Gregg County officials urge vaccinations

COVID-19 cases on the rise in East Texas and expected to get much worse

'We are about to face our darkest hours.'

"I need you," Gregg County Judge Bill Stoudt said as he opened Monday's noon press conference about an overwhelming third wave of COVID. The "need" is to get the message out about the importance of getting vaccinated. Stoudt said that the seven day average of cases had risen 92% which is much faster than the past two waves of COVID in the greater Gregg County area.

Stoudt said that there was a 49% increase in COVID related hospitalizations among all ages and that deaths from the disease were up 15% and climbing. He went on to say that 75% of the current cases are due to the Delta variant in those who are not fully vaccinated.

"Our community needs to take




care of each other,' Stoudt said.
"There are no new orders from
the governor, or my office but
I am begging you to encourage
people to get vaccinated. You are
saving lives when you do."

Stoudt said that there are 40 sites within the county where vaccinations may be administered at no cost to those seeking them. He also encouraged Gregg County citizens to wear masks, avoid crowds and to keep hands clean."

This virus can be beat, but we need help," Judge Stoudt said. "We need everyone to understand the growing danger of this disease."

Dr. John DiPasquale, head of Christus GSMC Emergency Services spoke passionately about the latest battle with the



Delta variant of the COVID virus.

"I wish we were all here to celebrate a victory but we are not," he said. "We are about to face our darkest hours."

Dr. DiPasquale said that the clinical and nonclinical staff are demoralized.

"Nearly 100% of the patients we are seeing are unvaccinated," he said. "They are younger and struggling to breathe. Every death we have had came from someone else. Please avoid others if you have symptoms, wear your mask."

Dr. DiPasquale said that the FDA will give full approval to the vaccines shortly and the fact that the very ill are overwhelmingly unvaccinated is proof of its importance.

"Patients are coming in sooner, sicker and are deteriorating faster," he said. "We have not seen or treated anyone with serious

reactions to the vaccinations."

Symptoms include runny nose, slight fever, chronic cough or sneezing.

"By the time we see them they can't breathe," Dr. DiPasquale said. "With the Alpha strain the disease presented after about five days, with the Delta variant it is three and patients are running out

of time."

Christus Good Shepherd Medical Center CEO Todd Hancock said that the third wave poses a potential healthcare crisis.

"In January we peaked in cases but today we are already at half that number and it has happened in just a few weeks," Hancock said. "The state provided us with nurses and funding last time but not this time. We need a whole cadre of health care professionals. We have a void in our present situation."

Hancock said that he is reaching out to nurses in the area who are licensed.

"Nurses are the tip of the spear," Hancock said. "We are

asking in an unprecedented way to step up and help us."

Besides the shortage in staffing, he said that there is a growing shortage of available beds in the state.

"We have people in ER's all across Texas waiting for a hospital bed," Hancock said. "There are no beds available. You can help by getting vaccinated."


Longview Regional CEO Steve Gordon took time to thank first responders before he gave his stark warning. "If everyone were vaccinated we would have a hospital population of zero," he said. "Currently our emergency room is overwhelmed. If you are

DPS urges drivers to be aware as school year begins

With the school year beginning in person for many districts across the

state, the Texas Department of Public Safety is reminding the public of steps they can take to keep students and staff members safe. This includes slowing down in school zones, staying off cell phones and being aware at all times while around school buses.

"Going back to school is an exciting time for students, parents and staff, but it is paramount that drivers are more alert when around buses and schools," said DPS Director Steven McCraw.

DPS offers the following tips for school safety:

- Give students extra room and don't assume they are paying attention to traffic.
- Don't block a crosswalk when stopped at a red light or stop sign.
 Follow the directions of school crossing guards.
- Watch for children on bicycles traveling to and from schools.
- Reduce speed when you spot a school bus and know children may unexpectedly step into the road without checking for oncoming traffic
- unexpectedly step into the road without checking for oncoming traffic.

 Be careful around railroad crossings. School buses are legally
- required to stop at them.

 Know laws regarding school buses. According to Texas law, if a bus has alternating flashing red signals visible from the front or rear, drivers MUST stop before reaching the bus. Drivers can only proceed if the flashing lights are no longer activated, the driver signals you to proceed or the bus has resumed driving. Approaching drivers do NOT have to stop for a school bus that is operating a visual signal if the road

Delta variant spurs huge increase in COVID-19 hospitalizations

The number of Texans hospitalized with lab-confirmed COVID-19 cases is increasing faster than at any other point since the pandemic began in early 2020, due to the highly contagious delta variant.

As of Sunday, the Texas Department of State Health Services reported 8,892 people were in Texas hospitals. That is up more than four-fold from a month ago. The Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University reported 96,807 cases in the past week and 384 deaths. That is nearly eight times the number of new cases reported a month ago and more than double the deaths.

In Austin, health authorities warned the public that a surge in cases has swamped hospitals, according to a New York Times report. Intensive-care units are near capacity, with only a handful of ICU beds available.

Gov. Greg Abbott has barred local governments and public schools from reinstituting mask mandates but is urging people to get vaccinated against COVID-19. The vast majority of those hospitalized have not been vaccinated.

A total of 12.84 million Texans are fully vaccinated, about 44% of the state's total population, according to DSHS.

Second special session underway: Dems AWOL

Abbott convened a second special session just hours after the first session expired but there still wasn't a quorum present to pass bills. Many Texas House Democratic legislators remained in Washington, D.C. in an effort to both block a quorum and lobby members of Congress to pass a federal voting rights bill.

Abbott has put forth a 17-item agenda that includes the election reform bill, bail reform, border security and other issues that were presented but not passed during the regular session.

"I will continue to call special session after special session to reform our broken bail system, uphold election integrity, and pass other important items that Texans demand and deserve," Abbott said when announcing the new session. "Passing these special session agenda items will chart a course towards a stronger and brighter future for the Lone Star State."

Texas House Democrats predictably were critical. State Rep. Ina Minjarez said Abbott is "wasting" taxpayers' money, chiding the governor in a tweet with the hashtag #StopGaslightingTexans.

Additional month of legislative funding

Texas Capitol employees won't have to go without a paycheck in September after all.

Abbott vetoed a portion of the state budget that funds the Legislature and its staff after House Democrats walked out during the regular session. But Abbott, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, House Speaker Dade Phelan and others announced an additional month of funding for the Legislature before the second special session that began Saturday.

"Texans should not have to pay for Legislators who quit their jobs and leave unfinished business," Abbott said. "...Funding is being temporarily restored for legislative staff that will be necessary to pass critical legislation..."

Potential economic consequences of Texas and OU leaving the Big 12

The economic upheaval of 2020 impacted all corners of Texas. As centers of employment, the largest metropolitan statistical



areas (MSAs) experienced the bulk of the heavy losses as the state responded to the COVID-19 crisis. About 79.3% o f

1.4 million jobs lost between February and April 2020 were concentrated in the state's six largest MSAs. However, recovery is ongoing, with the pace varying depending on industrial composition and other factors. Let's briefly explore the current status of the state's primary population centers and my latest economic projections.

Austin-Round Rock-Georgetown MSA lost 137,000 2020; as of June, employment was only 5,400 jobs below the pre-pandemic peak. We expect almost 140,000 net new wage and salary jobs to be added over the next five years (2.47% per annum growth).

Dallas-Plano-Irving employment remains 21,700 below prior levels after a loss of about 299,200 jobs between February and April 2020. We forecast an addition of nearly 351,900 net new positions through 2025, a 2.49% yearly

Fort Worth-Arlington-Grapevine conditions have improved substantially after February-April 2020 losses of 126,200, but employment remained 31,300 below the previous peak as of June. Employment in the area is likely to expand by more than 128,000

jobs from February to April jobs, a 2.34% per annum gain. El Paso employment is 11,200 below the February 2020 level, but has recovered many of the 36,800 jobs lost in the early

> months of the pandemic. We project close to 38,700 net new jobs by 2025, a 2.13% annual rise. In the Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land MSA, which is heavily impacted by both energy and shipping, employment remained 147,900 below pre-pandemic totals in June but had recovered significantly from the loss of

over the next five years, with wage and salary employment up nearly 399,800 jobs during the period (a 2.44% yearly pace). McAllen-Edinburg-Mission is 7,500 below the pre-pandemic employment but has regained

361,400 in the spring of 2020.

Things should improve notably

lost. Our latest forecast calls for employment to expand with a yearly growth rate of 2.40% for an increase of over 34,500 jobs by 2025

For San Antonio-New Braunfels, the first few months of the pandemic led to losses of 131,000 jobs, and June employment remained 10,800 below February 2020. Close to 137,300 net new jobs are expected to be created through 2025 (a 2.39% annual rate).

Smaller MSAs have seen similar patterns, with a few even exceeding prior peaks. The pandemic hit hard, but the economy is on track to recoup aggregate losses by early next year, with notable momentum in all major markets. Assuming that the Delta variant does not bring additional disruptions, we expect these recovery patterns to persist. Stay safe!

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ACCEPTING CHRIST AS YOUR PERSONAL SAVIOR

In answer to the question: "What must a person do in order to be saved?" often the answer given is "One must accept Jesus as their personal Savior," without explaining what is involved in doing so. Often these same people teach that baptism is not essential to being saved, but it is only an outward sign of inward grace i. e. one is baptized to show they are already saved. Let's examine this in light of accepting Jesus as one's personal Savior before one is baptized.

First, to be saved one must be "in Christ" where salvation is (2 Tim. 2: 10). The question is: "how does one get into Christ?" The answer is: one is "baptized into Christ Jesus." (Rom. 6: 3; Gal. 3: 27). Second, Christ is the "Head" of the church. (Eph. 1: 22; 5: 23), which is His "body" (Col. 1: 18; 1 Cor. 12: 27). Third, Christ is the "Savior of the body," which we have learned is the church. The question is: "how does one get into the church?" First Corinthians 12: 13 says: "For by one Spirit, we were all baptized into one body (church)." Fourth, one enters into Christ and into the body, which is the church, the same way and at the same time, when he is baptized. It follows then, that if one is saved before he is baptized, he is saved "out of Christ," and "out of the church (body), because one is "baptized into both Christ and the church synonymously. Therefore, how can one accept Jesus as his personal Savior if he is not in the Christ's church of which He is the Savior? In order for Christ to be one's Savior, one must be in Christ and in His church, which Christ adds one to when he is saved, and one is saved when he is baptized. (Mk. 16: 16; 1 Pet. 3: 21; Acts 2: 37,38, 41, 47). One must accept Christ as his personal Savior, but the acceptance must be on Christ's terms. Think on these things.

Pandemic help for timber harvesters, haulers

Texans who make a living cutting or hauling timber, or processing wood by chipping or grinding, are eligible for grants from a fund of up to \$200 million provided by the U.S. Department of Agriculture under a pandemic assistance program. The new program, Pandemic Assistance for Timber Harvesters and Haulers (PATHH), encourages timber harvesters and haulers to apply. The deadline is Oct. 15.

"We Texans pride ourselves on our rugged individualism and self-reliance. However, when the entire forestry supply chain crashed as a result of the pandemic response, it was more than just a hurdle to overcome," said Rob Hughes, executive director of the Texas Forestry Association. "That's why TFA and Texas A&M Forest Service, along with many other partners, have been actively involved in pushing for the Logger Relief Act, which passed in the last federal pandemic relief bill." 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

is separated by a physical barrier or an intervening space. If a highway is only divided by a left-turn lane, it is not considered divided and drivers must stop for school buses.

- Drivers who illegally pass a school bus face fines up to \$1,250 for the first offense. For people convicted of the offense more than once, the law allows for the person's driver license to be suspended for up to six months. A ticket for this offense cannot be dismissed through defensive driving. Criminal charges are possible if a driver causes someone serious bodily
- Always obey speed limits and traffic laws in school zones. • Remember, texting while driving is illegal in Texas.

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
