## Invasive visual recording at UG nets indictment

The Upshur County Grand Jury has indicted a 17-year-old Gladewater man on a charge of "invasive visual recording" of a fellow male Union Grove High School student.

Preston Grant Travis, who was indicted Sept. 18, is charged with recording the other student in a bathroom stall and "sharing" the recording with others, Upshur County District Attorney Billy Byrd said Monday. Travis, charged with committing the felony offense April 1, was ar-

rested Oct. 3 and freed on \$25,000 bond, Byrd's office said. Upshur County Sheriff Larry Webb, who Byrd said is required by law to notify a school when one of its students is indicted, said Monday Travis is still a Union Grove student "as far as I know." The Mirror was unable to contact the school Monday as classes were out this entire week.

Travis' case was among 14 indictments, six of them sealed, which jurors returned Sept. 18 in Gilmer, Byrd reported Oct. 10. His office said the jury also passed on one case and no-billed two others, the natures of which weren't disclosed.

Donovan Jeremiah Rojas Christian, 20, of Longview, burglary of a habitation on May 11. He was released on \$25,000 bond.

Taylor Lee White, a Longview man who turned 33 Oct. 7, possession of controlled substance (fentanyl) on July 31. He was freed on \$10,000 bond. Timothy Dean Scruggs, 52, of Kilgore, assault/family violence with

previous conviction on May 9. He posted \$3,500 bond, but was released to another agency and sent to the Gregg County Jail. Jennifer Nicole Tucker, 40, of Onalaska, theft of property (worth) less than \$2,500 with two or more previous convictions--enhanced. (Enhanced

means that, if convicted, Tucker could face a stiffer sentence for the alleged Aug. 19 offense than someone without previous convictions). She remained in the Upshur County Jail at Gilmer under \$20,000 bond.

Devang Patel, 40, of Melissa, attempted financial abuse of elderly individual on June 12, 2024. He was freed on \$50,000 bond. Terra Kay Davis, 42, of Gilmer, possession of controlled substance


(methamphetamine) on April 26. She was released on \$45,000 bond. Rodney Allen Smith, 45, of Longview, possession of controlled substance (methamphetamine) on May 12, 2024. He posted \$25,000 bond, but was released to another agency and sent to Gregg County Jail in

Identity of anyone charged in the sealed indictments wasn't disclosed because no arrest had been made in those cases, Byrd said.

They included, his office reported, two for possession of controlled substance (heroin) with intent to deliver, and two for aggravated sexual assault of a child--one of which was a single indictment on three counts of that charge.

The others, the office added, included one indictment each for possession of controlled substance (methamphetamine) with intent to deliver and delivery of controlled substance (methamphetamine).

## Gladewater leaders may elevate discussion of cemetery spaces

When land's limited, don't build out – build up. That may be the solution for Gladewater Memorial Park. On Thursday, city council members will discuss the possibility of constructing a columbarium.

Yes, we had to look it up.

According to Oxford Languages, a columbarium is "a room or building with niches for funeral urns to be stored." Not too complicated, but it would be a new development for burials here, an alternative to a previous strategy to re-plat a portion of the cemetery with smaller spaces for cremated remains.

"They'll hold up to 40 cremation urns," Gladewater

City Manager Charlie Smith said. City Hall personnel will present their relevant research to the council during their 6 p.m. meeting Thursday, the regularly third-Thursday session for the local elected officials.

In addition to standard agenda items, the October itinerary includes the presentation of a proclamation for Domestic Violence Awareness Month as well as a presentation from the Longview Ladies Auxiliary to the Gladewater Fire Department Bucket Brigade.

GFD Chief Mike Simmons will make separate presentation on an emergency action plan, and the council is set for discussion and consideration to make Veterans Day a city holiday – not for the first time, but possibly for the last if the elected officials make the change permanent. They'll also weigh a street and infrastructure master plan, following up on summertime talks.

My husband's beloved Granny fought it with the help of her family as long as she could and had seven years more of life, but died far too soon, at the same age I am now.

Medicine has come a long way. Treatments for cancer are better than ever. But that doesn't change the fear of the unknown that comes with the diagnosis. So we keep fighting as long as we can. And we keep supporting those we love as long as we can. Until there is no more time.

Today is all we have. Today, this moment, is our life. Let's try to live it as fully, as joyfully, as courageously and kindly as we can.

That is the gift we have before us...this day.

I pray that your gift of life, today, is filled with much laughter and love.

## Fannie and Freddie

There has recently been speculation regarding an initial public offering (IPO) to at least partially reprivatize Fannie Mae (Federal National Mortgage Association) and Freddie Mac (Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation), two huge public entities which buy mortgages from lenders to increase their liquidity, enable more mortgages, and facilitate homeownership in the US.

Fannie Mae was created by Congress in 1938 (as part of the National Housing Act), with Freddie Mac being chartered in 1970. After buying mortgages from banks and other entities, they either hold the loans or bundle them into mortgage-backed securities to be sold to private investors. Over time, each entity was reorganized to include shareholders. Nonetheless, because there was at least implicit government backing, Fannie and Freddie enjoyed some competitive advantage over other institutions.

In 2008, amidst the housing and financial crisis that precipitated the Great Recession, both firms incurred huge losses and were placed into conservatorship under the Federal Housing Finance Agency, with the Treasury extending substantial support. Since that time, they have returned to profitability, with billions in net income each year.

Together Freddie and Fannie guarantee or own trillions in mortgage debt and account for most new originations. Clearly, their health and structure are critical to the housing market and the economy. There are, however, sound reasons to consider reprivatizing them at least to some extent, an idea which is gaining traction in financial circles.

One rationale for private ownership is to reduce taxpayer risk and shift it to shareholders. In addition, privatization would level the playing field with other firms, potentially enhancing competition. It might also promote greater discipline due to market scrutiny, enhance capital allocation, better control costs, and support

product innovation. Even a relatively small ownership percentage made available in an offering could also generate tens of billions for the Treasury.

It should be noted, however, that executing such an IPO is complex and faces political, regulatory, and market obstacles. One significant concern is that mortgage rates could rise modestly without Freddie and Fannie's implicit government guarantee, thus frustrating homeownership efforts in a market already dealing with elevated borrowing costs and spiraling insurance premiums. Moreover, the entities would need additional capital to comply with private-sector standards, thus potentially limiting the amount of capital available for housing purchases.

Not surprisingly, the six largest US banks and many smaller ones are jockeying for roles in the potential underwriting process, and other activities are underway. Nevertheless, it is a very complicated endeavor dependent on the right combination of political will, regulatory reform, and market conditions. If done properly, reprivatization could bring market discipline, reduced taxpayer risk, and enhanced value. If poorly executed, however, it could destabilize mortgage finance and increase borrowing costs. Stay safe!

#### Redistricting attracts a spate of **GOP** candidates

Redrawing the state's congressional maps, though being challenged in court, has drawn 114 Republican candidates in the state's 38 districts with nearly two months left until the filing deadline, the Houston Chronicle reported.

The Texas Legislature redrew the maps at the request of President Donald Trump in hopes of gaining five additional GOP seats. As a result, there are winnable seats for Republicans in Houston, San Antonio and Dallas that have drawn 19 GOP candidates to date.

Two Republican members of Congress are seeking statewide office instead of trying to hold on to their current seats. Chip Roy, who represents a Central Texas district, is running for Texas attorney general, while Houston Republican Wesley Hunt recently jumped into the U.S. Senate race.

In addition, Michael McCaul, R-Austin, and Morgan Luttrell, R-Houston, are not seeking reelection. Those four open seats have drawn 25 GOP candidates.

#### Company tapped to run school voucher program

A New York tech company has been picked to administer the state's new school choice program, the Texas Standard reported. The billion-dollar program passed in the regular legislative session will help parents use taxpayer money to pay for private school tuition, homeschooling expenses, and other educational expenses.

Odyssey, the company, manages education funding in several other states. It will be responsible for both processing applications and ranking families to determine who gets access to funding.

Anyone can apply as long as they have a child eligible to go to public school in K-12 as well as 4-year-olds who are eligible for pre-kindergarten.

Odyssey can receive up to 5% of the total school choice appropriation of \$1 billion, meaning it could earn up to \$50 million for administering the voucher program.

#### Roberson's execution date paused by Texas court

Just a week before his scheduled execution date, the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals stayed the execution of Robert Roberson in the death of his two-year-old daughter in 2002. Roberson was convicted of capital murder the following year for shaken baby syndrome, a diagnosis since discredited by most scientists. His case has drawn widespread attention and calls for his exoneration.

The Austin American-Statesman reported that the state's highest criminal court decided to send the case back to trial in Anderson County, where he was convicted. The court cited the case of Andrew Wayne Roark, a North Texas man who was exonerated in a similar "shaken baby syndrome" case.

One of the judges wrote a concurring opinion: "As identified in Roark, our scientific understanding of what has become known as Shaken Baby Syndrome has significantly advanced. Because of this deeper understanding, certain assumptions and conclusions that were once thought to be true may not be."

Roberson, now 58, claims his daughter fell out of the bed in the middle of the night in 2002. He soothed her to sleep, and upon checking on her later that night, found that she was not breathing. She was pronounced dead at an emergency room the next day, and Roberson was eventually charged and convicted of capital murder.

#### Agency raising awareness of screwworm threat

The Texas Department of State Health Services is calling for increased awareness among health professionals and the public about the New World screwworm. This parasitic fly can threaten the health of both animals and humans.

The screwworm was previously eradicated in the United States in the 1960s but remained endemic in most of Central and South America. Cases were detected in Mexico in November 2024, raising concerns that it would make its way back across the border.

## Bears defeat Leopards, 'Necks fall

The Gladewater Bears looked to remain undefeated in district as they hit the road for the long road trip to Texarkana to take on the Liberty Eylau Leopards. And the Bears were able to come home with that perfect district in tact with a dominant 46-20 victory.

The Bears won the toss and deferred to the second half and Liberty Eylau got the ball first. But after one first down, they ended up punting and on their first possession of the game Gladewater couldn't do anything and punted themselves. But another quick three and out drive from the Leopards, Gladewater blocked their punt which set them up with great field position and the Bears took advantage as Carson Cooper broke off a 30 yard touchdown run and the Bears converted the 2 point conversion to take a 8-0 lead.

The Gladewater defense then went to work as Tra Watts intercepted Leopards quarterback Huntley Fisher to give the Bears the ball right back. Then on the first play of the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter, Jeremiah Flanagan broke free for a 35 yard touchdown run and it was 15-0 lead.

Another interception by the Gladewater defense, this time by Aubry Floyd got the ball right back for Gladewater and they again added to their lead before the half as Achillies

Hess ran it in from 10 yards out and it was all Bears at the half 22-0.

The Bears took the ball to start the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter and added three more to the lead with 35 yard field goal by Grafton Morgan to make it 25-0 but Liberty Eylau finally got their offense going with a pair of touchdowns to cut the lead 25-14 midway through the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter.

But the Bears continued to take advantage of Liberty Eylau mistakes as they recovered a muffed punt and Hess found Kayson Harris for a beautiful 26 yard touchdown to make it a 32-14 Bears lead.

The Leopards again cut into the lead with a touchdown to make it 32-20 to begin the 4th quarter. But the Bears put it away with a pair of scores in the 4th as Flannigan found the end zone for a 2 yard touchdown and finally Hess punched it in for a 4 yard touchdown.

"We made sure all week we were ready to go. This was our longest road trip of the season and we came out clicking.

"Which is exactly what I wanted to see. Couldn't be more proud of these kids and coaches" said coach Jermaine Lewis.





A judge sentenced Marcus Andrew Holloway to 25 years in prison as a habitual offender last week after the Tyler man pleaded guilty to driving while intoxicated-

The Texas Sixth Court of Appeals in Texarkana affirmed the sentence Oct. 8 for Treacy O'Brian Robbins, 52, of Kilgore, who Byrd said was convicted of "transporting motor" and Byrd said he requested the maximum fuel without manifest or shipping document."

The state assigned Byrd to specially prosecute the Dec. 16 proceeding in Longview after Gregg County District Attorney John his probation in 2018, and it was modified W. Moore disqualified himself from the case. Moore did so because he had represented Robbins when Moore was a private practice

attorney between 2015 and 2018, said Byrd. Robbins, who contested the revocation, had

pleaded guilty in March 2017 to the charge A state appeals court last week upheld the of "stealing large amounts of diesel fuel from his employer," and was placed on "deferred adjudication" probation, said Byrd.

> Under that type of probation, no final conviction appears on a defendant's record if he/she successfully completes probation. If such probation is revoked, however, up to the maximum sentence can be imposed. 20-year term, which 124th District Judge Alfonso Charles assessed after adjudicating Robbins guilty. Robbins violated terms of to include additional conditions, said Byrd. "After being given multiple opportunities to change," the defendant violated his probation for the fourth time when he was charged with driving while intoxicated.

## Help stamp out breast cancer

DALLAS — October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, and the U.S. Postal Service is reminding customers that they can help fund the cause by purchasing the Breast Cancer Research stamp.

These 90-cent self-adhesive semipostal stamps are available year-round in sheets of 20 to help raise funds for breast cancer research. Each stamp is equal to the First-Class Mail 1-ounce postage rate. The stamps are available at Post Offices nationwide, online at usps.com, by mail order through the USA Philatelic catalog or by calling 800-STAMP-24 (800-782-6724).

The amount the Postal Service contributes to breast cancer research is determined by the difference between the 90-cent purchase price and the First-Class Mail rate in effect at the time of purchase, minus any costs incurred by USPS. The distribution of the Postal Service contribution is specified by law, with 70 percent given to the National Institutes of Health and 30 percent given to the medical research program at the Department of Defense. The stamp has raised about \$98 million since its release in 1998.

The Breast Cancer Research stamp was the first semipostal stamp in U.S. history. In 1997, Congress authorized it for the specific purpose of raising funds from the American public to assist in finding a cure for breast cancer. Legislation was reauthorized by the Stamp Out Breast Cancer Reauthorization Act of 2019, which extended the stamp's sale authority through 2027.

In addition to the Breast Cancer Research stamp, the Postal Service offers three other fundraising stamps. The Save Vanishing Species semipostal stamp, first issued in 2011; the Alzheimer's semipostal stamp, issued in 2017; and the Healing PTSD semipostal stamp, issued in 2019.

All four stamps help raise money for causes in the national public interest and are available for purchase year-round.

# Sales tax stumbles for Gladewater, White Oak in October's allocation

Statewide sales tax revenues are up about 4 percent, but both Gladewater and White Oak saw their local allocations take a dive in October's check.

Gladewater's monthly cut from the Texas Comptroller's office was \$126,392 (based on sales in August by monthly filers) which marks a 13.21 percent decline from the same time last year. Likewise, White Oak's October allocation came in at \$118,201, an 11.7 percent dip from 12 months

Both communities are still in the black year-to-date, with Gladewater reaping about \$1.433 million so far this year (half a percent more than January through October 2024) alongside \$1.475 million for White Oak, a 10.24 percent

gain overall compared to the same period last year.

Statewide, acting Texas Comptroller Kelly Hancock's office distributed \$1.1 billion in local sales tax allocations to cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts this month. The total is 3.9 percent more than the state saw the same time last year.

October's allocations are based on August sales by businesses that report tax monthly.

nesses that report tax monthly.

Gregg County saw a 0.01 percent gain in October's check at \$1.654 million, putting the county up 3.33 percent for the year at \$16.9 million. Upshur County's 2.33 percent ahead of 2024 following this month's allocation of \$157,119, bring the YTD to \$1.6 million.

## Sabine River Authority grants \$20,000 for Gregg County ESD No. 2's new UTV

The Sabine River Authority of Texas (SRA) recently awarded Gregg County Emergency Services District #2 a Community Assistance Grant as part of SRA's Fiscal year 2025 Economic Development Initiative.

The \$20,000 check will be used to purchase a UTV for emergency response to off-road locations. The Polaris Ranger 1000 will especially be put to use by Sabine Fire & Rescue.

Per Sabine Fire Chief Richard Sisk, the vehicle will be an asset for wild land search and resc7ue, including gaining access to the Sabine riverbank and potential floodwaters.

"The Sabine River makes up 13 miles of Gregg County Emergency Service District 2's northern border between State Hwy. 31 and State Hwy. 42," Sisk noted. Likewise, the UTV "will be outfitted with wildland firefighting equipment to help mitigate grass and woodland fires," also equipped with EMS equipment for patient care and off-road transport.

According to David Montagne, SRA's Executive Vice President and General Manager, "These funds will allow Gregg County ESD #2 to respond to calls easier in remote locations," he said, "like areas along the Sabine River.

"With increased recreational activity along the waterway, it's important our first responders have the tools necessary to respond."

Community Assistance Grants are part of SRA's community assistance program approved by the SRA Board of Directors to help promote the quality and quantity of services essential for the development of a viable community.

The Sabine River Authority was created by the Texas Legislature in 1949 as an official agency of the State of Texas and covers all or part of 21 counties in East Texas. The Authority serves as a conservation and reclamation district with responsibilities to control, store, preserve and distribute the waters of the Sabine River and its tributary streams for useful purposes.
