# GPD officer fired after indecency with child charges filed by Dallas PD internet crimes unit

According to a Gladewater Police Department press release by Chief Kyle Ready, "On Thursday, November 6, 2025, at approximately 5 p.m., I was contacted by the Dallas Police Department Internet Crimes Against Children Division regarding a Gladewater Police Department employee under investigation in coordination with the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children.

"I was informed that Officer Kenan Robert Laza had been arrested at his residence in Longview, Gregg County, Texas, for Indecency with a Child, a third-degree felony.

"I immediately responded to the scene of the arrest. Officer Laza's employment with the Gladewater Police Department was terminated on-site, effective immediately."

Ready said the allegations and evidence presented in this case "are deeply disturbing and have shocked this department to its core. It is unthinkable that an individual entrusted with protecting our community could commit such a horrific act."

The Gladewater Police Department is fully cooperating with the Dallas Police Department and all involved agencies. Ready added, "We will assist in every possible capacity to ensure a complete and thorough investigation and that justice is pursued to the fullest extent of the law.

"These actions represent a gross violation of public trust and a disgrace to the law enforcement profession and every officer who serves with honor and integrity.

The citizens of Gladewater can be assured that this department will not tolerate such behavior under any circumstance, and anyone found to have engaged in criminal or unethical activity will be held fully accountable.

"To the victim and their family, I extend my deepest sympathy for the pain and trauma you have endured. To our community, I reaffirm my commitment that the Gladewater Police Department will continue to serve with honor, transparency, and accountability. The actions of one individual will never define the men and women who wear this badge with pride and purpose."

# Genasys alerts help city keep residents aware

In a perfect world, Gladewater's dam will never merit a mention via the Genasys alert system.

A set of pre-scripted notifications have already been uploaded to the platform, though, just in case.

From the perspective of 'Better safe than sorry' or 'An ounce of preparation is worth a pound of cure,' it takes just a moment to sign up for the local alerts.

That's just one layer of the safety net, says Gladewater Fire Chief Mike Simmons. Additional layers are in place on the city side, including knocking on doors if necessary, and more layers are advised for residents as well. Simple precautions

could make all the difference in a variety of incidents.

"The idea to be totally prepared is to have all those layers of notification in place and pay attention."

The dam is only one factor – one that's now being diligently tended, monitored and, in time, mitigated as city leaders allocate funds to improve the 73-year-old structure at Lake Gladewater. Meanwhile, the Genasys system is tailored for mass advisories on everything from weather to water.

"It's our primary notification system that we use in the City of Gladewater," Simmons said, going back about three years. "The idea is to be able to type one message and send it to everybody through multiple options," whether they opt-in for text, social media alerts, email, a phone call or a personal mix.

"When they sign up for Genasys, they can choose their alerts."

To sign up, text GLADEWATER to 65513 or visit cityof-gladewater.com/alerts to fill out a registration form.

The platform is tied into the National Weather Service's polygon system to push alerts in a particular geography when and if a weather threat arises. Likewise, while there's no imminent threat at the dam, the forecast is cloudy. It will continue to deteriorate with time, and related alerts (from standby orders to evacuation prompts) are primed.

"Any kind of alerting system or program, there's several components. Number one is the individual themselves," Simmons said. "You always need to be prepared, have a plan and pay attention."

# Gladewater, White Oak stay in the black on sales tax

Sales tax revenues were up-and-down across the area this month despite the addition of quarterly returns in the November mix. Statewide, revenues showed a year-to-year increase of more than 6 percent.

In Gladewater, the municipality reaped a \$175,733 payment from the state comptroller's office. It's a 4.63 percent increase on November 2024's check. White Oak's allocation was virtually the same – the check compiled by Texas Comptroller Kelly Hancock's team showed an \$18.84 dip from the same time last year, a decrease of about 0.01 percent that still adds \$152,896.72 to the local coffers.

November's allocations are based on sales made in September by businesses that report tax monthly plus revenues from sales made July, August and September by quarterly filers.

Hancock announced last week his office would be sending cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose districts \$1.3 billion in local sales tax allocations for November. It's a 6.4 percent increase compared to the same month last year. Across Gregg County, sales taxes increased 4.75 percent comparing November 2025 to 2024, while Upshur County reaped 16.04 percent more than the same period 12 months back.

Gilmer's check came in at 8.04 percent ahead (\$258,873) while Union Grove's significantly smaller allocation (\$737) showed an 8.26 percent year-to-year decrease. For the calendar year, Gladewater's total allocations are ahead a bit less than 1 percent while White Oak's up more than 9 percent.

# White Oak voters OK \$1M debt transfer

Voters in White Oak ISD signed off on the school's \$1 million 'bookkeeping bond' according to unofficial results posted by the Gregg County Elections Office on Election Day last week.

With voter approval, the district will 'move' about a million dollars from its Maintenance & Operations budget to Interest & Sinking (debt service).

The action is projected to have no impact on residents' taxes, according to data compiled by the school's financial advisors.

The Election Day totals showed 60.53 percent of 646 voters cast ballots in favor of the bond. That includes a tally of 391 votes 'For' to 255 'Against' including early voting and decisions made on Nov. 4.

#### Voters approve all 17 amendments

Texas voters approved all 17 constitutional amendments on the ballot last week, the Houston Chronicle reported. Those included measures to raise the homestead exemption and reduce property taxes for businesses, and to provide \$1 billion annually for a statewide water fund.

Other propositions passed would allow judges to deny bail to people accused of serious crimes and create a \$3 billion dementia research fund.

"This legislative session, we delivered the conservative victories Texans demanded," Gov. Greg Abbott wrote in a statement. "And this November, Texans showed up to enshrine them in the Texas Constitution."

Nearly 3 million cast ballots statewide Texans showed up in record numbers for this off-year election. Unofficial statewide returns indicate nearly 3 million cast ballots – nearly 15% of all registered voters in the state, the Austin American-Statesman reported. That appears to set a new record for off-year election turnout in Texas, driven in part by key local issues in larger counties, such as Travis and Bexar counties.

The statewide leader in voter turnout was tiny Loving County on the Texas-New Mexico border, where more than half of the county's 140 registered voters cast ballots.

#### **Nelson fighting GOP over closed primaries**

The state's top election official is fighting a GOP lawsuit that seeks to restrict the state's primaries to registered party members, the Texas Standard reported. Republican Secretary of State Jane Nelson in her filing said that decision should be left up to state lawmakers, not the courts.

She said that a court ruling now, with the March primaries just a few months away, would "confuse voters, unduly burden election administrators, or otherwise sow chaos or distrust in the electoral process."

The Texas Republican Party claims the state's open primaries violate their constitutional right to freedom of association. Key Republicans, such as Attorney General Ken Paxton, complain Democratic and independent voters are casting ballots in Republican primaries to back more moderate candidates.

Closing Texas primaries would require overhauling the state's voter registration system, require changes in state law, and take years to implement, the Standard reported.

#### Increase in whooping cough in Texas

The Texas Department of State Health Services is reporting a steep increase in cases of pertussis, or whooping cough, this year. Early data indicates Texas has had more than 3,500 reported pertussis cases through October, four times the number reported over the same period last year.

This is the second straight year the state has experienced high increases in pertussis cases, according to DSHS.

Pertussis can cause serious and possibly life-threatening complications in infants and young children who are not fully immunized. About one-third of babies younger than a year old who contract pertussis need to be hospitalized.

Pertussis is a highly contagious illness with early symptoms akin to the common cold. It can lead to extended coughing fits that can last for weeks or even months.

#### Texas to buy 54,000 acres for new state park

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission last week accepted a gift of a 54,000-acre ranch in the western Hill Country, the Statesman reported. The Silver Lake Ranch, about 125 miles west of San Antonio, is being acquired from the Moody Foundation.

"We actually haven't been using it for a long time," Elle Moody, with the foundation, said in an interview before the formal vote by the parks commission. "But hopefully it will be in the near future for camping and paddling and mountain biking. So we're really looking forward to opening it up to the wider public."

The parcel, located in Kinney and Edwards counties, would be second in size only to Big Bend Ranch State Park, at 300,000 acres and purchased in 1988.

"This is exactly that kind of property that could really help expand or meet the demand for recreational opportunities on public land in Texas," Luke Metzger, with Environment Texas, said. "I swear, that's just some of the prettiest country I've ever seen in Texas. It's just gorgeous out there."

## Looking for Labor

Recent data indicate that US legal immigration has slowed markedly under the current tighter immigration policies. There is evidence that more foreign-born persons are leaving than entering, and H-1B visa registrations as well as student and temporary work visas have dropped. While accurate estimates are difficult to generate at best, it appears that the number of foreign-born workers has declined by well over one million in 2025.

Although there are many potential reasons for slowing migration to the United States such as sluggishness in the technology sector and restrained economic growth, it is clear that higher fees, stricter vetting, and expanded enforcement have been primary culprits. Policies to address legitimate border security concerns are obviously both needed and appropriate, but we must distinguish those concerns from essential workforce math. Discouraging responsible immigration threatens the adequacy of the US workforce.

One problem with slower migration is that current US demographic patterns will simply not support sufficient growth in working-age ranges. Birth rates last peaked in 2007 (18 years ago); thus, there will be fewer new entrants each year at the same time that Baby Boomer retirements remain quite high. Immigration accounts for the majority of labor force expansion. Without workers, the economy cannot expand. Shortages are particularly acute in industries such as construction, agriculture, health care, and hospitality. As wages are bid up due to constraints, some of the incremental costs will be passed on to consumers. In addition, many immigrants are highly skilled, which will work to reduce innovation, patents, and startup creation, thereby further slowing growth.

With slower or even negative net immigration, we can ex-

pect less economic growth. Credible research has estimated that each one million-person drop in working age immigrants reduces potential gross product growth by 0.05-0.1 percentage point per year. Although not a huge decrease in growth, the problems compound over time.

Moreover, the worker shortages will affect daily life. With insufficient farm workers, food prices will rise. A lack of construction workers will slow projects and raise costs, particularly as we try to address a chronic housing deficiency. There are severe shortages in nurses and home health aides. which will only be exacerbated by slowing immigration.

Several potential policy options should be explored. Streamlining various visa and work permission processes, adjusting numbers to match legitimate workforce needs, reducing fees, and addressing issues at all skill levels are viable options. Comprehensive reform has been needed for decades, and demographics are only heightening the urgency.

The immigration slowdown will constrain the US labor force at a time of lower birth rates, overall aging, and robust labor demand. Simply stated, when you are not making enough people, you need to go and find some. Stay safe!

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# PRESUMPTION AND WORSHIP # 3

As we conclude our study on worship, using a Bible concordance to find how many adjectives are used to describe the word "worship" could be a very profitable study. For example, when the apostle Paul spoke to the Athenians, he mentioned an altar with the inscription, "TO THE UNKNOWN GOD," and said, "whom therefore you ignorantly worship, him I declare unto you" (Acts 17:23). Thus, we are introduced to the concept of "Ignorant worship." In Colossians 2: 2: 22-23 this same apostle speaks of "will worship." In Matthew 15: 9, Jesus said the scribes' and Pharisees' worship was "vain," saying "In vain they worship Me teaching for doctrines the commandments of men." And in John 4: 23, Jesus said: "But the hour cometh, and now is, when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth." So, we find that the Bible speaks of "true worship. Obviously "will worship," "ignorant worship," and "vain worship" are neither a glory to God nor of any real benefit to man.

Jesus was very explicit concerning the kind of worship which God will accept. Again, He said in John 4: 24: "God is a spirit: and they that worship Him MUST worship Him in spirit and in truth." That verse gives us great insight. True worship is directed to the right object, God, and not to man nor idols, nor even angels, and it involves the "right attitude" and is "in spirit," which involves the heart of man and true worship must be "in truth," or according to the Word of God.

In summation then, first century Christians who worshipped God "in spirit and in truth" partook of the Lord's Supper upon each first day of the week, (Acts 20: 7). They sang praises to God (Ephesians 5: 19). They prayed (Acts 2: 42), and according to 1 Corinthians 16: 1-2, they contributed on the first day of the week for appropriate works of the church. Their worship was simple; it was spiritual; it was God-directed; and according to truth. We should worship that way today. Think on these things.

# Bears remain perfect in District play





#### Byrd running for district judge

Byrd said Monday he filed by certified mail to run in the 2026 Republican primary, and that he has no primary opponent thus far.

Elected Upshur DA in 2006, he took office Jan. 1, 2007 and is believed to have held the post longer than anyone in the county's history. Before assuming that position, he was an assistant Gregg County district attorney for six years, working under the late then-District Attorney Bill Jennings.



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





#### NOTICE OF RATE CHANGE REQUEST

On October 14, 2025, Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO or Company) filed a Petition and Statement of Intent to Change Rates (the Petition) with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC or the Commission) in Docket No. 58819, and with those municipal authorities in its Texas service territory that have original jurisdiction over SWEPCO's electric rates. This notice is being published in accordance with Section 36.103 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act and Commission Procedural Rule 16 Tex. Admin. Code (TAC) § 22.51(a)(1).

SWEPCO has approximately 191,000 Texas retail customers. All such customers and all classes of customers will be affected by the relief requested in SWEPCO's Petition.

SWEPCO's request to change its rates is based on the financial results for a 12-month test year ending on March 31, 2025. SWEPCO's Petition requests approval for a total Texas retail base rate revenue requirement of \$641,516,844 and a base rate increase of \$163,896,434, an increase of 41.67 % over adjusted Texas retail Test Year base rate revenues exclusive of fuel and rider revenues. The proposed increase in Texas retail revenues will be offset by setting SWEPCO's current TCRF, DCRF, Advanced Metering System (AMS) surcharge, and a portion of Net Operating Loss Carryforward (NOLC) surcharge to zero, a reduction of \$68,960,435. Thus, the net proposed increase is \$94,935,998. The overall impact of the proposed revenue requirement, considering both fuel and non-fuel revenues, is a 13.48% increase. The impact of the rate change on various customer classes will vary from the overall impact described in this notice, as shown in the table below. In addition, SWEPCO is seeking recovery of the reasonable rate-case expenses, including expenses paid to reimburse intervening municipalities, that it incurs in this case and those rate-case expenses incurred in three prior dockets that have yet to be recovered.

A Residential Service customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours of energy per month will see an increase in their total bill (including fuel costs and rate riders) of \$16.43 per month, an increase of approximately 12.15%.

SWEPCO has proposed that its requested rate change become effective 35 days after the filing of the Petition and Statement of Intent. The proposed effective date is subject to suspension and extension by actions that may be taken by the Commission and other regulatory authorities.

SWEPCO also seeks to reconcile its Advanced Metering System (AMS) deployment costs through March 31, 2025. SWEPCO is requesting to (1) implement new base rates reflecting its ongoing costs to provide AMS and (2) reconcile AMS costs with AMS surcharge revenues under 16 TAC § 25.130. At the conclusion of this proceeding, with the implementation of new base rates, SWEPCO proposes to eliminate the AMS surcharge and roll AMS capital expenditures and AMS operations and maintenance costs into base rates.

SWEPCO is proposing various revisions to most tariffs and schedules. In addition, in order to facilitate future TCRF, DCRF, and Generation Cost Recovery Rider (GCRR) filings pursuant to 16 TAC §§ 25.239, 25.243, and 25.248, respectively, SWEPCO requests that the Commission: (1) set the Company's current TCRF and DCRF to zero; and (2) establish in this docket the baseline values consisting of the inputs to the calculations that will be used to calculate SWEPCO's TCRF, DCRF, and GCRR in future dockets. A complete copy of the Petition and related filings is available for inspection at the address listed in the previous sentence.

# New Sharelunker bass make home in Lake Gladewater

Lake Gladewater welcomed 45 new residents last week, recently retired Sharelunker broodfish from the Texas Parks & Wildlife Fish Hatchery in Brookeland.

"They're pretty special fish," fisheries technician Melissa Johnson said as she prepped her 3- to 5-pound charges for transfer into the lake Nov. 5.

Each is about 7 years-old and put in about four years in the hatchery.

"They live over 10 years. They've got quite a bit of life left," Johnson added. "And these are some healthy fish; they'll just keep getting bigger.

"They're a little feisty."

Come put them to the test, Gladewater Fire Chief & Lake Warden Mike Simmons said in an open invitation to area anglers.

"Come out, bring a rod, enjoy some fishing," he suggested, just make sure to log any big bass. "A lot of people don't realize if you catch that fish and it's above 8 pounds, you can register that with the Sharelunker program and maybe win some prizes."

According to District Fisheries Biologist Tim Bister, this crop was spawned in 2018 and matured for three years before their stint in the hatchery.

"Once in a while we have to make room for another group of fish coming up," he added. "Several years ago we used those Sharelunker fish to totally change our broodstock in our hatcheries.


"The mother was at least a 13-pound fish. These fish have that genetic potential to get to these sizes" and to breed like-sized offspring.

The Sharelunker program helps TPW collect information on bigger fish in public

Anyone who hooks one is encouraged to hang it on a scale and snap a picture that shows the weight and the entire fish. Qualifying catches get a token of appreciation in thanks for their efforts.

"If you catch a fish that's over 13 pounds, you can record it for Texas arks & Wildlife," he added, "and if it's in good health, you can donate it to our hatcheries as a broodfish."

# Put out your 'Scouting for Food' donations this Saturday morning


