KC names Dr. Staci Pollan Martin interim president Nov. 1

The Kilgore College Board of Trustees voted Oct. 20 to appoint Dr. Staci Pollan Martin as interim president of the college, effective Nov. 1.

Martin, who currently serves as KC's vice president of organizational effectiveness and excellence, will step into the interim role following the transition of Dr. Brenda Kays, who has been named president emeritus in recognition of her service to the college. Kays will continue to work for the college to assist with the transition until her retirement on Feb. 28, 2026.

"Being selected as interim president of Kilgore College is the highest honor of my career," Martin said. "I am grateful to the Board of Trustees for placing their faith in me to serve KC in this role and will do my best to be a good steward of this great institution while it is in my care."

Martin has served KC since 2001 in a variety of leadership positions, including vice president of student life and college affairs, vice president of student services, vice president of institutional planning, and registrar and director of admissions. She has been a member of the college's executive leadership team for more than a decade.

She holds a Doctor of Education in higher education from Texas Tech University, where her research focused on dual credit in Texas community colleges. She also earned a Master of Science in interdisciplinary studies from

White Oak marks progress on properties, projects

Installation is underway for the final batch of White Oak's water meter registers. Meanwhile, work has begun on refurbishment of one of the City of White Oak's water storage tanks on Hwy. 42.

The latter project's estimated at about \$700,000, per City Coordinator Jimmy Purcell.

As for the registers, "They're being done as we speak," he confirmed Monday. "I think there's probably 1,800 registers that are being swapped out for new ones."

During their monthly meeting Oct. 14, White Oak City Council members adopted updates to the community's fire and building codes and turned down a requested home construction variance at the developing Hwy. 42 Golf Course subdivision (see separate story in this issue).

Two properties inside the city limits are on the road to renovation - the former Wood Chiropractic Clinic at 202 U.S. Hwy. 80 has been purchased, Purcell reported.

"The building just sold. We're thankful that, with that building being as big as it is, it's not just going to be sitting there vacant," he added. Likewise, 1102 S. White Oak Road, behind Dairy Queen, has plans on the drawing board: "They're looking to change that into a climate-controlled storage facility."

WO Building codes won't bend to woo Hwy. 42 subdivision annexation

Annexation's not on the table right now for a new residential development adjacent to the City of White Oak.

Last week, council members unanimously denied a requested variance to the community's codes that would allow single-family homes on the site to be built at less than 1,800 square feet with a onecar garage on property currently being referenced as the 'Hwy 42 Golf Course subdivision.'

That was the requirement for the owner to give consent for annexation of the site. Gregg County Appraisal District records list Lyle Pike of Southampton, New York, who acquired the property from J&B Golf Series, LLC, in June

"Prior to 2019, cities could annex pretty much anything they want," White Oak City Coordinator Jimmy Purcell said Monday. "Now they have to have 100 percent consent from the owners of the land."

"He would give us consent to annex that property if we lower the square footage and two-car garage (requirement) for that new subdivision. It did not pass. They're keeping it the same just as if you would build inside the city."

Annexation's still a possibility for the future, Purcell said, but it'll be up to the property owner.

"What he does here on out, we have no idea," Purcell said. "We've been dealing with Johnson

The former Longview Country Club property sits about 3,000 feet from the White Oak City Limits and within the City of Longview's Extraterritorial Jurisdiction. Developing plans reported earlier this year ranged from about 100 to as many as 150 single-family residences and 150 RV sites on the site.

"It's about doing what we can for the animals."

That's the mantra for Gladewater Animal Control Officer Shelly Cullum. It goes all the way back to childhood.



"My nickname growing up was 'Critter' because I always had something," she says, some animal she'd plucked from danger, was nursing back to health, was trying to place in a new, safe home.

Cullum's found her work home in Gladewater, and there are plenty of critters to help here. It's her third long-term stint in animal control after recovering from a brief bout of retirement following 14 years with the City of Marshall.

Instrumental in transition that community's shelter to no-kill, "She's an animal lover. She's looking to start up

programs," says Gladewater Police Chief Kyle Ready, eager to spread the word about Cullum since ACO has once more come under the GPD umbrella. "We do have an animal problem in Gladewater.

"We always have," and Ready's confident Cullum is the person to tackle it once and for all: "We're in our infancy as far as animal control. She wants to get us above par, get a volunteer program started where people foster animals in the city. She's a super great person. The community's going to love her."

He's quick to tell the story of Cullum driving to New York to hand-deliver a litter of puppies to a trusted rescue operation.

"She's gold. She told me, 'If I can find them a home, I'm finding them a home.' She understands we've got to get to the point of getting a shelter built. That is her ultimate goal."

Cullum came on board with the City of Gladewater in early September following former ACO Colby Warren's transition to the City of Winnsboro.

"I'm enjoying it thoroughly," Cullum said this week. "It's a lot less stressful than the other gigs I was at. I enjoy getting out and meeting the people.

"That's one of the biggest things: I want to meet the people and the animals

of Gladewater, that way I can get them back home." Microchipping's one remedy she relies on, and Cullum's eager to organize

another free chipping event for local pets. "If I pick them up, I can scan them in my truck, find the owner on the spot

Creative Destruction

Each year, the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences awards the Nobel Memorial Prize in Economics in recognition of pathbreaking ideas and research that enhance our understanding of critical issues that, directly or indirectly, affect our prosperity and wellbeing. For 2025, three laureates have won the Prize for work unraveling the nature and genesis of technological innovation and its role in fostering sustained economic growth.

Economic historian Joel Mokyr of Northwestern University was honored for "having identified the prerequisites for sustained growth through technological progress." Economists Phillippe Aghion of the London School of Economics and Peter Howitt of Brown University were cited for "the theory of sustained growth through creative destruction."

Joel Mokyr meticulously examined historical data to uncover the underlying causes of enduring prosperity which generate a "new normal" in an economy. He demonstrated that, for innovations to cascade in a self-generating and sustaining process, it is crucial to grasp the full scientific basis for each succeeding discovery. There have been many points in history (such as the era prior to the industrial revolution) when a lack of such knowledge made it difficult to fully exploit new discoveries and inventions. Another element in his work highlighted the importance of society being amenable to the implementation of new ideas.

Philippe Aghion and Peter Howitt examined the mechanisms behind sustained growth. In the early 1990s, they built a model for exploring "creative destruction," which occurs when new and better products or processes enter the market and displace their predecessors. The concept dates back to sociologist Werner Sombart over a century ago and was brought into mainstream economic thought by Joseph Schumpeter in the 1940s. I recently wrote about

"creative disruption," a similar phenomenon which occurs when useful innovations bring major shifts in multiple areas. Currently, this concept applies specifically to artificial intelligence (AI), which is affecting virtually every element of the economy.

Growth is not automatic. In fact, until the past couple of centuries, stagnation was generally more prevalent. Technological advances now occur rapidly and affect individuals, businesses, the economy, and society in fundamental ways. New products and methods inevitably replace prior ones, and resultant dislocations are unavoidable.

Advances foster sustained economic growth, which in turn al-

lows higher standards of living and better health and quality of life.
AI, for example, is a major technological advance which has the potential to enhance prosperity throughout the world.

Economists have been focused on conceptualizing the growth

Economists have been focused on conceptualizing the growth process for centuries, and the topic has been a primary factor in several prior Nobel awards. The work of the 2025 laureates reminds us that we cannot take economic advancement for granted and that ongoing technological advances followed by creative destruction are imperatives for continued prosperity.

Austin state Rep. Hinojosa running against Abbott

State Rep. Gina Hinojosa, D-Austin, has joined the race for governor, the Austin American-Statesman reported. She accused incumbent Gov. Greg Abbott, seeking his fourth term, of being beholden to wealthy donors.

"Our fight right now is against the billionaires and the corporations, who are driving up prices, closing our neighborhood schools and cheating Texans out of basic health care. That's who Greg Abbott works for," she said in a video announcing her campaign.

Hinojosa has served in the House since 2017 and fought against the school voucher plan passed earlier this year.

Also running thus far in the Democratic primary are Andrew White, a Houston businessman and son of the late Gov. Mark White; Bobby Cole, a rancher and retired firefighter; and Bay City Councilman Benjamin Flores.

Parental rights law leaves families, school nurses confused

A new form required after passage of the state's new education law has left both parents and school nurses confused, the Texas Standard reported. Senate Bill 12, which was billed as a parental rights law, requires parental permission before a school employee can provide physical or mental health care.

Unclear wording in a few paragraphs is being blamed by some for the confusion. School nurses worry they might unknowingly break the new law, according to Becca Harkleroad, executive director of the Texas School Nurses Organization.

"The law was very clear that if you provided any services without written consent, disciplinary action was coming your way," she said. "So that gave a lot of people pause."

The bill's authors, state Rep. Jeff Leach, R-Plano, and former state Sen. Brandon Creighton, R-Conroe, acknowledged the confusion and urged educators "not to suspend common sense when it comes to providing basic care for the children at their schools."

Leach and Creighton have asked the Texas Education Agency to provide "consistent and clear guidance" to schools on how to implement the law. That guidance was released last month, but Jack Frazee with the Texas Nurses Association said he is awaiting additional details from TEA to provide more clarity.

Forest service awards \$164 million to volunteer fire departments

Texas A&M Forest Service has approved \$164 million in funding for Texas volunteer fire departments to purchase 558 fire trucks and 321 slip-on units through a grant program established in 2001.

The state uses a tiered approach to wildfire response, with local VFDs as the first on the scene, followed by state response if needed.

"Texas fire departments are the front line of local response, and their equipment capacity is vital to response time and effectiveness," said Al Davis, Texas A&M Forest Service director. "This historic funding reflects the strong support of the Texas Legislature and governor. Their investment allows us to continue supporting and equipping firefighters who protect Texas lives and property."

Texas continues to rank tops in trade

With 32 official ports of entry and two intermodal logistics facilities to connect different modes of transport, Texas continues to lead the nation in overall value of trade commodities, according to the comptroller's office.

The state's trade value fell to \$634.6 billion during the 2020 COVID pandemic but has increased by 67.6% since then, to \$1.1 trillion.

Port Laredo leads the country in total trade with \$339.5 billion of commodities coming through that port of entry. Port Houston ranks first in the nation in exports flowing out of the port at \$129.9 billion.

SALVATION AND OBEDIENCE

When Moses, who led the Israelites out of Egypt, died, Joshua led the Israelites into the promised land of Canaan. Canaan, however, was inhabited by a wicked and idolatrous people, and one of the cities of Canaan was Jericho, which was a strongly fortified city the Israelites had to conquer.

How Israel conquered Jericho is reported in Joshua 6. There God gave some strange directions for capturing the city. According to Joshua 6: 3-5, they were to walk around the city once a day for six days, and on the seventh day, they were to walk around it seven times, then blow trumpets and shout, and God said the walls would then fall down. Strange instructions for capturing a fortified city, but that's what God said and that's what they did, and the walls fell. Hebrews 11: 30 says: "By faith the walls of Jericho fell down after they were encircled for seven days."

There are some important lessons we can learn from that event. Before they entered Canaan, God said, "See! I have given Jericho into your hand." This lets us know that their victory was made possible by the GRACE of God. The New Testament tells us that it was "by faith" that "the walls of Jericho fell down," so it was made possible by a combination of two things: the GRACE OF GOD and THE FAITH OF THE ISRAEL-ITES. However, concerning their faith, we learn that the walls of Jericho fell AFTER they were encircled for seven days. Thus, it was by FAITH, but not by faith ONLY! Obedience was required from start to finish. And that's the way it is today. God saves believers when they DO WHAT HE COMMANDS them to do to be saved.

God commands believers to repent of their sins (*Acts 2: 38*), confess their faith in Christ (*Rom. 10: 9-10; Acts 8: 37*), and be baptized for the remission of their sins (*Acts 2: 38*). Therefore, to be saved today which can be eliminated? Can one refuse to repent of his sins and fail to believe in his heart that Christ is the Son of the living God and confess with his mouth the same? Can one eliminate baptism for the remission of sins? You see, God's grace and man's faith is essential to salvation (*Eph. 2: 8*). This was said concerning the salvation of the Ephesians. But in Acts 19: 4-5 we see the obedience of the Ephesians when they were saved, and it was when they believed in Christ and were baptized and not before. Think on these things.

Former Upshur VFD chief wanted following criminal conviction

A former fire chief for a now-defunct VFD in Upshur County and who was wanted by the Harrison County Sher-

iff's Office following a conviction for a crime involving the neglect of horses has now been arrested.

A jury found Katiland Ariel Gray, 35, guilty on two counts of cruelty to livestock animals on Sept. 10, according to court records. The jury sentenced her to two years in state jail.

Court records show Gray was released on bond on Sept. 12. A motion to revoke her bond was

filed on Sept. 30.

The Harrison County Sheriff's Office issued a "wanted" bulletin on its Facebook page Wednesday morning, stating Gray had promised to turn herself in, but she had not. The sheriff's office posted an update Wednesday afternoon, stating Gray was taken into custody with the help of the Upshur County Sheriff's Office.

According to her indictment, Gray did not provide food, water or care to horses on Aug. 11, 2024.

According to previous reports, Gray was the chief of Glenwood VFD, a VFD that appears to no longer be active. Gray left the VFD years before her arrest, according to Upshur County ESD #1 President Kenny Southwell. Southwell said Glenwood VFD dissolved after Gray left the VFD and was consolidated with East Mountain VFD.

Caddo Lake National Wildlife Refuge expanded through federal designation process

The Caddo Lake Institute (CLI) announced this week the expansion of the Caddo Lake National Wildlife Refuge by 185 acres through land acquisition by CLI. The refuge expansion represents a significant conservation victory for one of Texas's most ecologically important watersheds and the state's only natural lake. Caddo Lake, designated as a Wetland of International Importance under the Ramsar Convention, serves as a critical habitat corridor in East Texas.

The expanded refuge will provide enhanced protection for

hundreds of bird species, especially migratory birds, as well as the Cooper's Hawk, the Spotted Salamander, the Louisiana Pigtoe, and more, while offering expanded opportunities for public recreation including wildlife viewing, photography, hiking, biking, horseback riding, boating, and hunting.

CLI's strategic land acquisition and collaborative approach with federal partners demonstrates the power of local conservation organizations working alongside elected officials to achieve lasting environmental protection.

and return them home."

Her first stint in animal control began in 1994. After a decade on the job and a six-year gap, she took up the task again in 2010 in Marshall.

The old shelter there was a priority.

"We did take in a lot of animals. We were able to get the funds from private donors to help build a new facility for Marshall," Cullum said, praising the 'Friends of Marshall Animals' outreach for a big role in the ultimate success. "We built a new facility and I ran that for three years. We were able to turn the euthanasia rate where we were a No Kill Shelter by the time I left

"That was through rescues, fosters, volunteers, donors. It's a lot of hard work, but it's very nice to see them go and not be euthanized."

Right now, Cullum's focused on keeping the kennels comfortable behind the Gladewater Police/Fire HQ. Space is limited, and she angles to connect strays with their owners quickly. If that's not possible, there are other healthy options for the animals, especially in the age of social media.

"I'm trying to get their pictures posted and adopted," Cullum said, asking owners to text her at 903-930-8465 if they see their pets. "I've been lucky so far. I've been able to scan microchips and get them back to their owners."

She offices in the same small structure that houses the kennels, but the goal is to be out in public as often as possible, getting wandering animals out of harm's way as quickly as she can. "I'm very particular about my kennels," Cullum said. "I like to keep them clean," Cullum says. As for her charges, "I have to name them all. They're not numbers."

One recent intake was christened 'Duncan' after a friend. A nearby street sign often lends its name to a rescued animal.

"You run out of names eventually," Cullum quipped, pondering a moniker for an as-yet untraceable intake Monday while crossing her fingers the owner would catch her post on @GladewaterAnimalControl on Facebook.

She definitely doesn't want to fall into the "euthanasia trap" again, not when she's used proven strategies to avoid it.

"I've lived in both worlds. It's very rewarding to be no-kill," Cullum said. "I would love to be able to use the knowledge that I have in getting a new shelter built so we can do adoptions. There's so many programs you can do with the animals when you have a shelter. Kids can come and read to them. You can walk them. That's down the road. You can't do anything without funding of course."

Working with nearby communities, such as Kilgore and Big Sandy, could jump-start the effort.

"They're trying to start something themselves," she added, and with the better part of 25 years in animal control under her belt, Cullum's cultivated a healthy array of names and numbers to ensure as many animals as possible find a new home.

"I do have a lot of connections from where I was to send them on rescue," she said. "It's just connecting, getting a foster base, volunteers."

White Oak man indicted for online solicitation of a minor

The Upshur County Grand Jury recently returned 23 indictments, 10 of them sealed, and no-billed one case, said District Attorney Billy Byrd.

Gladewater thanks Upshur for road work

Gladewater Mayor Brandy Flanagan and other city officials presented Upshur County Judge Todd Tefteller and Precinct 3 County Commissioner Michael Ashley an award last week for the county's help in improving West Lake Drive and Cannon Street.

The presentation came at the Upshur County Commissioners Court's Oct. 15 meeting in Gilmer.

In other business, the court approved sending three school districts in the county a letter demanding they pay the county for collecting their taxes. The three are using a different law firm to collect deliquent taxes than most other county taxing entities use.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Luana Howell told the court the schools' action in using a different firm drives up the county's expense for collecting.

Howell refused to identify the school districts on Monday to The Mirror, but another county official said they are Harmony, Big Sandy and Ore City ISDs. Howell said Monday her office annually charges taxing entities for collecting all their taxes, and that the three schools have paid none of their costs at all. They had been billed "a little bit extra" since using a different law firm drove up the county's costs, she said.

At the Oct. 15 meeting, Tefteller said the firm used by most entities, Linebarger, gives the county a discount for using software to collect taxes, and thus wanted reimbursement for collecting taxes for the three entities who don't pay Linebarger to collect their delinquent taxes.

Precinct 2 Commissioner Dustin Nicholson raised the possibility of litigation over the issue, but Tefteller said he would rather work things out.

Howell explained Monday that the Linebarger law firm, used by most entities, owns another firm used in tax collecting, but that the county government was the only taxing entity in the county to pay to use that firm.





Burn bans ordered

Upshur County, Gilmer and East Mountain officials, faced with recent dry weather conditions, last week in effect temporarily banned most outdoor burning in all rural areas of the county and the two municipalities' city limits.

County Judge Todd Tefteller issued the 10-day rural ban, subject to modification, effective at 1 p.m. Oct. 15 through this Saturday. It doesn't include incorporated cities.

Gilmer Fire Chief Jerry Taylor said Monday his department ceased issuing burn permits Oct. 15. Taylor said his action was effectively the same as issuing a formal ban, which would have required the city council's approval and expired

A spokeswoman for the city of East Mountain said Monday it applied the county's rural ban to the city limits.

In his order, Tefteller said "present circumstances in all or part" of the county's unincorporated areas "create a public hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning." His order is effective the 10 days unless "terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas (A&M) Forest Service or this (Upshur County Commissioners) Court."

The court also could extend the ban, Tefteller's order said. His prohibition doesn't apply to "outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality." Some examples of that include firefighter training, public utility and natural gas pipeline operations, or harvesting agricultural crops, among others, his order stated.

Violation of the county order is a class C misdemeanor punishable by a fine of up to \$500.

The 10-day order, issued Oct. 15, is effective through Saturday.


