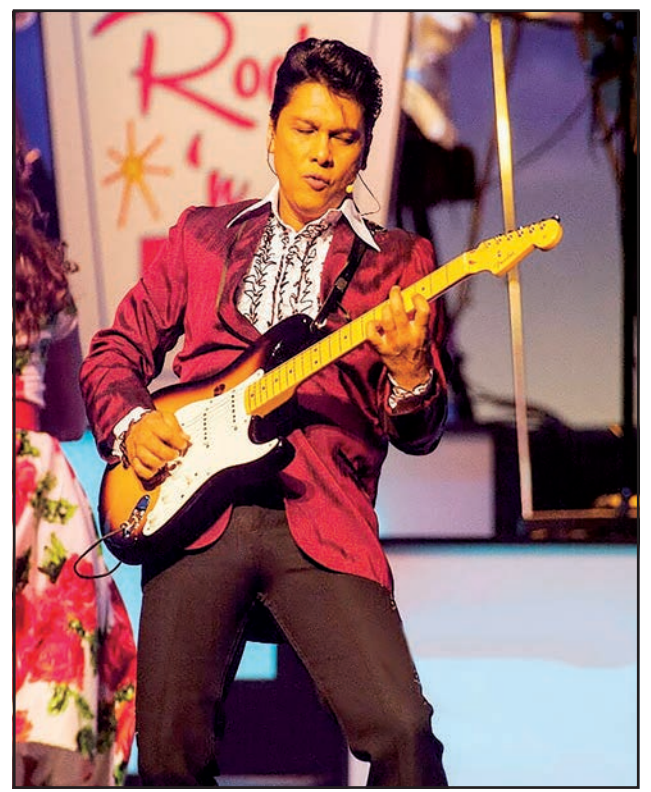
Railroad Commission of Texas issued a total of 1,146 original drilling permits in June 2022 compared to 739 in June 2021. The June 2022 total includes 1,013 permits to drill new oil or gas wells, 11 to re-enter plugged wellbores and five for re-completions of existing wellbores.

The breakdown of well types for original drilling permits in June 2022 is 263 oil, 113 gas, 726 oil or gas, 35 injection and nine other permits.

In June 2022, Commission staff processed 534 oil, 164 gas and 594 injection completions for new drills, re-entries and re-completions, compared to 507 oil, 158 gas and 128 injection completions in June 2021.

Total well completions processed for 2022 year-to-date for new drills, re-entries and re-completions are 5,804 compared to 4,385 recorded during the same period in 2021.

## Sting Ray Anthony In Gilmer

Do you remember saddle shoes and poodle skirts? How about jukeboxes and cars with fins?

Sting Ray Anthony does—although in the 1950s, he wasn't even a gleam in his father's eye yet.

But if you want to see the real thing, there is Sting Ray Anthony and his Juke Box Rock show.

For those who long to relive the 50s and 60s music of their own youth, and those who are discovering it for the first time, Anthony presents a legendary line-up of songs of the era.

"I've been very fortunate to help keep Ritchie's memory alive," says Anthony, "and play all kinds of rock and roll." Anthony has been able to meet and work with several performers of the era, and help introduce them to a new generation of fans.

## Appeals court upholds life sentence in Upshur

A state appeals court recently upheld the Upshur County conviction of a habitual criminal who received life imprisonment for assault/family violence --occlusion with previous conviction.

The 12th Court of Appeals in Tyler affirmed the 2021 conviction of Joshua David Verhoef, 40, said Upshur County District Attorney Billy Byrd.

Byrd's office said it showed Verhoef as having a White Oak address, but that the county jail's records showed his address as Gladewater.

Byrd said the 115th District Court jury in Gilmer, which convicted and sentenced the defendant, heard evidence he had more than 20 prior criminal convictions, "including many felonies." The district attorney said he requested the life term for the Aug. 20, 2020 crime.

Verhoef was convicted as a "habitual offender," a decision the appeals court upheld July 1, Byrd's office said. Verhoef represented himself in the April 21, 2021 trial, and pleaded not guilty, the prosecutor said.

The defendant was tried for "striking and choking his girl friend inside her home" in Union Grove while he was "high on methamphetamines," Byrd said in a press release.

"The victim (who recovered) was able to run to a neighbor's home and asked they call 911," Byrd continued. He said Upshur County sheriff's deputies and Texas Department of Public Safety troopers forcibly entered the victim's home to arrest Verhoef.

"The victim had several noticeable injuries, including marks on her neck, consistent with being choked and unable to breathe," Byrd added.

Verhoef's appellate attorney, Gilmer lawyer Dwight Brannon, "raised six points of error on appeal, mainly arguing the evidence was insufficient for the jury to find him guilty and also that the jury instruction (from 115th District Judge Dean Fowler) was flawed. All points of error raised were denied and overruled," Byrd wrote.



## Public invited to comment on transportation projects

AUSTIN – TxDOT is seeking public input on the draft 2023 Unified Transportation Program (UTP), the state's 10-year transportation plan. The UTP guides the development of projects around Texas to improve safety, address congestion and connectivity, and preserve roadways for Texas drivers. In addition to highway projects, the UTP addresses public transportation, maritime, aviation, rail, freight and international trade, and bicycle and pedestrian connectivity.

"The Unified Transportation Program is TxDOT's road map to developing projects across the state," said Executive Director Marc Williams. "It is important to work with our transportation partners and hear from the public to guide transportation improvements that address congestion and enhance safety across our state."

The public comment period for the draft 2023 UTP began Friday, July 8 and ends Monday, Aug. 8 at 4 p.m. (CST). Various methods to comment will be posted to the UTP Public Involvement webpage. The presentations and recordings for the previous public meeting and hearing will be available for viewing on the UTP Public Involvement webpage.

TxDOT works with its transportation partners to identify projects to be included in the UTP. Public comments and feedback are also very important in developing the plan. Available in English and Spanish, the UTP Fact Sheet can be found on the same TxDOT.gov webpage and provides an overview of the program. The Texas Transportation Commission approves the UTP in accordance with Texas state law every August during the commission meeting and publishes the approved UTP on TxDOT.gov.
