Not really, but this really needs everyone's attention

The Lake Gladewater Dam is going to fail.

For more than 15 years, the mantra has been "the clock is ticking." Now that regular inspections are happening, it's possible to track the steady deterioration of the 73-year-old structure, which was constructed with an effective 50-year lifespan.

Without substantial intervention in the near-future, the projected timeline antici-

pates an emergency situation in the next five to 10 years.

There's no cause for panic, but preparation is absolutely necessary, now. Authorities are working simultaneously to prevent a catastrophe by shoring up the dam for decades to come and to prepare for a catastrophe if certain triggers are met or the dam begins deteriorating rapidly and failure becomes imminent.

Multiple lives would be lost.

Failure also means hundreds of millions of dollars in damages and in lost revenues. It could wipe out Gladewater's only water source. Local infrastructure will be wrecked. Major transportation routes will be inundated, possibly washed out. Flooding will have impacts downstream in Gregg County.

City of Gladewater officials are aware and actively working on a solution. They're closely-monitoring the dam. They're coordinating with partners in Gregg and Upshur County, across the state and at the federal level. They're pursuing grant funding to cover the significant costs that will be required fix the structure long-term.

An initial estimate puts the price tag at as much as \$15 million.

Gladewater doesn't have funds on hand to begin the engineering and repairs today. The hope is that if enough people here speak out, someone will listen.



Regular dam inspections show ongoing deterioration

The good news: As of early 2025, the City of Gladewater is in compliance with state regulations for the necessary maintenance and monitoring of the Lake Gladewater Dam.

However, that due diligence revealed the extent of the bad news: After many years of subpar preservation, annual inspections since 2023 have tracked the deterioration of the concrete spillway, in particular.

"We are seeing a steady progression toward failure of the dam," Gladewater Fire Chief Mike Simmons told fellow emergency management officials and personnel in early October. And, later: "Based on current assessments of the inspection reports we have, we anticipate the potential of something happening within 10 years.

"It could be just one concrete panel falls off, and we lose a small portion. It could be the

Plan for the Worst...

"The big question isn't 'What if?' It's 'When?' There's no way to predict when it's going to fail."

predict when it's going to fail."

While the City of Gladewater and its partners work to rectify the problems at the Lake Gladewater Dam, they must concurrently plan for everything up to and including total failure of the concrete spillway and/or earthen embankment.

"Right now, we have identified issues with the dam," Gladewater Fire Chief Mike Simmons said. "We're working with an engineering firm and TCEQ and others to try to come up with a plan to mitigate the issues before something happens.

"In the meantime we're monitoring the dam on a regular basis. If we see any further issues we will alert the community through our Genasys activation system."

That's a key step on the city's notifications flowchart. There's a number of triggers tied to the dam, whether it's extensive rainfall, flooding, earthquake, sabotage or other circumstances.

Last month, emergency management personnel from across the area, including representatives from state agencies, gathered at Gladewater City Hall to review and update the procedures. Everyone's on the same page for both 'Watch Condition' and 'Evacuation Condition.'

"With us being a 'high hazard' dam, that means potential loss of life is three or more," Simmons told the crowd. "Ideally, we gauge it long before it fails, and we get people out."

For Simmons, it's important never to create a panic regarding the dam or any other situation. That said, it's also important residents take the

Dam creates city's sole water source

Secondary supply becomes greater priority for City

Beyond the immediate impacts of a failure at the Lake Gladewater Dam – the deluge itself, loss of life, property damage – it will likely spark a second catastrophe.

After the first flood, "Our biggest concern is loss of water,"

Gladewater Fire Chief and Lake Warden Mike Simmons told colleagues in early October. "It's the only water source for the City of Gladewater."

It's why the dam was built in the first place. Construction began in 1951 to create a municipal water supply while also factoring in stormwater management, flood control and recreation, too.

Almost 75 years later, Gladewa-

ter has no redundancy in its water system, and a large enough failure of the dam will cut-off flow for approximately 2,000 households.

The city's water infrastructure has been a top priority for years – developing a secondary water supply is a significant part of the discussion.

"Our best plan of action would be to connect to an adjacent water

He said he sat behind his gun and sweated...and prayed...and thought of home. After all, one of the greatest tragedies of war is to lose one's life in the closing days of conflict...deaths that seem almost meaningless with a cost that rips holes in hearts and families.

The story of his drunk captain running their PC boat into a pier and knocking a huge hole in the side was hilarious. Paxton sues Tylenol over autism claims

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton is suing the makers of Tylenol, accusing Johnson and Johnson of failing to warn women about the risk of taking acetaminophen while pregnant, claiming it is a possible cause of autism.

The Texas Standard reported the lawsuit is the first of its kind from a state government. It comes a few weeks after U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services Robert F. Kennedy, Jr. discouraged pregnant women from taking the drug.

Paxton, who is running in the GOP primary against incumbent U.S. Sen. John Cornyn, said in a statement that "by holding Big Pharma accountable for poisoning our people, we will help Make America Healthy Again."

There are conflicting medical studies concerning the effects of acetaminophen on pregnant women. Dr. Brian Lee, a Drexel University epidemiologist who headed one of the largest studies, said that while more research is needed, "the needle is pointing strongly toward there being no causal effect of acetaminophen use during pregnancy on autism."

Poll: Most Texans oppose sending Texas soldiers to other states

A poll released last week shows most Texans oppose Gov. Greg Abbott's deployment of National Guard soldiers stationed in Texas to cities outside the state, the Houston Chronicle reported.

The University of Texas at Austin's Texas Politics Project found 51% oppose the deployment with 43% strongly opposed. Only 41% support the move, with 24% strongly supporting it.

Abbott last month agreed to send 200 Texas troops to Chicago at Trump's request. However, a judge blocked that deployment, and the troops remain stationed outside the city.

'Financial literacy' class now required

Texas is now the 30th state to offer financial literacy classes, with a half-credit to be offered starting with the graduating class of 2029, according to The Dallas Morning News. The Texas Education Agency plans to send school districts a list of companies that will offer free curriculum.

John Pelletier, director of the Center for Financial Literacy in Vermont, says the extra classes address what he terms "financial fragility." He notes lack of proper money management is a key reason only half of Americans could come up with \$2,000 in an emergency.

He added that the pandemic showed how unemployment levels could jump almost overnight, leaving people who have not saved or are in serious debt at greater risk of financial catastrophe.

Court: Texas judges not required to perform same-sex weddings

In a comment added to the state's judicial conduct code, the Texas Supreme Court said that Texas judges who decline to perform a wedding ceremony based on a "sincerely held religious belief" are not violating the state's rules on judicial impartiality, keranews.org reported.

This could have statewide implications for gay marriage and possibly factor in a federal lawsuit attempting to overturn the U.S. Supreme Court decision that legalized same-sex marriage in 2015.

Texas Supreme Court clerk Blake Hawthorne said the court cannot comment on the rule change.

"The order speaks for itself, and the Court cannot comment on its connection to pending litigation," Hawthorne said.

Hundreds of 'zombie' wells found in single Texas county

Researchers at the University of Houston have identified more than 600 non-operating oil wells in Reeves County that are either actively leaking or are at high risk of doing so, the Chronicle reported.

Two related problems – uncapped orphan wells and plugged wells that leak – pose a serious threat to Texas groundwater, as oil, salty wastewater and other fluids can contaminate aquifers.

With hundreds of thousands of wells across Texas, the potential for leaking wells is high. The researchers hope to pair machine learning – a subfield of artificial intelligence – with satellite imagery, wastewater injection data, and wellbore data to identify which wells pose the highest risks.


Rare Earths

Rare earth elements (or minerals) are comprised of 17 elements, including the 15 lanthanides plus scandium and yttrium. Although produced in small amounts compared to many elements, they are becoming increasingly essential to the economy and national security.

The minerals themselves aren't particularly rare geologically, but they are difficult to find in economically useful concentrations. Moreover, the refining/processing capacity is highly concentrated, with the most activity by far in China. Recent threats by the Chinese government to cease exports of these vital elements is becoming a bargaining chip in the ongoing trade-related negotiations with the United States.

Without rare earths, high-tech and clean-energy industries are vulnerable. They are used in permanent magnets which power EV traction motors, wind-turbine generators, and many high-performance industrial and defense motors. They are also found in electronics and optics products, including phosphors for displays and lighting, polishing agents, catalysts in catalytic converters, and petroleum refining. The defense and aerospace industries use them for specialized alloys, guidance systems, radar, lasers, and certain sensors. Medical applications include MRI contrast agents, some types of imaging, and precision instruments

Although estimates vary, it is clear that China accounts for a very large share of mining, separation/processing, and magnet manufacturing. While the US produces some rare earths, imports are crucial, with 70% of US imports originating from China. Several countries appear to have reserves of rare earths (including a relatively small amount in the US), but sufficient processing capabilities are not in place.






The most likely outcome is some sort of agreement with China to maintain access, but there are good reasons for diversifying sourcing and onshoring some production of these important minerals due to the high potential for disruption if supplies are substantially curtailed. If China restrict exports, global shortages and price spikes would occur. Manufacturers without adequate supplies would have to slow or stop production (including automakers, turbine makers, and defense subcontractors). Clearly, workarounds can be found in some cases, but it would take time to redesign products or improve recycling. Much of the additional costs would be borne by consumers.

Billions of dollars are currently being invested in the entire are earths process from mines to finished magnets and other products. The US government is committed to increasing domestic capacity through direct investments, funding, and strategic partnerships (such as with Australia) to build out a more robust supply chain.

Rare earths constitute one of the relatively uncommon cases in which using public policy to enhance availability in the US and in conjunction with allies is crucial to security and stability. Several industries (including some which are essential to national defense) rely on these minerals, and even a brief supply interruption could be catastrophic on multiple levels. Stay safe!



PRESUMPTION AND WORSHIP # 2

From Col. 2: 23 we learn that it is presumption to introduce into the worship and service of God anything and everything that man chooses. Inasmuch as "God is a spirit," the spirit of man, the inward man must be involved. Worship must be "in spirit." But it must also be "in truth." 



whole thing goes, the whole concrete structure. There's no way to know until it happens."

Simmons also wears the local 'Emergency Coordinator' hat as well as Lake Warden. Since he took the reins in early 2022, it's been a personal and professional priority to get the dam back into the good graces of the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality. Previous assessments put the Lake Gladewater Dam in the 'high hazard' category, but the lack of requisite checks and ongoing maintenance meant the community didn't qualify for key funding until recently.

"There definitely is a gap. That's what hindered us from putting in (for grants) three years ago." After checking all the right boxes for several years and working closely with TCEQ representatives, "We've done everything we can to get back and caught up. We're now in full compliance."

A key part of that process was the development and adoption of an Emergency Action Plan for the 1952-year-old construct, a combination of an earthen embankment and concrete spillway.

It was the annual re-


view of the action plan that brought officials from Gregg County, Upshur, Texas Department of Emergency Management and other agencies to Gladewater City Hall Oct. 9.

"We finally got it where it's completed and submitted. We're current in our emergency plans," Simmons reported. "We just finished our annual inspection, and we're waiting on that report to come in."

Multiple times, he's accompanied an engineer into the water for an up-close look at the dam's weak spots, and there are plenty. From a 2024 Landscape Ecology assessment by Emma Simpson as well as recent observations:

- The slabs have settled, their joints no longer flush, water flowing in the gaps.
- · Large voids have eroded in and around the structure.
- Vegetation's sprouting from the concrete, rooted in spaces within and between the massive slabs.
- The face of the concrete has pitting and holes, several inches wide, as much as a foot deep.
- The wingwalls are pulling away, creating spaces behind them.

That's just a sampling: "It seems like every time a big storm comes through we see another piece of this concrete move," Simmons said. "We are seeing failure getting worse and worse and conditions starting to



deteriorate.

"This next report is going to emphasize that we've seen changes in the past vear.'

The last significant work on the dam occurred about a decade ago, when contractors injected filler into existing voids.

"I think we're about four or five years beyond the lifespan of that patch," Simmons said.

The earthen embankment portion of the overall dam is in 'fair' condition, but there are significant erosion issues. The downstream side's slope is too steep to mow; regular spraying on both sides aims to keep vegetation at bay.

"But, it's holding strong... We're trying to control the weeds and all the stuff that make it hard to see any damage."

From mitigating vegetation to uncovering the dam's untested relief valve, recovering lost blueprints and updating flood maps, many key tasks have been checked off the list the past several years.

They don't change the most significant, evolving problems at the dam, though.

"With the known issues we have in the current annual inspection, we are seeing a decline in the structure,' Simmons said. "We've got two different engineering firms telling us that. You've got to trust what they're saying. It's straight facts.

"Now that we've got those facts, what can we do about it?"

Aging dams become common problem for U.S. communities

The Lake Gladewater Dam is exhibiting many of the same symptoms of long-term degradation common to both concrete structures and earthen embankments across the United States.

Gladewater's not alone as far as the age of its dam, either, not by a long-shot.

The American Society of Civil Engineers estimated more than 85 percent of all dams in the United States are than 50 years-old, the typical useful lifespan.

As of 2009, there were more than 13,000 classified as "high hazard" in the United States. At that time – more than 15 years ago, when an engineer declared "The clock is ticking" at Gladewater's dam – approximately 30 percent of those at-risk structures had not been inspected in five years, even though each warrants an annual inspection.

According to L. David Givler, a technical expert in hydrology and hydraulics and the president of Givler Engineering in San Antonio, Gladewater is seeing common problems at

its dam. Needless to say, they're costly to repair, and they'll get more expensive as deterioration continues and more problems arise.

'There are a lot of dams around that are older than this one that are earth embankments," Givler confirmed. "Lots of times when they were built, they didn't meet modern design standards.

"A lot of them, on the slopes, they became unstable over

He encounters two particular clusters of dams in the United States very frequently – those constructed right after World I and right after WWII.

"Everybody came home and they were trying to get back to life. They had a new experience for how big the world was, they come home and they build a dam," Givler explained. 'There are a lot of early dams from the early '20s and the late '40s, a lot of them, out there. They did amazing stuff.' That said, they're getting older every day.



Wallace new Upshur DA

Former longtime Gladewater attorney Barry Wallace was sworn in as Upshur County district attorney Saturday afternoon in Gilmer after Gov. Greg Abbott appointed him to succeed Billy Byrd, who had retired effective at 10 p.m. Friday.

Wallace, 66, joined the district attorney's office Oct. 25, 2017, and has been first assistant to Byrd, who left his post after 18 years to announce plans Thursday (Nov. 6) to run for another office.

Wallace took the actual oath in a private ceremony at the Upshur County Justice Center. Lisa King, who will continue her present position as longtime manager of the district attorney's office, administered the oath since

she is a notary public.

The new district attorney then took a purely "ceremonial" oath, administered by Byrd in the 115th District Court at the justice center. It was witnessed by Wallace's family, King, and a representative of The Mirror.

Byrd, pastor of the rural Oak Hill Baptist Church for the past several years, said he administered that in his capacity as a minister. He led a prayer just before doing so. He submitted his Oct. 31 retirement in a letter dated Oct. 14 to Abbott, who announced Oct. 28 he was appointing Wallace effective Nov. 1.

Wallace said he began his legal career with a private criminal and civil law practice in Gladewater for 25 years, from Nov. 6, 1992 until March 31, 2018. (He retained his private practice for several months after joining Byrd's staff).

"I aspire to keep the bar just as high as he (Byrd) has set it," Wallace said Saturday. "I welcome the prayers of the people of Upshur County."

Wallace, who long went by his full name of Barry Clark Wallace, took the ceremonial oath with his hand on a Bible which was owned by his father, B.C. Wallace, who died when the new district attorney was 16 years old.

Born and reared in Greenville, the 1978 graduate of Greenville High School received a Bachelor of Arts degree in history from East Texas State University (now called East Texas A&M) in Commerce in 1989. He earned his law degree from St. Mary's University School of Law in San Antonio in 1992.

Wallace once planned to be a history teacher, but said that studying U.S. Supreme Court

decisions piqued his interest in becoming an attorney.

He and his wife, Susan, have six children by the couple's previous marriages.

Byrd, meantime, plans to announce his political plans at a 11 a.m. public reception Thursday (Nov. 6) at the Gilmer Civic Center on U.S.271. A provision of the state constitution prevented him from announcing what office he will seek until his retirement as district attorney was effective.

supply," according to Water Plant Manager Wendy Emmel. "That way, we could open the valve in the something happens and supply treated water."

It's a requirement, she added, one that the city has never fulfilled

One option would be to coordinate with White Oak toward tapping the neighboring community's water line from Big Sandy Creek.

Another option, Gladewater City Manager Charlie Smith said, might be to partner with the City of Longview and run a line to tie into that system for emergencies.

Currently, the water reserve's just eight hours. Accepting that land acquisition would be pricey, a raw water reservoir outside Gladewater could make for a short-term solution

"Two million gallons would sustain us for one day," Em-

Meanwhile, Lake Gladewater needs to be dredged. It hasn't happened in about 25 years, she noted, but rough plans are already on the drawing board.

It's one of many projects in the works.

"We've been fixing so many broken things," Smith said,

repairing and, whenever possible, upgrading one section of the water system at a time. The development of a secondary water source is climbing higher up the list: "Honestly, I don't think it was really taken seriously in the past."

It's one more thing to consider in mitigating risks related to the dam, Simmons said.

"We don't have an alternative source. We don't have another connection to another city," he added. A healthy, functional dam is essential until a backup supply is in place. For the immediate future, "We have to make the water out of that lake. If it's not there, we can't."

potential threat seriously, that they have a plan in place for their safety now and pay attention to any alerts that come along.

In the event of a major failure, the city's Emergency Action Plan factors in everything from moving people out of harm's way to bringing bottled water in when streets are compromised.

Based on updated flood maps if the dam fails, "Major roads and railways will probably be shut down," Simmons reminded his colleagues. "Our city will be essentially shut down. It's going to affect our ability to provide emergency operations."

The deluge will overwhelm water/sewer infrastructure. The lake could likely drain below the water plant's intake.

"Schools are obviously going to be affected. Our nursing homes are going to be affected. Businesses are going to be affected," Simmons said, with between 75 and 100 buildings, commercial and residential, in the flood path in addition to

the Union Pacific railroad tracks. "The airport is going to be shut down because half that runway is going to be underwater.

"If you think about the economic impact of the failure of this high hazard dam... The city's going to be cut in half."

And for how long? Repairs will take months or years depending on the severity.

"They tell you, try to fix it before it happens. We're talking a \$14-15 million dollar repair versus hundreds of millions on the backside."

And Gladewater's cost is a drop in the bucket, with tens of thousands of similar high-value projects seeking the same public dollars. The reality is, there's plenty of mitigation funding available after a disaster, significantly less to prevent one.

"That's what the high hazard mitigation funds are for, to target pre-disaster," Simmons said, and the City of Gladewater is pursuing those monies. "We're in a better place now where council has a better understanding of it, city officials have a better understanding.

"We're doing our due diligence."

"I don't want to be the one that waits for it to fail."

The city currently has an active and ongoing maintenance schedule for the Lake Gladewater Dam, in addition to regular monitoring. Since 2023, it's inspected annually by an engineer, and the structure gets a visual once-over after every storm. The lake level is checked constantly.

Firm plans to actually and finally fix the dam are still in the works.

There's a rough cost estimate of \$15 million, but that's just a placeholder: "We don't know the cost yet because we haven't gotten to the engineering phase yet," Gladewater Emergency Coordinator Mike Simmons confirmed. "Right now, we don't have any hard, actual numbers."

With an incident of some degree anticipated in the next five to 10 years, the city's currently in Phase I of the dam project – design and engineering.

"As we mitigate it, we want to make sure we bring it up to codes and standards for future events," Simmons said. "That's kind of a lengthy process because of all the core samples, soil samples, engineering, running all the models."

Once all that's complete, Phase II is actual repair and reconstruction.

"Do we completely rebuild the entire dam?"

Technically, the funding portion is already underway – the City of Gladewater is exploring grant opportunities and applying when possible. That's in addition to pre-qualification for state and federal dollars.

"Anything we do is going to bring it to the modern standard where it's good for another 50 years," Simmons said. "We should never really find ourselves in this situation again."

"Please be the squeaky wheel for us."

In a better scenario common for aging dams, the cost to fix the Lake Gladewater Dam would be about \$5 million. As things stand, though, current estimates put the number at about \$15 million.

The City of Gladewater is going to need substantial financial assistance for a long-term solution for the sake of protecting life and property and the community's future.

'We do have plans. We are working. The connections are being made, we're seeking funds, we're doing everything we can do to control the situation as best we can," Gladewater Fire Chief & Emergency Coordinator Mike Simmons says. "The work that's being done is to try to secure funds to prevent a disaster from happening.

"It's going to be a lot cheaper to fix it before it happens than after it happens." Gladewater's not the only municipality in this situation, though.

Thousands of dams in Texas and across the country are past the end of their effective lifespans – by decades. There are a myriad other disasters and priorities that demand emergency aid as well.

Amid local disaster prep and developing solutions, officials here are the first to say they need help catching the attention of the people who can point public funds this way.

The relevant grants are extremely competitive, Simmons acknowledged. Now that the dam is fully-compliant with state regulations, its 'high hazard' status qualifies for funding, but there are myriad entities drawing from the same well.

If people in power take notice, he said, if they accept invitations from people on the ground in Gladewater to come assess the situation up-close, maybe they'll help make a difference.

"It's about being a squeaky wheel. 'Have you heard about the Gladewater dam? They need some help.' The squeaky wheel gets the grease. Being that squeaky wheel and trying to mitigate it before it happens is what I would like to happen.

Write your congressman. Write your state representative. Let them know we have this issue we need help with."
