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Bears drill Necks 48-14; host Sabine Friday

Seven Gladewater players combined to rush for 316 yards and the Bears drilled White Oak 48-14 Friday night at Roughneck Stadium. The win sets Gladewater up to play for the outright district championship against Sabine this Friday night. The Bears scored on six of their 10 possessions running at will and only being contained by penalties and a turnover. The Gladewater defense also got on the scoreboard when junior wide receiver Kollin Lewis intercepted White Oak's QB Cayson Siegley (5/14/82/Int) and raced 73 yards for the pick six. The Roughnecks battled all night showing spurts of life rushing for 123 yards and keeping the Bear defense on high alert.

Gladewater got the opening kickoff but three straight illegal procedure penalties pushed the Bears back and gave them a 1st and 25 at their own 34 yard line. Two incomplete passes by QB DJ Allen (2/8/37/TD) and a 2 yard run by Za Campbell (11/96/TD) brought out the punt team. A bobble on the snap sent punter Allen scrambling for his life and a loss of 12 yards. The Roughnecks took full advantage of the Bear miscue going 24 yards in six plays and scoring on a run by Dylan Creager (8/30/TD). The extra point by kicker Aven Whittington was good and White Oak led 7-0 with 8:28 left in the first quarter. It would be the only time the Roughnecks would lead or be close all game.

The White Oak score would light a fire under the Bear offense. Gladewater would go on a four touchdown rampage. After a 24 yard return on the ensuing kickoff by Tyrone Maddox, Gladewater went to work on the ground, churning out yardage and burning clock. Runs by Allen (9/64), Campbell and G'Braylon Polly (12/73/3 TDs) got the Bears to the Roughneck 5 yard line where Polly barreled in with the first of his three touchdowns. Kicker Jonathan Arreguin (6/7 PATS) was good on the extra point and the contest was tied with 4:12 left in the first quarter.

The Roughnecks would try to get something going on their next possession taking advantage of Bear penalties but a sack by Gladewater's Eli Kates and Zach Polanco for a loss of nine yards resulted in a second and 14 at the Bear 32. That would set up the pass that Bear defender Lewis would step in front of and take 73 yards to the house. Arreguin's extra point was again right on target and Gladewater led 14-7 with 1:33 left in the first quarter.

The Bears would waste no time getting the ball back as Kicker Ozzy Chavarria laid down another of his patented onside kicks that was caught in the air by Allen on the Bear sideline. Five plays later runningback Polanco (6/51/TD) hit pay dirt with a 5-yard run. The PAT by Arreguin was good giving Gladewater a 21-7 lead with six seconds left in the opening quarter. After a three and out, highlighted by a 4-yard tackle for a loss by Bear's defensive lineman Rajuan Johnson on the Roughneck Dee Williams (10/35/TD), Gladewater marched down the field to set up Polly's second touchdown of the night, this one for eight yards and a three touchdown lead. In the only miss of the night for Arreguin, he hit a floater that looked like it was in slow motion as it struck the crossbar and bounced back into the field of play.

With 7:29 left in the half Gladewater led 27-7. The Bear defense would once again step up on White Oak's next series. The Roughnecks would charge down to the Bear 10 yard line but a five yard penalty would push them back to the 15 yard line. WO QB Siegley would run for eight yards and three yards giving the Roughnecks a third and goal at the Bear 5-yard line. Williams was stopped for no gain on third down and a sack by Kates would give the ball back to Gladewater

GISD tech/athletic updates approved

A GISD technology upgrade for the installation of interactive BenQ boards was approved for Weldon Elementary, GMS and GHS for \$40,525 at last week's school board meeting 6-0 with trustee Jeff Cook absent. The board also voted unanimously to approve a budget amendment for the purchase of GHS athletic uniforms for \$10,500. The purchase is a fund balance requirement that is a part of GISD's 5-year plan that sees the rotation of uniform purchase. This buy will include purchase for boys and girls soccer teams, boys basketball and softball

travel uniforms. After a presentation by district athletic director Scott Clower the purchase of a utility vehicle was also approved not to exceed \$10,500. The AD reports that with the stadium track upgrade it is necessary to purchase a different kind of vehicle to protect the district's investment in the improvements.

"We need to maintain the turf without damaging the new track," Clower said. "I may have found

Clower is investigating the purchase of a loaner John Deere gator used by Stephen F. Austin University's athletic department for a brief time, as well as gathering information on other options.

During reports Clower said that the athletic facility renovations continue with work beginning on the tennis courts to get them ready for tournament play, as well as the track after the last district football game. He also said that the final improvement to be made at GHS' Bill Waters gymnasium would be the installation of wall padding this week. He reported that new baseball and softball

City Council approves water project

In an effort to improve the city's water, the Gladewater City Council voted Thursday night to spend \$1.4 million on three projects.

Using money from a grant and not local tax dollars, the city will pay \$158,760 to install raw water monitoring at the lake water intake station. That will allow the city to take in water from various levels when needed and address Texas Commission on Environmental Quality requirements. The project will bring in better water to the water treatment plant, resulting in better water going out with less chemicals added.

The city will also spend \$178,416 from the grant for filter valve improvements and \$285,768 for chemical feed and storage improvements. This will address any future cold weather issues like those encountered during the severe winter storm.

The council chose to put off for now the biggest ticket item -\$2,916,648 - to address a sludge lagoon problem at the water plant.

In other business the council: Approved an agreement with Gregg County for support of Lee Public Library with a \$6,000



Gas prices topping \$3 across state

The price of a gallon of gasoline tops \$3 across much of the state, which is up more than \$1.20 from a year ago, according to AAA. The average price for regular gas in Texas stood at \$3.03 per gallon on Sunday as crude oil prices continue to creep up, closing above \$80 per barrel. Crude oil price is one of a quartet of factors that influence the cost of gasoline, reported The Dallas Morning News. The cost of refining, distribution expenses and taxes also affect the price at the pump.

"Things have really picked up steam in terms of national gas prices in the last two-and-a-half to three weeks," Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum at fuel savings app GasBuddy, told the newspaper. "The national average had been stable for a long period of time, but suddenly the price of oil surged, and the price of gasoline followed along with it."

Cheaper prices can be found, although it takes some searching. Gasbuddy.com reported prices hovering around \$2.45 per gallon at locations in Dallas, Houston and Round Rock, but these appear to be exceptions to the prevailing price increases.

Scott appointed Texas Secretary of State.

John Scott has been appointed Texas Secretary of State, in which he serves as the state's chief election officer. The veteran Fort Worth attorney served previously as a deputy attorney general for civil litigation when Abbott was attorney general. He subsequently served as the chief operating officer of the state Health and Human Services Commission, with a \$50 billion biennial budget and 56,000 employees.

Scott briefly represented former President Donald Trump in a lawsuit challenging the 2020 election results in Pennsylvania, along with state Sen. Bryan Hughes. Both withdrew from the case a few days later, reported the Texas Tribune.

The secretary of state slot has been vacant since May, when Rita Hughs resigned after the state senate declined to consider her confirmation. Since the Legislature isn't scheduled to meet again until 2023, Scott will serve in an interim capacity until then.

DSHS launches COVID-19 vaccination push

The Texas Department of State Health Services has launched a new statewide COVID-19 media campaign to encourage Texans aged 12 and over to get vaccinated against COVID-19. The campaign features Texans describing in their own words why they were initially hesitant to get the vaccine and later changed their minds.

"Any Texan who has not been vaccinated against COVID-19 because of safety or other concerns can be assured that the authorized vaccines are safe and effective," said Dr. John Hellerstedt, DSHS commissioner. "The data gathered shows the benefits of vaccination far outweigh the risks of rare side effects. Most importantly, vaccination is proven to greatly increase our protection against severe COVID-19 illness, hospitalization and even death."

One ad features a woman who contracted a moderate to severe case of COVID-19. That experience led her to change her mind and get vaccinated following her illness to try and prevent a reinfection that could make her sick again or threaten those around her, according to a DSHS press release.

Another ad features a man who resisted vaccination because of his distrust in the safety of the vaccines and of those who encouraged their use. But as millions across the state, nation and globe have become fully vaccinated and adverse events remain very rare, he reviewed the data and has since been vaccinated.

Meanwhile, the number of new COVID-19 cases in Texas continues to drop, with 30,276 reported by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University in the past week. That is down nearly 75% from about a month ago. New deaths also dropped to 1,267 in the past week, reflecting national trends as the delta variant wave appears to be finally waning. State hospitalizations of lab-confirmed COVID-19 patients dropped to 4,382 as of Sunday, down two-thirds from a month ago.

Texans who are fully vaccinated topped 15.3 million, according to DSHS, with more than a million having also received an additional dose.

TPWD predicts a productive hunting season

It could be a fruitful season for Texas waterfowl hunters with millions of ducks in the Central Flyway.

"Duck production in prairie potholes of North Dakota, South Dakota, Saskatchewan and Alberta were reported to be below average due to extensive drought this summer," said Kevin Kraai, TPWD Waterfowl Program Leader. "With that said, there are still millions of ducks in the Central Flyway, and we are on the heels of multiple excellent breeding

Wetter-than-average conditions during the first half of the year are leading to more surface water for ducks and geese. Hunters should purchase their 2021-2022 hunting license before hitting the field.

In addition, TPWD biologists says deer hunters can expect an excellent 2021-2022 white-tailed deer season. Late spring rains alleviated drought conditions at the end of 2020, leading to accelerated growth of weeds and flowering plants attractive to deer. The Edwards Plateau, at the crossroads of Central, South and West Texas, has the highest deer population in the state.


of the time of year...the hands of my Nanny who was a nurse and always focused on a task...the roughened hands of my father broken by ranch work, accidents and hard labor.

Looking Around You

Three Americans have received this year's Nobel Prize in Economics. One half went to David Card (University of California,



Berkeley) "for his empirical contributions labour economics," and the other half was awarded jointly to Joshua D. Angrist

(Massachusetts Institute of Technology) and Guido W. Imbens (Stanford University) "for their methodological contributions to the analysis of causal relationships."

In plain English, these economists demonstrated the value of observing the world around us and, in the process, really changed our thinking about solving social problems, with profound implications. Each year, conditions, it is possible to make the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences awards the Prize (formally the Sveriges Riksbank Prize in Economic Sciences in Memory of Alfred Nobel) in recognition of ideas and research that increase our understanding of important issues in economics and related areas.

I've often said that a problem with economics is that, unlike traditional sciences, you can't put the economy in a laboratory and test outcomes under varying conditions. However, the work of these researchers has enhanced our understanding of the best available alternative - "natural experiments."

Natural experiments occur when one part of the economy or society (such as a specific country or state) is for some external reason treated differently than others. By studying outcomes under diverse

valid inferences. For example, one country might enact stricter immigration laws than its neighbors. If we carefully analyze the situation using appropriate methods, we can decipher knowledge regarding the effects of such policies.

David Card studied the effects of minimum wages, immigration, and education. His analysis during the 1990s challenged the accepted thinking of the day through conclusions such as increasing the minimum wage does not necessarily lead to fewer jobs and that incomes of people who were born in a country can benefit from new immigration (though those who came earlier might be negatively affected).

Joshua Angrist and Guido Imbens worked to solve methodological problems with natural experiments,

helping develop ways to use them to more precisely isolate cause and effect. This enhanced understanding facilitates the use of such experience in answering questions such as the optimal years of school for future success. I must mention that another great thinker and former Deputy Treasury Secretary, Alan Krueger, worked with these three on their seminal efforts and would likely have shared the accolade had he not suffered a tragic death in 2019.

Looking around at what happens in the economy can teach us a lot. I have often used this approach. While we can't put the economy or society in a lab, we can observe situations where the world provides us with the next best thing and draw conclusions with implications for policies to enhance prosperity for

seasons for ducks over the last few years."

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SINGING

Our concern is the music in the worship of the New Testament church. Ephesians 5: 19 says: "Speaking to one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord." Colossians 3: 16 says: "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom, teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord." When we sing, we must not allow the words simply to roll from our lips, while failing to allow the message of the song to engage our minds or penetrate our hearts.

We learn that our singing is reciprocal i. e. "Teaching and admonishing ONE ANOTHER," "Speaking to ONE ANOTHER." We are to sing "psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs." When we sing, we "teach and admonish ONE ANOTHER." Our singing is to be "vocal," i. e., "SINGING" and making melody in our hearts to the Lord." Our singing is both vertical and horizontal directed "to the LORD," and "to ONE ANOTHER." Singing involves "teaching" and "speaking," which involves words, not just sounds, such as humming. Our singing must "teach truth," therefore it is just as wrong to sing error as to preach error! Our singing must "come from the heart." Having said all of that, we must "sing with understanding."

There are only two kinds of music; vocal (voice) and mechanical (piano, organ, etc.), and the New Testament authorizes vocal (SINGING). Thus, playing a mechanical instrument in worship is not vocal, and therefore is an addition to the Word of God. Adding to the Word of God is a serious matter to God. (Rev. 22: 8-9). Why do we sing and not use mechanical music in our worship? Singing is authorized and mechanical music is not! Think on these things.

Actual delivery date may vary depending on origin, destination, Post Office acceptance date and time, and other conditions. Some restrictions apply. For Priority Mail Express shipments mailed Dec. 22 through Dec. 25, the money-back guarantee applies only if the shipment was not delivered, or delivery was not attempted, within two business days.

Busiest Time

The busiest time of the season for the Postal Service begins two weeks before Christmas. It's expected that customer traffic at all Post Office locations will steadily increase beginning the week of Dec. 6, with the week of Dec. 13-18 anticipated to be the busiest mailing, shipping and delivery week of the season.

Skip the Trip and Ship Online

Consumers don't even have to leave home to ship their packages, simply visit usps.com. The Postal Service anticipates Dec. 19 will be the Postal Service's busiest day online with 12.5 million consumers predicted to visit usps.com for help shipping that special holiday gift. And usps.com is always open.

It's estimated nearly 500,000 consumers will use the Click-N-Ship feature and other online services on Dec. 14 to order free Priority Mail boxes, print shipping labels, purchase postage and even request free next-day Package Pickup.

Kids love the magic of Halloween, but many communities canceled their celebrations in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. So, is it safe to trick-or-treat this year?

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Director Rochelle Walensky, in a Sept. 26 interview, said yes, but families still should use caution. The CDC also updated its holiday safety tips, applicable to all of the upcoming holidays.

Of course, Halloween costume and traffic safety measures still apply for trick-or-treaters.

Costume Safety

To help ensure adults and children have a safe holiday, fda.gov has compiled a list of Halloween safety tips. Before Halloween arrives, be sure to choose a costume that won't cause safety hazards.

- All costumes, wigs and accessories should be fire-resistant
- If children are allowed out after dark, fasten reflective tape to their costumes and bags, or give them glow sticks







- Opt for nontoxic Halloween makeup over masks, which can obscure vision; always test makeup in a small area first to see if any irritation develops
- Remove all makeup before children go to bed to prevent skin and eye irritation

When They're on the Prowl

Here's a scary statistic: Children are more than twice as likely to be hit by a car and killed on Halloween than on any other day of the year. Lack of visibility because of low lighting at night also plays a factor in these incidents.

- Keep these tips in mind when your children are out on Halloween night:
- A responsible adult should accompany young children on the neighborhood rounds
- If your older children are going alone, plan and review a route acceptable to you
 - Agree on a specific time children should return home
 - Teach your children never to enter a stranger's home or car
- Instruct children to travel only in familiar, well-lit areas and stick with their friends
- Tell your children not to eat any treats until they return home, and take care to avoid any food allergies
- Children and adults are reminded to put electronic devices down, keep heads up and walk, don't run, across the street

Safety Tips for Motorists

NSC offers these additional safety tips for parents – and anyone who plans to be on the road during trick-or-treat hours:

- Watch for children walking on roadways, medians and curbs
- Enter and exit driveways and alleys carefully
- At twilight and later in the evening, watch for children in dark
- Discourage new, inexperienced drivers from driving on Halloween



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
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



Eight arrested by UCSSIU

The Special Investigations Unit of the Upshur County Sheriff's Office arrested eight persons on various felony charges in September, Sheriff Larry Webb said Monday.

All suspects were taken to the county jail, he said. Details of the cases, based on a report from sheriff's Lt. Gary Shirley, were as follows, and all arrests resulted from traffic stops unless otherwise indicated, said Webb:

Dylan Ramey, 29, of Gilmer, was arrested on multiple charges Sept. 2 when the unit stopped the motorcycle he was riding at the intersection of FM 726 and Texas 300 near East Mountain.

When the unit learned the motorcycle had been reported to Longview police as stolen, Dylan was arrested on a charge of unauthorized use of motor vehicle, and on two outstanding Harrison County warrants charging him with engaging in organized crime.

Zachary J. Collins, 40, of Longview, was charged with possession of controlled substance--less than one gram of methamphetamine--Sept. 8

when the unit stopped his vehicle at the intersection of Redbud and Titus Streets while investigating narcotics in the Gilmer area. The drug was seized.

Two Gilmerites were arrested on drug-related charges Sept. 16 when the unit stopped their vehicle while performing drug interdiction in the Harmony community area. Methamphetamine and heroin were seized in the stop at Texas 154 and FM 1002 in Rhonesboro community area.

Jeffery Wayne Boone, 45, was charged with possession of controlled substance--less than one gram, while Amber Kay Berrington, 33, was charged with possession of controlled substance--at least one gram but fewer than four. Webb did not know which drug(s) each suspect was charged with possessing.

In the same Rhonesboro area that day, the SUI observed and arrested Kenneth Melvin Williams Jr. 47, of Gilmer, a man authorities knew had two Upshur of methamphetamine--Sept. County warrants for failure to register as sex offender.

Louis Wilson, 35, of Gilmer, was arrested on multiple felony charges and a misdemeanor charge Sept. 21 when the unit located the wanted man at his residence.

He is accused of evading arrest with a vehicle, possession of a controlled substance (the nature of which was not specified)-more than one gram, but under four--and felony theft of at least \$2,500 but under \$30,000. He was also charged with misdemeanor assault/family violence.

Dalton Dale Rogers, 39, of Hawkins was charged with manufacture/delivery of controlled substance--more than four, but less than 200 grams of methamphetamine--when arrested Sept. 23.

During a narcotics probe, the SIU stopped him at the intersection of Mimosa and South Caribou and, with the assistance of K-9 dog Marco, seized 15 grams of methamphetamine.

Kathy Laverne Gamble, 61, of Gilmer, was charged with possession of controlled substance--less than one gram 23 when the unit which was investigating suspicious activity in the Glenwood community area stopped her at the intersection of Whitewood and Cedarwood Roads. The drug was seized.

Man arrested in powerstation damage case

The Upshur County Sheriff's Office investigation into the September 1, 2021 damage to an Upshur Rural Electric Cooperative substation has resulted in the arrest of one person and a warrant being issued for another.

On September 1, 2021, Upshur County Deputies responded to the Upshur Rural Electric substation on Bluebird Road for a reported fire.

At the location deputies discovered that actors had cut copper wiring at the facility. This led to overheating of instruments and an eventual fire, causing and causing power outage to several thousand locations.

Deputies also discovered

evidence of recent damage to an abandoned well-site that is immediately east of the substation, owned by Centerpoint Energy. During the course of this

investigation, it became known that the same actors were involved in oil well site thefts in the Gregg County area.

Upshur County investigators, along with investigators from the Gregg County Sheriff's Office, Longview Police Department, Texas Game Wardens, and The

serious damage to the substation Gregg County Organized Drug Enforcement Unit all worked together during the investigation and apprehension in this case.

> The investigation lead to the arrest of Christopher Dean Robertson, 34 years of age, of Gilmer on the charge of Criminal Mischief over 30,000 dollars under 150,000 dollars, a third degree felony, in relation to the Upshur Rural Electric Cooperative Substation. Bond was set at \$100,000 dollars for this charge by Justice of the Peace Betterton.

In addition to this charge, Robertson is charged with 9 counts of Tampering with Oil/Gas Rigs To Limit Control/Operation, 3rd Degree Felony, stemming from thefts and damage to oil well locations in Gregg County (Bonds set at 10,000 dollars for each count by Judge Betterton) and an Unauthorized Use of Motor Vehicle charge (State Jail Felony, bond set at 100,000 dollars by Justice of the Peace Potter) stemming from his use of a stolen vehicle in the course of several of this incidents.

Robertson is currently housed at the Upshur County Jail.

An arrest warrant has also been issued for Christopher Richard Corbett, 35 years of age, of White Oak, for Criminal Mischief over 30,000/under 150,000 dollars, for his role in the September 1 damage to the Upshur Rural Electric Cooperative substation.

Sheriff Webb wishes to thank all involved agencies and personnel who helped make this case successful. This was a true team effort among several agencies.

COVID immunization clinic set

Another COVID immunization clinic in Gilmer is set Nov. 10 at the Gilmer Civic Center, Upshur County Extension Agent Julie York informed the county commissioners court at its Oct. 15 meeting.

The Texas Department of State Health Services will sponsor the free event from 3-6 p.m.at the center on U.S. 271, though hours can be expanded if there is sufficient interest from the public, she said. York said 918 received shots at a prior clinic at the center in March, and that a doctor will be on site this time.

Booster immunizations will be limited to those who are at least age 65 and/or "medically fragile," she added. Boosters also cannot be given someone until six months after they received their second immunization, but those who received their initial shots somewhere other than Gilmer can still get them at the Nov. 10 clinic, York noted.

The initial immunizations are offered to persons age 12 or older.

Booster shots will be from Pfizer, but the other shots may be either Pfizer, Moderna or Johnson and

Johnson, the agent said.

County Emergency Management Coordinator Marc Nichols said the immunizations are for both those who have had COVID, and those who haven't.

Those who have had the virus, though, should check with their doctor to see when they should receive the immunization, York said.

She also told the court that as of 3 p.m. the prior day, the county had recorded 125 deaths from COVID, had only an estimated 180 active cases, and an estimated 5,433 recoveries.

As the Oct. 15 meeting opened, County Judge Todd Tefteller announced that former interim County Judge Jim Bowling had recently died from the disease.

Tefteller had the audience observe a few moments of silence in memory of Bowling, who had appeared to be in good health when he appeared before the court only a few months ago to discuss an issue and who served as interim judge about 10 years ago.

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
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Bears drill Necks 48-14
