"All of our team will be there," Mayor Brandy Flanagan told audience members at the city council's regular meeting last week. Texas Opioid Abatement Fund Council Awards \$21.2 Million, 109 Grants to Combat Statewide Opioid Crisis

the Texas Opioid Abatement Fund Council (OAFC or the Council) has voted distribute the funds on a reimbursement basis. to award 109 grants totaling \$21.2 million to entities across Texas responding to the opioid crisis.

This vote marks a major accomplishment for the program.

"Today represents a significant milestone," said Hancock, who chairs the Council. "For the first time, the Council has awarded grants to communities in every region of our state. We look forward to seeing how these resources will change lives, as local organizations put them to work supporting individuals and families impacted by the opioid crisis across Texas."

These funds were made available through the Short-term Communitybased Opioid Recovery Effort (CORE) grant opportunity, which allocates the funding to each of the 20 Regional Healthcare Partnerships (RHP) in Texas.

OAFC awarded grants to proposals that aligned with Council-approved strategies in the following categories: treatment and coordination of care, prevention and public safety, recovery support services, and workforce development and training. This grant opportunity is for short-term projects, and the maximum grant award is \$250,000 or 20 percent of the total funds

"I am honored, as part of the Council, to support organizations across the state that are working tirelessly to confront the opioid crisis," said Dr. Pedro Fernandez, a member of the Council. "By awarding these grants, we are empowering communities, expanding access to lifesaving care and building the capacity needed to bring hope and healing to the Texans most affected — a central goal of the Council's mission."

The Texas Legislature formed the OAFC in 2021 to ensure money recovered through the joint efforts of the state and its political subdivisions from statewide opioid settlement agreements is allocated fairly and spent to remediate the opioid crisis using efficient, cost-effective methods. The OAFC is made up of 13 appointed experts and administered by Hancock, who serves as the non-voting presiding officer.

"Tonight we have the privilege of recognizing two people whose generosity and love for Gladewater have touched nearly every department of our city."

I planned to go to my childhood home on the ranch last week and troubleshoot stuff I have had on the back burner for far too long. This Friday I was supposed to be headed to Lubbock to surprise my Mom for her 93rd birthday. But I can't after possible exposure in the hospital. And by the way, my brilliant medical doctor who is a former high school journalism student of mine said the COVID fast test is extremely unreliable. Daughter-in-heart agrees 100 percent. Just sayin'.

So here is what I have learned in the last week or so: My son chose not only a wonderful wife who is gifted at what she does, he chose the daughter I cherish. My son is courageous, smart, funny and driven to



make a difference. I knew all of that already, but to say I am proud of him pales in light of his service.

The staff at Christus GSMC is phenomenal almost to a person whether they are delivering meals, cleaning, nursing or in transport. Gifted orthopedic surgeon Dr. Littlejohn ain't no slouch either. The Christus spiritual support is not surprising, but it most certainly is uplifting.

And, I know with every fiber of my being that hot, hot baths are never ever to be taken for granted...especially after five days. I truly am thankful for the gift of hot water and my spa tub.

Finally, I am homesick for black dirt, front porches and coffee, cattle at early evening grazing near the house. Life changes. Our lifestyle changes. We may not change as much, at least not on the inside. I will get to the ranch. I will get out to see my Mom and West Texas family in Lubbock. And it will be the right time when it happens.

When I look at the last week I see how good life really is. Family to love and support and encourage us. Family to help carry the load. People who care...whether they are pushing a mop or a syringe. And the sunsets out our west facing hospital room window were phenomenal. A reminder, along with the prayers over the intercom that there is a plan, there is peace in the midst of chaos and there most definitely is love.

DPS officers arrest thousands of undocumented immigrants

In an operation being called "Lone Star 2.0," more than 3,000 undocumented immigrants have been arrested by Texas Department of Public Safety officers this year, according to records obtained by The Texas Tribune. As illegal border crossings plunge, state police are shifting their energies toward aiding the Trump administration's mass deportation effort.

From late January through early September, DPS recorded 3,131 arrests by specialty teams created at the direction of Gov. Greg Abbott and previously unreported. Nearly all those arrests were for allegedly violating federal immigration laws, a role once performed exclusively by federal authorities.

"Operation Lone Star 2.0 is underway statewide — with DPS personnel working to combat and interdict criminal activity with a nexus to the border," DPS spokesperson Sheridan Nolen said in an email.

Only the federal government has the authority to enforce immigration violations. State and local police cannot arrest someone solely for being undocumented without agreements made with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security or the agencies under its umbrella, The Tribune reported.

Unlike the original Lone Star initiative along the border, DPS officials have remained tight-lipped about its deportation efforts in the state's interior.

Nearly half of Texas counties are maternal care deserts

A recent report concludes that 47% of Texas counties are "maternity care deserts, The Dallas Morning News reported. The report from the nonprofit March of Dimes concludes those counties have no obstetric providers, birth centers, hospitals with obstetric units, and no OB-GYNs or family doctors who practice obstetrics. Further, another report indicates that 93 of the state's 160 rural hospitals do not have labor and delivery units.

Shortages of obstetric care occur throughout the state, regardless of geography, though rural areas are most affected. As a result, rural mothers are at much higher risk of death than mothers in urban areas. In some areas, maternal death rates in rural areas are nearly double the rates of urban areas.

The Texas Legislature approved more than \$300 million in funding for rural health care in hopes of boosting rural hospitals.

"Anything in the positive helps," said Dr. Kia Parsi, executive director of Texas A&M's Rural and Community Health Institute, "but we are not at the point where we have stabilized rural maternal health care."


Media organizations want Paxton divorce records unsealed

Eight Texas news organizations are asking a state judge to unseal records in the divorce case of Attorney General Ken Paxton and his wife, state Sen. Angela Paxton, R-McKinney.

Lawyers for the news organizations argue that the Paxtons are both public officials, the Houston Chronicle reported. Hearst Newspapers, owners of the Chronicle and several Texas newspapers, is one of the groups suing. They argue that the public has a legitimate interest in information regarding allegations of adultery and requests to disproportionately divide the couple's property.

"The public has a compelling and legitimate interest in understanding the conduct of these public officers, the nature and extent of assets held by these long-serving public officers, and any allegations of fault, misconduct, or abuse of trust—particularly where such issues may bear on the performance of official duties, the ethical obligations of office, or AG Paxton's service in current or future public office," reads the filing by Tyler J. Bexley and Joel W. Reese of law firm Reese Marketos, LLP.

Angela Paxton filed for divorce in July after 38 years of marriage, citing adultery as the reason. The case was sealed by a Collin County judge at her request. Ken Paxton is running in the GOP primary next March against incumbent U.S. Sen. John Cornyn.



Global Markets

For much of the past decade, the US stock market has dramatically outperformed its global counterparts. A major reason is the emergence and dominance of the US technology sector and the rapid expansion of "mega-cap" companies such as Alphabet (Google), Apple, Meta, Microsoft, Amazon, Tesla, and Nvidia. However, there are signs that international equities may be making a comeback.

Thus far this year, international stocks are enjoying higher returns than those of US firms by some measures. This phenomenon has not been limited to a single region, as numerous markets have shown impressive gains. Historically, the performance leader has swung from the US to the rest of the world and back multiple times, and several key factors are contributing to this current shift.

One reason is the high values of US stocks, particularly in the technology sector, which have been trading at a significant premium compared to international equities. Price-to-earnings ratios for US stocks have been higher for quite a while. In fact, the valuation gap is the widest that it has been in decades. As a result, other major markets are becoming a more attractive proposition for value-seeking investors.

In addition, many countries began easing up on monetary policy before the United States. The Federal Reserve has not yet reduced interest rates this year (following three moves in 2024), while central banks elsewhere (particularly in Europe) have implemented cuts. Much of this pattern stems from the potential inflationary effects of tariffs and the resilience of domestic growth. Nonetheless, this approach has put US economic prospects and corporate earnings at a comparative disadvantage.

Another factor is that, while US market strength has been

highly concentrated in relatively few technology-oriented stocks, other sectors, such as financials and industrials, are now showing some momentum. These segments are more heavily represented in international markets, thus enhancing the attractiveness of global investments.

Despite the performance of international stocks, investors have been slow to shift until recently. There is growing acknowledgment of the risks associated with concentration in the US market due to high valuations and the importance of a small number of firms to overall returns. Additionally, US firms are affected by various domestic policy issues which have brought unprecedented uncertainty and notable volatility of late (though many nations face significant challenges).

International markets are gaining significant ground due to more attractive valuations, favorable monetary policy, and a different mix of companies. The underlying driver of stock markets is expected firm profitability which is in turn dependent on economic conditions and innovation. While the US equities markets will remain the gold standard, there are definitive signs that global dynamics are shifting. The coming months should be quite interesting to watch. Stay safe!

THE SERIOUSNESS OF SIN #4

What is needed to solve the problem of sin? Our worst-case scenario is that man has sinned and stands condemned (Rom. 3: 23). The penalty is physical death on earth (Heb. 9: 27) and spiritual death as everlasting punishment for sin in eternity (Matt. 25: 46; Isa. 59: 1-2). This being true, is there any hope for man?

Search as we may, we will find that money and wealth are not enough to take care of the problem of sin. The apostle Peter wrote: "For you know that God paid a ransom to save you from the empty (aimless) life you inherited from your ancestors. And the ransom He paid was not mere gold or silver. He paid for you with the precious lifeblood of Christ, the sinless, spotless Lamb of God" (1 Pet. 1: 18). New Living Translation. While money and wealth can be a great tool for good if it is used wisely, God who owns all things does not need our money and will not receive it as a bribe nor a ransom for our soul.

We also learn that the works of man's own righteousness are insufficient to pay the price for sin. Titus 3: 5 says: "Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to His mercy He saved us, through the washing of regeneration and the renewing of the Holy Spirit." The New Testament in Modern English has "Not by virtue of any moral achievements of ours." Man's works, however sincere will not take away sin. But still, many still believe that man can save himself. This is one of the delusions of the "New Age" philosophy. It teaches that salvation comes not from without (someone else coming to our rescue) but from within (as we discover ourselves and our own resources. So "Look unto yourself" Shirley Maclaine urges us. "Explore yourself, for all the answers are within yourself." In her book which is revealingly titled "Going Within," she writes that "The New Age is all about self-responsibility, i.e. tasking responsibility for everything that happens, since the only source is ourselves."

Old Testament animal sacrifices cannot solve the sin problem. Though they were accepted under the Law of Moses, such were not enough to rescue man from his sin problem Heb. 10:4 says: "For it is not possible that the blood of bulls and goats should take away sins." If something is not possible then it is impossible! But consider this: It is just as impossible for man to achieve salvation from sin by the "five pillars of Islam," or, by "Hindu resolutions or renunciation," or, by "Buddhist ethics," or, by the nuances of the "New Age philosophy," or by the teaching of "Joseph Smith, Jr."

What then, is the answer for man's sin-problem? We will address this next week. Stay tuned. Think on these things





Labor Day weekend marks fewer boating incidents, rise in fatalities

AUSTIN – Texas Game Wardens patrolling water bodies across the state over the 2025 Labor Day holiday weekend reported fewer boating incidents compared to last year, but a rise in boating-related fatalities.

From Aug. 29-Sept. 1, game wardens responded to seven boating incidents, two boating-related fatalities and no openwater drownings.

They also arrested seven individuals for boating while intoxicated. In 2024, wardens reported nine boating incidents, one boating-related fatality and one open-water drowning over the same holiday period.

The two fatalities this year occurred on Lake Buchanan and Lake Conroe. In 2024, the single fatality occurred at Amistad Reservoir.

"We are saddened by the lives lost over the holiday weekend," said Col. Ron VanderRoest, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement director. "Our wardens work tirelessly to prevent tragedies, but these incidents reinforce that safety on the water is a partnership, and we need the public to always practice safe and responsible boating."

As in previous years, the busy holiday weekend also coincided with the opening of dove season, requiring game wardens to balance duties on the water with hunting enforcement in the field.

Even though Labor Day typically marks the end of the unofficial boating season, safety should remain a priority for all who continue to enjoy Texas' lakes, rivers and coastal waters into the fall. Wearing life jackets, operating at a safe speed, avoiding alcohol while boating, and following the rules and regulations in the Texas Water Safety Act can save lives and prevent serious injuries.

"Whether it's on the water or in the field, Texas Game Wardens are committed to protecting Texans and conserving our state's natural resources," VanderRoest said.

If you witness dangerous or illegal activity on the water or observe wildlife crimes in the field, report them anonymously through Operation Game Thief (OGT), Texas' wildlife crimestoppers program. Rewards of up to \$1,000 are available for tips that lead to conviction of those who violate wildlife, fishing or boating laws.

"You can make a donation to help with the candy," the chamber's Lois Reed reminded city council members last



Rotarians partner with ramp project for simple builds that change lives

Imagine being trapped indoors by a drop of just a couple

Imagine an injury, infirmity, illness that turns the front steps into a life-threatening obstacle.

Imagine a loved one, a child or elderly relative, stuck in the home because their wheelchair, cane, or unsteady feet put the world outside beyond reach.

The solution could be as simple as a few hundred dollars, a few hours of work, a few volunteers pitching in to rescue

their neighbor from isolation. "It's just one of those things that's a labor of love," Leon

Word says. He's lost track of how many ramps he's helped craft over the years.

"Probably close to 100," Word muses, the bulk of them in Gladewater and Big Sandy. Between the Texas Ramp Project and Gladewater Rotary Club, there are plenty of opportunities to pitch in, and Word's always eager to pass on the necessary skills to another volunteer.

The next chance to help out is coming up Sept. 27. Another local has found themselves on the wrong side of their front steps, and a wooden ramp will make all the difference.

According to the Texas Ramp Project, more than 1.7 million Texans find themselves imprisoned by mobility issues. Most are older adults, and many are unable to afford safe access to their homes.

This year, the nonprofit is celebrating its 40th anniversary and marking more than 30,000 ramps built for free for Texans in need.

"I went to the state convention last year, and you're always learning new tips and things to do to make it more efficient," Word says. He's steadily refined the local process, working with his fellow Rotarians to assemble ramp modules well ahead of their project days. "If I can get the help and preschedule the date we're going to build it, I can get the lumber and pre-cut it."

It's not unlike the floor joist on a pier and beam house.

"The modules we build are 4 wide, 8 long, 4x4. Some of the have a 5-degree cut because of the angle – the ADA

specs call for one inch per footfall; that's a 5-degree angle." Beyond the pre-assembly, the other key task is assembling a team.

"This is all volunteer help, so I have to coordinate building a ramp when I have enough help," Word explained. "A six-member team is good, and anyone else is just icing on the cake.'

Right before the project, all the materials are packaged into a kit and strapped to a trailer.

"You get there and lay it out then you get busy putting it together. It's not simple and easy, but in your mind it's simple and easy," Word says, lasting just three hours. Only the temperature slows things down – for water breaks. "When it's cool weather we just get in there and get it over with.

"We started painting our plywood deck before we take it to the job; that makes it where the cub scout crew doesn't

have to come in later and paint. It looks good when you're finished."

A short ramp runs \$300 or \$400; a long one, between \$500 and \$600.

Importantly, no costs are passed on to recipients.

Not a penny, Word says: "That's what Texas Ramps is about. We get our building material money from grants and donations and wherever people can donate."

Some of the largest sponsors, like Toyota, field build teams as well.

There are recipients who insist on helping out, of course. "It's passing it forward...

Everybody loves helping, one way or another, even the referral recipients.

It's just a good thing. It really is. It's very efficient. It's

very heartwarming."

It's changing lives.

"When you go out and site-survey a ramp referral, the people actually start crying because they know it's going to enhance their life, get them out of their house. I

"t nothing else, they can go check the mail or get out in the flower bed."

It's a natural outreach for Rotary, Word added, a service organization focused on improving the community by giving people access to a better life.

"It's just something that I love doing," he said. "Everybody on my team, I can honestly say, love to build a ramp for someone to enhance their life.

"It's wonderful. It is."

Reward offered in missing person case

Upshur County Crime Stoppers is continuing to offer a reward of up to \$2,500 for information leading to locating either or both of two missing county residents, Crime Stoppers President Cynthia Clark reminded Monday.

Anonymous tips can be left by calling 903-843-3131, and a person can collect a reward without revealing his/her name. Alternatively, informants can call Upshur County sheriff's Investigator Rob Bowen at 903-680-8223 or the sheriff's office at 903-843-2541, but must call the Crime Stoppers number to collect any reward.

Maria (Mary) Magdalena De La Cruz, 31, was last seen in northern Upshur County May 8, with Octavio Munguai Soto, 38, said sheriff's Chief Deputy Russell Washburn in a mid-May news release. Both have Pittsburg addresses, but live in Upshur County, he added.

Soto, who also goes by the name Enrique Carbajal, and De La Cruz are thought to be in a white 2013 Nissan Sentry four-door, with a black strip along the bottom and Texas license plate VVV 4013, said Washburn.

De La Cruz's family has located her car and belongings, he added in the news release. Soto has had no contact with his family, and the woman's parents are concerned about her whereabouts. Washburn added at the time

The woman and Soto knew each other, but aren't related, Washburn added.

As for more details of the situation, Washburn said in May, "We really don't know what we have at the moment," and he said Monday no further developments have transpired since the disappearances first surfaced.

Clark said Monday that De La Cruz's family contacted Crime Stoppers about the case.
