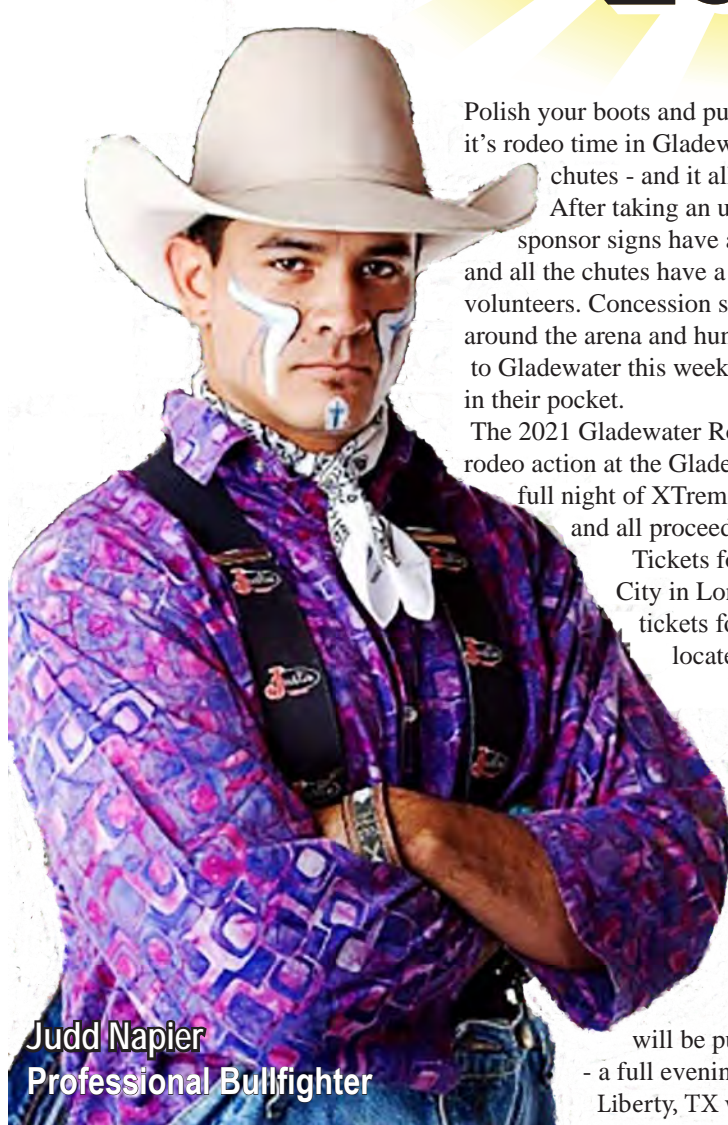

Polish your boots and pull that cowboy hat out of the closet - because **WE'RE BACK** and it's rodeo time in Gladewater - as the 84th Gladewater Round-Up Rodeo breaks out of the chutes - and it all starts today.

After taking an unexpected break last year due to COVID-19 health precautions, sponsor signs have again been hung at the Gladewater Round-Up Rodeo arena and all the chutes have a fresh coat of bright red paint courtesy of all the loyal rodeo volunteers. Concession stands have been loaded, vendors have set up their booths around the arena and hundreds of professional cowboys and cowgirls are on their way to Gladewater this week for four nights of fun and hopefully a nice paycheck tucked in their pocket.

The 2021 Gladewater Round-Up Rodeo is set to thrill you with four nights of top rodeo action at the Gladewater Rodeo Arena, starting Wednesday, June 9th with a full night of XTreme Bulls, followed by three nights of PRCA rodeo excitement Thursday, June 10th through Saturday, June 12th. Gates open nightly at 6 p.m., and all proceeds from the rodeo fund scholarships for area students.

Tickets for the 84th Gladewater Round-Up Rodeo are \$16 for adults / \$8 for kids (12 and under) and can be purchased in person at Cavender's Boot City in Longview or online at GladewaterRodeo.com. On Thursday, June 7th, the Gladewater Round-Up Rodeo will proudly offer special half-price tickets for members of the military and first responders who present a valid ID at the Rodeo Ticket Office. The Ticket Office on the rodeo grounds is located just north of Highway 80 on North Rodeo Street in Gladewater and will be open at 9 a.m. daily.

Registration for Kids Mutton Bustin' (5-7 years of age; under 50 pounds) went online only this year and participating children will receive one (1) free adult ticket for signing up. Mutton Bustin' starts at 7:45 p.m. nightly. And as usual - the Gladewater Round-Up Rodeo's nightly Calf Scramble will be free to kids in two age groups: 8 and Under and ages 9-12. No pre-registration is required so come on out and try to grab that ribbon off the calf's tail and win a big prize.

And a new highlight of the rodeo - back after a 30-year absence - will be the crowning of Miss Gladewater Rodeo during the Tough Enough to Wear Pink performance on Saturday, June 12th.

The rodeo queen nominees will be presented at the annual rodeo luncheon on today - Wednesday - held at the First United Methodist Church's Jeter Hall, then immediately after that they will be available for a meet-and-greet at City National Bank, located at 895 E. Broadway Ave (US 80) in Gladewater.

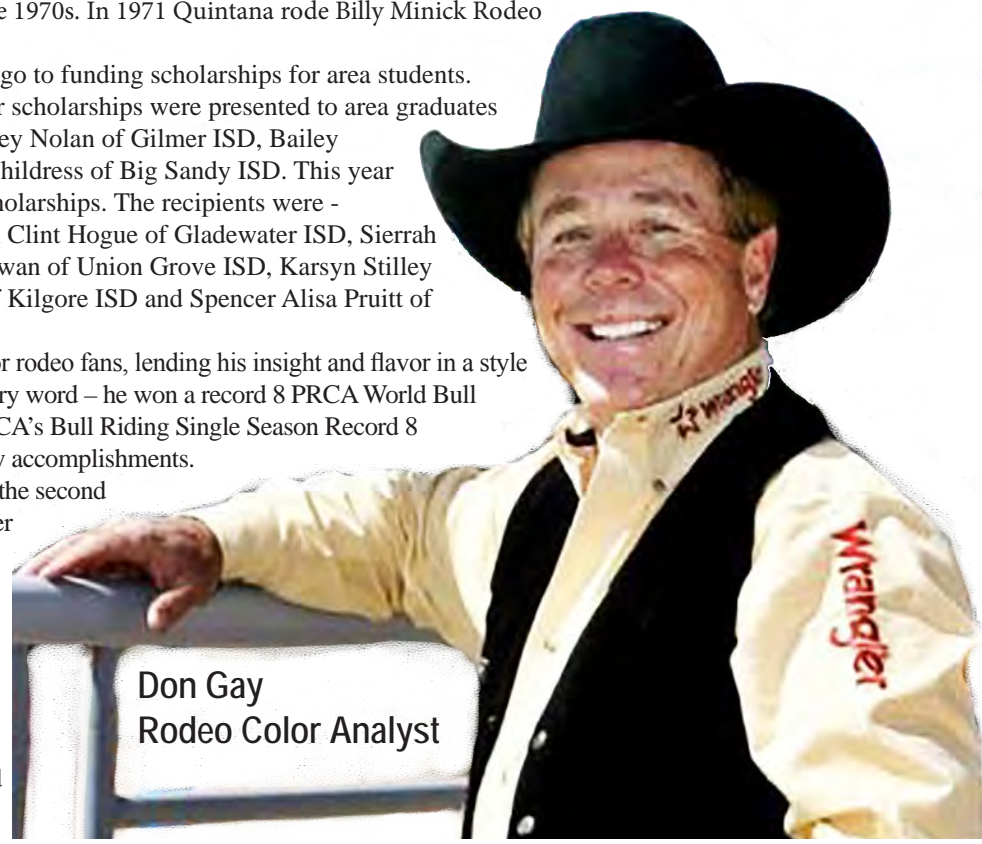
Starting tonight, professional bullfighters Wacey Munsell, Mike Driver and Judd Napier will be put to the test as they try and keep cowboys out of harms way at the XTreme Bulls competition - a full evening of bullriding by some of the best cowboys in the whole country. Last year Cole Melancon of Liberty, TX won the Cavender's Gladewater Round-Up Xtreme Bulls "John Quintana Memorial" competition posting a score of 92. John Quintana was one of the great bull riders of all time, breaking the

world record for highest-scored bull rides twice in the 1970s. In 1971 Quintana rode Billy Minick Rodeo Company's V61 in Gladewater for 94 points.

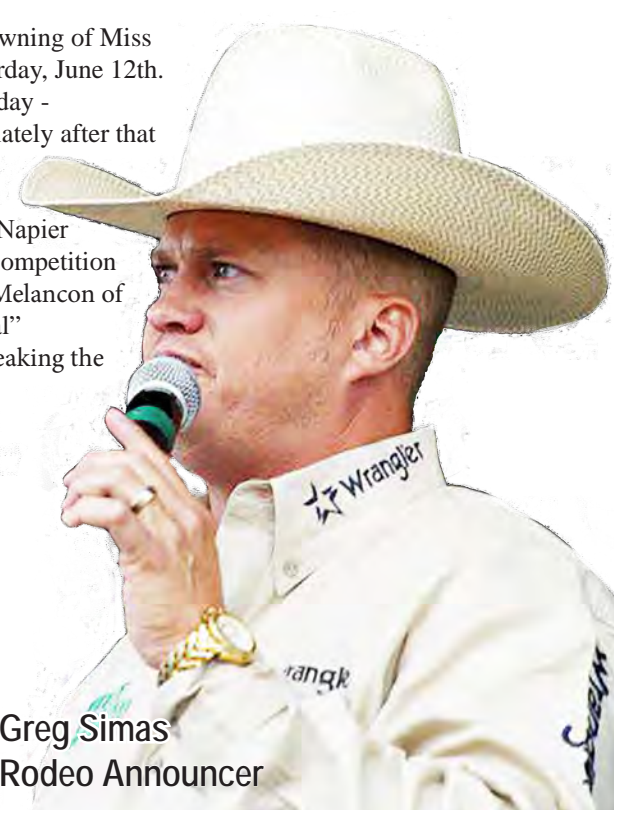

Alexis Howard is a 17-year-old junior at Gilmer High School.



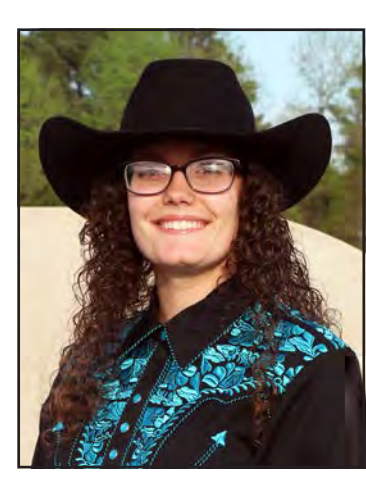

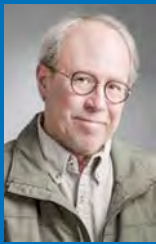

Population gains, losses in state detailed

The U.S. Census Bureau has released its sub-county population estimates from April 2010 to July 2020. That includes population estimates for the 1,200 incorporated places in Texas.

Nine additional Texas towns were incorporated in the past decade, while 13 additional cities surpassed a population of 50,000.

The Texas Demographic Center reported that of the 71 Texas cities with populations of more than 50,000, only two lost population — continuing the trend of smaller towns and areas in the state losing population to larger cities. More than 55% of the state's population growth has been in cities with more than 50,000 residents.

Small and mid-sized cities surrounding major metropolitan areas, such as Dallas-Fort Worth, Austin and Houston, saw the fastest growth rates, while many of the cities in West Texas and the Panhandle were among the 372 Texas cities that lost population, according to TDC.

Emergency food benefits extended

Benefits for families under a federal nutrition plan have been increased through September, the Texas Health and Human Services Commission announced last week.

Under the American Rescue Plan signed by President Biden in March, states can provide eligible families up to \$35 per month to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables. Clients of the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program are eligible.

"Texas WIC provides foods that have great nutritional value — providing key nutrients at key stages of development," Texas WIC Director Edgar Curtis said. "This nutritional support early in life builds stronger, smarter, healthier and happier children and Texans. Fresh fruits and vegetables, which are loaded with vitamins and other plant-based nutrients, are at the forefront of that strategy."

The HHSC also announced it is providing roughly \$208 million in emergency food benefits under the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, extending the maximum SNAP benefits allowable through June. All SNAP recipients will get a minimum of \$95 in emergency allotment, in addition to the 15% increase that continues through September.

The program is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and administered by HHSC.

State to release \$5 billion in school federal aid

Months after congressional action on a coronavirus relief package, the Texas Education Agency announced Friday that school districts may begin applying for their portion of \$5 billion in aid.

According to the Austin American-Statesman, how much each district will receive varies. Districts that saw large enrollment declines because of the pandemic will likely not receive as much money, because TEA will divert some of the funds to make up for funding provided at pre-pandemic levels.

Much of public-school funding in Texas is based on average daily attendance. However, during the 2020-2021 school year, districts were not penalized when students stayed home.

Experts: Weatherization bill falls short

The Texas Legislature passed Senate Bill 3 in response to February's deadly storm and widespread failure of power plants. The package addresses the problems that threaten electric reliability, but public radio's Texas Standard reports that many electric grid experts and policy analysts say not enough has been done to prevent another blackout disaster.

One section of SB3 allows regulators to determine what portions of the natural gas supply must be weatherized. Since it only applies to equipment that directly connects to power plants, experts say it might not be enough.

Dan Cohan, civil engineering professor at Rice University, told the Standard that "whoever has those direct lines into the power plants and winterizes those is going to point upstream and say 'well those upstream people couldn't get us enough gas.' So yeah, it's hard to see how this is going to provide us full coverage."

In addition, critics say the penalties of \$5,000 a day for not doing the required weatherization amount to little more than a rounding error for non-complying oil and gas companies.

GOP chairman resignation sparks speculation

Texas Republican Party chairman Allen West resigned Friday, sparking speculation he is considering a statewide race.

The Republican party issued a statement that West "will take this opportunity to prayerfully reflect on a new chapter in his already distinguished career." West has not ruled out challenging Gov. Greg Abbott, who last week touted a re-election endorsement from former President Trump.

COVID-19 cases dropping; 36% fully vaccinated

The number of new COVID-19 cases in Texas continues to drop, with 9,534 reported as of Sunday for the previous week — a small fraction of mid-January's record high of nearly 159,000. In the past week, 210 deaths from COVID-19 in Texas were reported.

When the 84th Round Up Rodeo begins this week it will be a full course banquet of Professional Rodeo Cowboy Association world class competition. We have a lot to love about Round Up. If you haven't attended in awhile, or ever, you are missing one of, it not the best, entertainment offered anywhere.

The sport is one of the most dangerous in America. Rodeo requires a level of skill that no other sport does. Barrel racing and team calf roping are precision events. And, check out the bull fighters, they may be dressed like clowns, but there is nothing funny about the fact their very dangerous job is to make sure the cowboys get out of the arena in one piece.

Now those bull and bronc riders, those tough old boys are a different

breed altogether. I always try to visit just a minute with the young cowboys while they get ready for their events. They are wrapping ribs, knees and elbows. THE ECONOMIST

The Session

The recent legislative session will not soon be forgotten. The focus was perpetually on anything but initiatives required to move Texas forward. Some high profile measures stalled but will no doubt resurface; others passed.



Whether it was making voting more difficult, removing requirements for safety training to carry firearms,

restricting student eligibility to participate in competitive sports, prohibiting the teaching of aspects of our history, limiting access to health care, eliminating proven economic development programs, or numerous similar issues, every day birthed a distraction that was, at best, unnecessary and, quite often,

downright harmful.

In particular, many of these measures are squarely at odds with efforts to achieve high quality, long-term prosperity. Knowledge workers, Millennials, technology companies, major sports leagues, and convention planners are increasingly resistant to locations perceived to be discriminatory in providing opportunities. This movement has been ongoing for years, with the pandemic intensifying the desire for resilient and welcoming communities. My firm has researched such issues several times, and the risks are very real.

Texas has unbounded economic potential, but faces daunting challenges — educating our future workforce in the wake of seismic demographic shifts and rapidly evolving skills requirements; providing the infrastructure

(including universal broadband and a reliable power grid assuring adequate capacity) needed to support expansion; creating and maintaining a viable health care system that assures access and supports sustainability; and revamping an antiquated tax system to respond to emerging economic patterns. The magnitude of these tasks is exceeded only by the potential rewards of success (or consequences of failure).

Texas has long stood on the shoulders of visionaries of all stripes making enlightened decisions at critical times. Sam Houston secured offshore water rights while still on the battlefield at San Jacinto. A young Dolph Briscoe championed the farm-to-market road system. Mark White spearheaded efforts to make Texas a technology juggernaut during the turbulent 1980s. Rick Perry fostered a path breaking cancer research initiative,

vaulting the state to the forefront of biomedicine.

This type of leadership is sorely missing at present. The issues that dominated the legislative session distract from crucial priorities and, in many cases, hinder genuine progress. Some decisions, such as foregoing indigent health insurance despite huge infusions of federal dollars and numerous studies showing it to be a fiscal win for the State or limiting the ability of school districts to deploy stimulus dollars for pandemic recovery, are penny wise and pound foolish. While this agenda may be perceived on a short-term basis as politically wise, it is most assuredly policy foolish.

If Texas is to achieve its full economic potential and provide opportunities for all to participate, we must do better, deserve to do better, and can do better.

TRANSGENDER IDENTITY

We are being told that transgender identity "is not a choice. It is who the person is... Transgender persons are simply acknowledging that the gender identity assigned to them at birth because of physical anatomy does not match the brain, biochemical and genetic gender identity they know inside" *Mark Wingfield*.

Former Attorney General Loretta Lynch said, "And what we must not do, what we must never do, is turn on our neighbors... our fellow Americans, for something that they cannot control and deny what makes them human..." She further said we cannot insist that a person "pretend to be something or someone that they are not."

The truth is that transgender people are, in fact, pretending to be something that biologically they are not. A man "identifying" as a woman is not a biological woman. Likewise, a woman "Identifying" as a man is not a biological man.

What does the Bible say? "So God created man in His own image, in the image of God He created him; male and female He created them." (Gen. 1: 27). But some people tell us the Bible cannot be right, because the idea of male and female are merely social constructs, the sexes are interchangeable, and there are infinite varieties of genders. Thus, gender is changeable. They tell us that what matters more than being male or female is a person's "gender identity" i.e. how people believe or think about themselves, and it is really one's feelings that determines if a person is male or female. We are also told that people cannot control their feelings because they do not have a choice, nor can they control what makes them human i.e. male or female, because it was assigned to them at birth. When people "do not retain God in their knowledge" (Rom. 1: 28), confusion reigns confusion is the result. Think on these things.

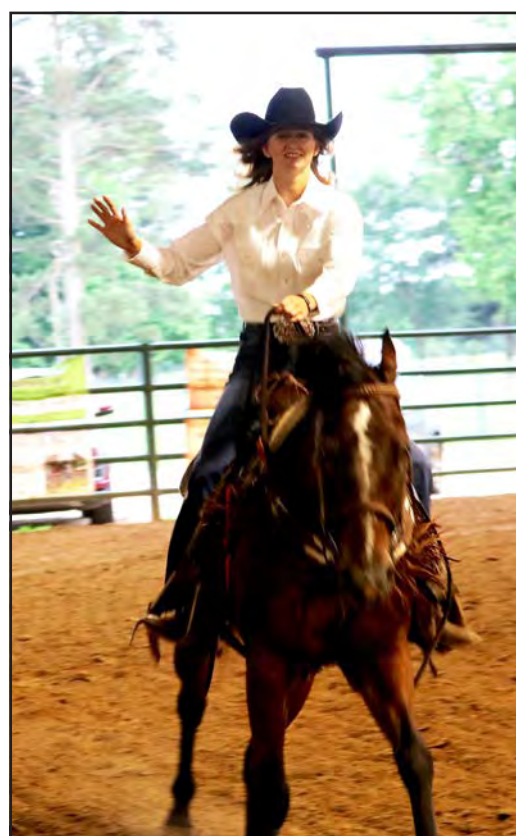

GISD approves \$800K to fix athletic program infrastructure

The GHS track, tennis courts and gym floor are in the plans to get a makeover due to safety concerns and protecting the district's investment in its facilities. GISD board members unanimously approved a budget amendment for the facility upgrades at a special meeting on June 2.

The up to \$800,000 amendment will come from the fund balance with about \$100,000 reserved for new weight room equipment that will serve both the girls' and boys' athletic program. The old equipment will be used by the GMS athletic program.

"Currently we have all sports using a high school weight room originally designed for football," Keller said. "We have boys and girls using it all day long with equipment limitations."

The largest ticket items discussed are replacing the track surface and resurfacing the tennis courts. According to board president Jon Keller the tennis courts have not had attention for 15 or more years. The GHS tennis complex is one of the largest in the district with six courts. Once the tennis courts are refurbished they will be at competition level and tournaments can then be scheduled at GHS.

The board postponed making a decision on the budget amendment items at its last regularly scheduled meeting so that they could look more closely at the proposed projects to determine the level of need and prioritize the projects. In addition to examining each of the proposed facility improvements, some board members also visited other school facilities to see how they had addressed similar issues.

One project with high visibility will be the refurbishment of the high school gym floor. According to Keller, standard maintenance requires stripping down to the wood every five to 10 years. The GHS gym floor has not been stripped to bare wood in 26 years. The project will come in at a

relatively low cost according to Keller. He said that a part of the project will focus on spirit branding in the gym and on the tennis, softball and baseball windcreens. Supt. Dr. Sedric Clark said that a gym scoreboard sponsor has been secured which would defray the cost of the scoreboard.

"Those things are a big deal to our kids and it lets visitors know where they are when they are in Gladewater," Keller said. "They can make a huge difference in school pride and in visitor perception."

Issues with the track continue to plague the program. Athletic Director Scott Clower presented surface samples and spoke to safety issues for the athletes. He also recommended moving the

jump and vault pits to the north end of the stadium to avoid sand damage to the track.

"We have several projects that have been neglected over the years," Keller said. "Coach Clower recognizes that all areas of our athletics program needs some attention. While this doesn't address all of the needs, this does take care of some more pressing needs like our track and tennis courts. I am excited to watch our students, staff and community grow as we address these needs and push our district forward."

Keller said that GISD has a healthy fund balance which currently stands at over \$9.6 million and can afford the expenditures. Many of the improvements are a part of GISD's 5-year improvement plan.

"I appreciate you understanding and seeing what our problems are," Clower said. "These improvements will make a big difference in our programs and for our kids."

In other business, the board approved a Memorandum of Understanding for the 2021-2022 school year regarding Union Grove and Big Sandy ISDs' participation in the Career and Technology program at GISD. The projected partnership will provide space for dual credit Kilgore College classes for the students of all three districts to participate in simultaneously in Gladewater. As a result, more class offerings will be available for the students.

Resignations accepted by the board included GMS math teacher Wanda Hightower, kindergarten teachers Imunique Harris and

Kristi Lenard, Special Ed teacher Josey Land and second grade teacher Tamara Stafford. Contracts were approved for agriculture teachers Bryan Aaron and Emmalee Alatorre, math teacher Wanda West and second grade teacher Kendall Welch.
