Bears battle New Boston for win

The Gladewater Bears put up their biggest point total of the year scoring six touchdowns, all on the ground, enroute to a 42-35 victory over the Lions of New Boston. Playing without starting running back Malachi Gordon and starting wide receiver Kollin Lewis the Bears churned out 313 yards on the ground while adding another 118 yards through the air to stay one step ahead of the Lions all night.

New Boston brought their ever dangerous Wing T offense into Jack V. Murphy Stadium and showed why they are in the hunt for a playoff spot representing District 6-3A D1. After being down 20-7 at the end of the first quarter the Lions matched the host Bears score for score battling back only to fall at the final gun.

The Lions won the opening coin toss and elected to receive the ball, relying on their ball control ground game to eat up yardage and the clock to keep the Bear offense off the field, but the stingy Gladewater defense would not comply, holding New Boston to a three and out to force the punt. Lion punter Connor Bobbitt hit a 38 yard line drive to Bear return man DJ Allen, who raced 22 yards up the sideline before being brought down near midfield. A holding penalty on Gladewater brought the ball back to the Bear 30 yard line. Ten plays later the Bears put their first points on the board on a 24 yard scamper by Allen with 6:06 left in the first quarter.

On the ensuing kickoff Bear kicker Ozzy Chavarria attempted to catch the Lions off guard by trying an onside kick. New Boston was ready for the trickery falling on the ball at their own 43 yard line. It took New Boston only three plays to answer Gladewater with a score of their own. Senior running back Dalton Daniel cracked the Bear defense for a 38 yard run and the score. The PAT was good and the game was knotted at 7-all with 4:37 left in the first quarter.

The Bears took only 17 seconds to retake the lead when Allen outran all Lion defenders 71 yards for his second score of the night. The extra point was blocked and the Bears led 13-7 with 4:20 left in the opening quarter. Gladewater would add to their lead after defense end Eli Kates would partially block a Bobbitt punt to give the Bears great field position at the New Boston 40 yard line. Allen hit wide receiver Frank Sierra for 19 yards and wide receiver Tyrone for another 13 to the Lion 13 yard line. Three plays later running back Za Campbell (15 carries for 113 yards and two TDs) hit paydirt from eight yards out to give the hometown boys a 20-7 lead with four seconds left in the first quarter.

New Boston, on their next possession, marched down the field to the Bear 27 yard line but stops by linebacker Calan Castles and Kates on third and fourth down put the ball back in the hands of the Gladewater offense. Three plays later the Lion defense got their only turnover of the night when DB Chris Ganaway intercepted an Allen pass. This time the New Boston offense wasn't to be denied, going 47 yards in five plays and scoring on a QB Xavier Rowden to wide receiver Jack Abston pass of 14 yards to narrow the Bear lead to 20-14 with 6:23 left in the half.

The Lions would try the first of their four onside kick attempts but Gladewater's Levi Kegaris fell on the loose ball. The Bears would march down the field on runs by Allen, Campbell and fullback G'Braylon Polly and catches by Woods to set the Bears up with first

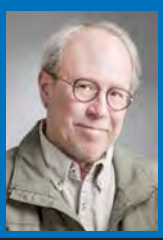

Abbott wants to increase illegal voting penalties

Gov. Greg Abbott has asked the Texas Legislature to increase the penalty for illegal voting, adding the item to the third special session now underway. However, House Speaker Dade Phelan, R-Beaumont, quickly rejected the proposal, according to the Austin American-Statesman.

During the second special session, Senate Bill 1 was amended to decrease the penalty. House Democrats twice broke quorum in failed attempts to stop the elections bill from passing.

"Now is not the time to relitigate," Phelan said. "Instead, the House will remain focused on its constitutional obligation to pass redistricting maps, and members look forward to fulfilling this critical task."

The measure has moved forward in the Senate. It would make the penalty for voting illegally a second-degree felony, with a maximum sentence of 20 years in prison. SB 1 reduced the penalty to a Class A misdemeanor, with up to one year in jail. However, Phelan's opposition means it is unlikely to move forward.

More antibody infusion centers open in state

The Texas Division of Emergency Management continues to open new COVID-19 therapeutic centers across the state, providing monoclonal antibodies to treat outpatient cases with a doctor's referral. The treatment is provided at no cost. Antibody infusion treatment can prevent patients from becoming seriously ill, requiring hospitalization.

Infusion centers are now operating in Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Burnet, College Station, Corpus Christi, Edinburg, Fort Worth, Harlingen, Houston, Laredo, Livingston, Lubbock, McKinney, Nacogdoches, Nash, Odessa, San Antonio, Seguin, Tyler, The Woodlands, Victoria and Waco. TCEQ pushes recycling with marketing plan

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality has released its recycling market development plan, which found the recycling industry adds \$4.8 billion to the Texas economy. In 2019, 12.9 million tons of solid waste were recycled, up 40% compared to four years earlier. However, nearly 44% of the total solid waste in Texas landfills could have been recycled, according to TCEQ.

The Wrong Medicine

The \$3.5 trillion (or more) federal spending proposal now under consideration has some worthy components, but on the whole is concerning. It's too large and expensive, and funding it would cause negative responses through the economy. Here's a brief overview.

The US already has a very large debt burden due to decades of enormous deficits due to poorly conceived fiscal policy, unfunded and inefficient spending programs, and tax cuts based on faulty projections. Both major parties are culpable. This situation was made worse by extensive deficit spending over the past 18 months

associated with COVID-19. Most of these outlays were appropriate and needed to keep families, small businesses, and key sectors viable during a genuine emergency situation, but they nonetheless limit flexibility going forward. Interest expense is becoming an increasing percentage of the federal budget, and higher rates are likely down the road. Any conversation about new programs must be viewed within this framework.

To put it simply, the proposed new programs are much too large to undertake at this time. There are parts of these initiatives that represent genuine governmental objectives and pressing priorities that have been neglected for too long; they should be discussed, enacted, and prudently funded. The basic infrastructure bill falls into this category, as do some

pieces of the larger package. Others are either well intentioned, but misguided efforts to address global climate concerns (more on that later) or represent a level of social engineering that is inconsistent with the way market-based economies are designed to function. Decades of experience teach us that simply throwing Federal dollars at something doesn't often lead to optimal outcomes and that better results may be (and have been) achieved through properly structured incentives and private initiatives.

While some politicians have been saying that this massive program won't cost anything, that's simply not correct. Such statements assume that policy actions to increase revenues (namely increasing taxes, another topic that I will address soon) will be enough to

pay for the new spending. Any scoring that shows these large, all-encompassing packages as self-funding are based on accounting tricks and a limited time horizon that does not fully capture all of the dynamic effects which play out over a longer period.

The large social spending packages of the past were debated and implemented over periods of years if not decades. Sweeping change was only enacted after thoughtful consideration of overall priorities and development of a meaningful, if not unanimous, consensus, which is not the case at present. While there is clearly room for and need for improvement in some areas, we are simply not in a fiscal position to implement trillions in new programs in one fell swoop. Stay safe!

Upshur property tax statements going out

Upshur County Tax Assessor-Collector Luana Howell said Monday her office will mail 60,500 ad valorem tax statements before Sunday.

Taxpayers who don't receive statements for part or all of their property or royalties are still responsible for paying them, and anyone who failed to get all his/her statements should contact her Gilmer office at 903-843-3085, Howell said.

Taxes for the 2021-22 fiscal year which are not paid by the Jan. 31 deadline are subject

to penalties and interest, she reminded.

Taxes which are due to any agency in the county can be paid at not only the Gilmer office, located on Titus Street one block south of the county courthouse, but at the office's Gladewater branch and forthcoming new Ore City branch, Howell noted.

The Gilmer office's foyer is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Fridays, while its drive-through service is open from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

The Gladewater branch on U.S. 80 is open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Mondays through Wednesdays.

Howell said she hoped to open the Ore City office, to be housed inside First National Bank (formerly Security State Bank), by next Thursday. Hours will be 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Thursdays and Fridays, and, like the Gladewater substation, it will be a full-service office, able to register vehicles as well as process taxes for any taxing agency in the county, she said.

The Ore City office, which can be reached at 903-680-8319, will open months after Howell closed her nearby Diana branch because of lack of business there.

She said the tax statements

must be mailed before Sunday since Ore City ISD and the City of Ore City offer discounts for early payment of taxes--3% in October, 2% in November, and 1% in December.

Howell also said that Peregrine, a firm with offices in several states, would again mail the statements for the tax office this year since it is "more efficient than our office" at it. The cost is about the same as if Howell's office did the mailing, and "they (Peregrine) get it done in days, but it takes us weeks," the tax assessor-collector said.

COVID-19 vaccination clinic set for Oct. 11

Kilgore College will host a COVID-19 vaccination clinic 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday, Oct. 11, in the carpeted gym of Parks Fitness Center, 701 Laird St., on the Kilgore campus. Both the Pfizer (2 doses) and Johnson & Johnson (1 dose) will be available. The second dose will be available at least 21 days after the first dose. Anyone 18 or older can choose to receive either vaccine. Persons 12 to 17 years old will only be offered the Pfizer vaccine, and they must be accompanied by their parent or legal guardian at the vaccine clinics.

Appointments are recommended; however, walk-ins are welcome. Times can be scheduled by visiting www.NETHealthCOVID19.org using the specific portal, or by calling (903) 617-6404.

Those who have received another vaccination of any kind, including flu or Shingles, or who have recently tested positive for COVID-19, need to wait at least 14 days before receiving the first (or a second) COVID-19 vaccine.

PUBLIC UTILITY COMMISSION OF TEXAS DOCKET NO. 52389**

On August 4, 2021, Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO or the Company) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) for Approval of an Advanced Metering System (AMS) Deployment Plan, AMS Surcharge, and Non-Standard Metering Service Fees. The docket number assigned to this proceeding is Docket No.52389. This application, if granted, will affect all SWEPCO Texas retail customers other than those who receive service at transmission-level voltage, who receive unmetered service, or whose service is metered by certain types of interval demand recorder (IDR) meters.

SWEPCO is seeking approval from the Commission for its AMS deployment plan pursuant to PURA § 39.5021 and 16 Tex. Admin. Code (TAC) §§ 25.130 and 25.133. In its 2019 regular session, the Texas Legislature approved House Bill 1595, which extended mechanisms that support deployment of AMS to SWEPCO and directed that if SWEPCO elects to deploy AMS, it shall deploy the network as rapidly as practicable to allow customers to better manage energy use and control costs. SWEPCO is therefore submitting an application for Commission review and approval consistent with the support and direction of the Legislature as provided in House Bill 1595.

SWEPCO also requests approval of an AMS Surcharge for recovery of the reasonable and necessary costs that SWEPCO will incur under its proposed deployment plan. The proposed effective date for the surcharge is the first day of the Company’s April 2022 billing cycle. The proposed AMS Surcharge would be in place for four or eight years beginning with the April 2022 billing cycle. There would be one set of AMS Surcharge rates for the first four years, and a different set of rates for the second four years. The Company’s proposed monthly AMS Surcharge rates for each rate class are as follows:

The AMS Surcharge will apply to electric service to residential customers and non-residential customers, other than those who are served at transmission voltage, take unmetered service, or are served by certain types of IDR meters. The costs recovered through the AMS Surcharge will be reviewed by the Commission in a reconciliation proceeding to be held in the future on a schedule to be determined by the Commission.

Furthermore, SWEPCO proposes to allow a customer to choose to receive electric service through a non-standard (non-advanced) meter and to assess fees consistent with 16 TAC § 25.133 to recover the costs associated with providing the non-standard metering service from a customer who elects to have a non-standard meter. The following fees will only affect those customers that request that an advanced meter not be installed at their service location or any other retail customer who requests non-standard metering service after advanced meters are installed:

- Non-refundable, one-time up-front fees**
- Retain existing meter that meets applicable safety and accuracy standards:.....\$131.68
 - Digital, non-communicating meter requested before advanced meter installed:\$194.11
 - Digital, non-communicating meter requested after advanced meter installed:\$233.39
- Recurring monthly fee:..... \$22.97 per month**
